## Rabbinic Reflections



Shalom my friends,

During the Hebrew month of Elul, the month that precedes the High Holy Days, which will begin later in August, Jews around the world will begin their preparations for the process of *cheshbon hanefesh*, the accounting of the soul that takes place during the Days of Awe. There are a number of traditional ways that this month is marked. The first, and probably most familiar, is the daily sounding of the *shofar*. The blast that is heard every morning, is an attempt to wake us up. This wakeup call does not

serve as an alarm clock for our bodies, but for our souls, urging us to take stock of our lives and turn toward a healthier, holier path.

The second way that Elul is marked is through our liturgy. Traditionally, the words from Psalm 27 are read each day, which say, "achat sh'alti me'eit Adonai...One thing I ask from Adonai, this is what I seek, to dwell in the house of Adonai all the days of my life, to see the pleasantness of Adonai and to visit God's Temple." Now, it might seem strange that, while asking of God one thing, there are actually three requests, but the requests all have the same ending point, a stronger relationship with God and that which is holy in the world. Through the recitation of the psalm, we implore God to gain access to the presence of the Divine on a daily basis as we begin this journey of introspection. This image, the Beit El, the house of God, the dwelling place of the Eternal, is a central image within our tradition, and a spiritual place in which we strive to gain access all throughout our lives.


We all, here at CDT, have a wonderful opportunity to be in that house of the Divine, for whenever we come together at the synagogue, for whatever purpose, holiness resides among us. God surely dwells among us each time we pray together, each time we learn together, each time we do *tzedakah*, acts of charity and justice together, and each time we gather in the community to create stronger relationships that sustain the Jewish people. But, as we enter this month of Elul, let the psalm also be a challenge for us as well: to grow as individuals, as a congregation, and as a people.

So, I hope, as we look to begin the new Jewish year, and as we begin our new programmatic year at CDT, that you will all take the opportunity to come pray, to come learn, to become active in the Men Club or Sisterhood, or take the opportunity to just come in and say "hi". For as we take these opportunities, of which those listed are just a small example, we will truly strengthen our connections to the our CDT community and the Jewish people. And when we create or strengthen these connections and relationships, we will truly be able to make our congregation a shining example of God's house.

## Cantorial Soloist's Message

Shalom chaveirim - hello my friends,

I hope you and your family are well. As many of you know, I have the pleasure of running our *B'nai Mitzvah* program. Over the years, I have enjoyed working with so many students and their families. At the beginning of the journey towards leading a service, I meet with the students and families and begin to try and contextualize *B'nai Mitzvah*. Some of the language that I hear quite frequently is from the parents referencing their *Rabbi* or *Cantor* who "Bar/Bat Mitzvahed" them, or from students who talk about "having their Bar/Bat Mitzvah". But, actually...

#### You were NOT Bar/Bat Mitzvahed

Although we refer to "having a *Bar/Bat Mitzvah*" or being "Bar/Bat Mitzvahed", this is, in fact, impossible. That's right. None of us have had a *Bar/Bat Mitzvah*. None of us have been *Bar/Bat Mitzvahed* - ever. There just is no such thing.

A Bar/Bat Mitzvah is not something that a Jew has, rather it is what a Jew becomes.

The difference in the description is as stark in contrast as day is from night. Having a *Bar Mitzvah* or being *Bat Mitzvahed* implies an experience that is limited to a single solitary point in time. Becoming a *Bar/Bat Mitzvah* is transformative and life-long.

Becoming a *Bar/Bat Mitzvah* means that a person has reached the age at which they are responsible to observe and follow the *mitzvot* (commandments) of the *Torah*. The purpose of *mitzvot* are to keep our lives focused on family, community, and a relationship with *Adonai*. How can this happen in a one and a half hour I *Shabbat* service?

By calling it being "Bar/Bat Mitzvahed", we end up by isolating the experience and narrowing our view of Judaism. So many people possess the misconception that Bar/Bat Mitzvah is confined to one occasion at the synagogue. The truth is that mitzvot intersect every moment of our lives: creating standards for business ethics, maintaining a peaceful home, honoring parents, raising children, interacting with neighbors, what we eat, caring for our planet, and so much more.

This *Torah* - these *mitzvot* that a *Bar/Bat Mitzvah* takes ownership of are the basis for some of life's most essential questions: How to live a purposeful life? How to build long lasting and meaningful relationships? How to be honest in business dealings? How to really make a difference in the world?

Surely, the pursuit of the answers – the pursuit of *Torah*, cannot have culminated when we reach the age 13, lead a service, and chant Torah for the first time. This pursuit is lifelong.

You were not Bar/Bat Mitzvahed.

You ARE a Bar/Bat Mitzvah. And you always will be.


committed our teaching team, Madrichim, volunteers and myself are to delivering a fun, collaborative and meaningful experience for all our students and their families!

## **CDT Community Giving**

#### **Tikkun Olam Volunteers of the Month**

We often talk about what is going on in the garden. But this month we want to give a special thanks to Lesley Radov and the many others that have made the Gan Tamid Garden a reality.

When Lesley joined CDT in 2009, she quickly became involved with Social Action which was considering a garden to grow food for the hungry in our community. The garden became a reality thanks to the help of the Men's Club and Dan Rosen, who built a fence as well as raised beds.

Betsy Bier, a former CDT member, was involved with the North Gwinnett Food Coop, and she did the initial planting of vegetables in 2011. At the time, Lesley was growing garlic in her home garden and started taking some up to the food coop. Working with Betsy, and then taking the garden over full time, Lesley added other crops such melons, beans and eggplant, which were not typically being donated by other organizations. Of course, the garden still yields more common donations such as tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers and zucchini. Over the past few years, over 300 pounds of vegetables, fruits and garlic has been donated annually to the North Gwinnett Food Coop.

Since its inception, there have been many people who have helped out with the garden in various ways including: Linda Barton, Deb Eskenazi, and Kathleen Sable. We have also been given items (such as the table and chairs donated by the Blitzers) as well as generous donations of money to replace the shed in 2022, thank you Stacey Jahanfar and others, and purchase gardening supplies. Often the Religious School children have laid mulch and helped with other tasks. During the 2021 CDT Cares Day, we had an enthusiastic group of fence painters, and the Men's Club has continued to support the garden, most recently by putting up the new shed this past spring.

This summer, we need to give a big shout-out to Sharon Miller and Brad Hench, who have volunteered to get dirty and help Lesley with planting and pulling weeds.

Lesley says "It feels good to know that you're helping to feed the hungry. There is a definite need in the community. I usually try to drop off the produce an hour or so before the co-op actually opens to hand out the food. At that time, you can already see the cars lining up to receive the food. It's especially gratifying when you see all the volunteers helping to sort the food and they come up to us to thank us for our donations. "




