Rabbinic Reflections

Dear friends,

Each year, right about the first of December, I am asked the same question many times: How do you spell Chanukah? Is it Chanukah, Hannukah, Hanukah, or . . . ? So, I am here to tell you the definitive, correct, 100% authentic way to spell the name of our upcoming holiday. It is חנוכה.

This holiday, which we know as the Festival of Lights, takes its name from a Hebrew word meaning "dedication." This is because our ancestors were able to rededicate the Holy Temple in Jerusalem after it was desecrated by the Seleucid Greeks. They, through their faith, lit the Eternal Light and it stayed lit, not only for those eight days, but through the centuries as we have continued, as a people, to be dedicated and connected to one another.

We have now come to this season of dedication again. Though this year it will feel different, we will still light our candles and bring more light into the world, just as our ancestors did in ancient times. As we do so, we will show our dedication for our faith and our community. We will truly bring light to one another, even virtually, as we gather on the first night of Chanukah to light candles together on Zoom and welcome in this season of light and dedication. I look forward to seeing all of you on Zoom on December 10 as we light up our own homes, each others' homes, and the world with the dedication of our community and light of our Chanukah candles.


Additionally, we will have another reason to celebrate as a community during this upcoming holiday. In addition to the meaning of חנובה, meaning dedication, it also shares a root with another Hebrew word, חינוך (chinuch), which means education. So, we thought that this holiday, which speaks in its very name of dedication and which has at its root a connection to education, would be a perfect opportunity to celebrate the consecration of our newest religious school students as they mark their dedication to their years of religious school education before them. I hope you will join us on Friday, December 11 during our Shabbat Chanukah service, as we celebrate this milestone in our young people's lives.

Cantorial Soloist's Message



Shalom chaveirim - hello my friends!

I hope that you are doing well and looking forward to Chanukah and the new year. As we know, Chanukah, among other names, is called the Festival of Lights. From the 1st day to the 8th day, we light candles of the chanukiah in increasing number as we add to our joy of our celebration. Many years ago, the two great houses of Hillel and Shamai argued over how to light the candles of the *chanukiah* — do we count up or count down? That is, do we start with eight candles and take a new candle away each day of the festival, or do we begin

with one candle and add a new candle each day. Most Jews follow the latter tradition. Rabbi Hillel argued that we should add a new candle each day so that we are increasing in holiness throughout the eight days of Chanukah. To Rabbi Hillel, the light signified morality derived form the Torah and that by increasing the light of the Chanukah each day, it was a reminder that we have an obligation to increase the light we bring into the world by pursuing justice and morality as is laid out for us in our Torah.

Chunukah is also a very visual holiday, which is, I think, very appropriate for this somewhat virtual world. While on Rosh Hashanah we are commanded to hear the sound of the shofar, Chanukah is a holiday during which our traditions are to be seen. It is a custom to put the lit chanukah in a window that faces a street or other public area, so that everyone who passes by may be illumined by the Chanukah candles. I find this almost purely visual observance comforting and similar to the way I have begun to feel about our online services. Though I am not able to hear any of you, and because we are limited to only one voice at a time, we really can't hear each other pray. However, we can still see each other pray. Seeing each other sway back and forth to the rhythm of a song, clapping in time, nodding in agreement (or maybe even sometimes disagreement) with Rabbi Jordan's D'var Torah, and simply smiling are all the visual ways that we now pray and experience our spirituality together. And of course, as our screens are ultimately the interplay of different waves of light (maybe like flickering candles), each time someone new joins our online services, they add to that light. This has become how I see each of us in these troubling times — each one of us a candle adding to the great light that is the Jewish community. Each one of us adds our own flame to push back the darkness and, one by one, lift us up to a more holy plane of existence.

May you continue to be that light, that candle shining brightly. Happy Chanukah!






