Message from the Rabbi



Israel was established 68 years ago and its birthday is on May 12. It is wise to reflect upon the meaning of its existence. Many can remember what it was like to grow up in a world with no safe haven for Jews. Seventy years ago which country was willing to take in those of our people who desperately sought refuge from murderous states? Which country was friendly and which was not?

The questions themselves speak to the fundamental role Israel plays for modern Jews. We have a place in the world now. We have a land to call

our own, a land which is dedicated to protecting us physically and nurturing us spiritually.

It is ironic that Israel is currently one of the most dangerous places for a Jew to live. Our enemies have publicly stated their intention to destroy the State with bombs or armies or terrorist attacks. Yet, when I traveled to Israel in late February, the feeling of being threatened was much different than anywhere else in the world. That is because in other parts of the world Jews must depend upon non-Jews to defend them (law enforcement agencies, political bodies or the like) but in Israel Jews themselves decide how they will respond to belligerent action. In the diaspora Jews must work the political system to feel secure; in Israel Jews are the system.

The lessons of Jewish survival were learned only too well during WWII. It is independence and power that are necessary to survive. "Never Again" was the cry and that meant that never again would we depend upon others to secure our protection. When Israel came into being its most essential purpose was to protect the people. Not the United States or the United Nations could tell Israel what it must do in order to survive; only Jews would do that.

To the rest of the world, and even to many Jews in the diaspora, Israel has often appeared to be using its power in overbearing ways. No nation is perfect, to be sure, but nothing is more liberating than the responsibility which comes with independence. The decisions which are most important - the decisions regarding security and survival - are now Israel's and Israel's alone to make.

We can only pray that Israel will also fulfill its mission as a spiritual homeland for all Jews, that the tensions between the Orthodox and liberal communities will lessen and that all branches of Judaism will have a fair share in the spiritual life of the Land. "Kulanu Yehudim" - "We are all Jews" - is the simple rubric we must emphasize. The unity of the people depends upon us recognizing that our common destiny is more important than our present divisions.

As American Jews, we must support Israel and in particular those causes that work for the unity of our people. We must teach our children that all Jews are responsible for one another. We must continually reestablish our ties to Israel and reconfirm our love for the Land.

dren and adults who live in Uganda don't have the resources to get adequate foot coverings to prevent against getting jiggers (sand fleas that grow in colonies). So, as one of our new Tikkun Olam projects, we will be collecting denim



jeans (old and new – clean ones please) and plastic containers from milk, juice or laundry detergent, and cutting them using a premade pattern and sending them off to have shoes made from them.



Allan Slovin, who joined me at Burgertopia, behind home plate, at Coolray Field. We had a great time while earning money for CDT!

Unfortunately, we had no volunteers for the very first Saturday game. That was disappointing and a missed opportunity to earn FUNdraising dollars. Let's try to avoid those kind of bagels!

The good news is that we have some upcoming games with 6 volunteers. When we have 6 or more volunteers, we earn the full 10% of the concession proceeds. With fewer than 6 volunteers we receive a lower percentage rate and get assigned to smaller concession stands. 

JEWISH HOLIDAYS THIS MONTH



YOM HASHOAH יום השואה

(Thursday, May 5) Yom HaShoah, also known as Holocaust Remembrance Day, occurs on the 27th of Nisan. *Shoah*, which means catastrophe or utter destruction in Hebrew, refers to the atrocities that were committed against the Jewish people during World War II. This is a memorial day for those who died in the *Shoah*. The *Shoah* is also known as the Holocaust, from a Greek word meaning "sacrifice by fire." In Israel, it is a national memorial day and public holiday. It was inaugurated on 1953, anchored by a law signed by the Prime Minister of Israel David Ben-Gurion and the President of Israel Yitzhak Ben-Zvi.



YOM HAZIKARON יום הזכרון Israel Memorial Day

(Wednesday, May 11) The Israeli Knesset established the day before Yom HaAtzmaut as Yom HaZikaron, a Memorial Day for soldiers who lost their lives fighting in the War of Independence and in other subsequent battles.

YOM HAATZMAUT יום העצמאות Israel Independence Day

(Thursday, May 12) Yom HaAtzmaut, Israeli Independence Day, marks the establishment of the modern state of Israel in 1948. It is observed on or near the 5th of Iyar in the Hebrew calendar.

LAG B'OMER ל"ג בעומר

(Thursday, May 26) Lag B'Omer, is a Jewish holiday celebrated on the 33rd day of the Counting of the Omer, which occurs on the 18th day of the Hebrew month of Iyar. One reason given for the holiday is as the day of passing of Rabbi Shimon bar Yochai. Modern Jewish tradition links the holiday to the Bar Kokhba Revolt against the Roman Empire (132-135 CE). In Israel, it is celebrated as a symbol for the fighting Jewish spirit.

The Omer was an ancient Hebrew measure of grain. The Book of Leviticus (23:15-16) also commands: "And from the day on which you bring the offering . . . you shall count off seven weeks. They must be complete." This commandment led to the traditional practice of S'firat HaOmer, or "Counting the Omer." The seven weeks of counting the Omer spans the 49 days between the second day of Passover and the beginning of Shavuot. Thus, S'firat HaOmer links the Exodus from Egypt with the giving of the Torah at Sinai. Each evening of the 49 day period, Jews say a special blessing, recite a prescribed formula for counting each day, then read a psalm and a special prayer. 
