

Rabbinic Reflections

Dear friends,



Sixteen years ago, two groups of people got together with a dream to create a dynamic, warm, and caring synagogue community serving the Reform Jewish community in the North Atlanta metro area. Through discussions, debates, negotiations, and compromises, these groups formed our Congregation Dor Tamid.

Sixteen years later, our congregation has gone through so much together, from *simcha* to sorrow. From times of transition to times of stability. Yet, the one thing that has remained constant was our community's commitment to one another.

At this time of uncertainty, we find ourselves challenged, individually and collectively, like never before.

Until the physical closing of our building, we had been having a fantastic year, filled with spiritually fulfilling services, fantastic learning opportunities for kids and adults, exciting events and programs, and a community building its member base and deepening our relationships. We had wonderful trips — for our 9th graders to Whitwell, Tennessee, led by Mike Zuspan and accompanied by Molly Peled, and for our Confirmation students to New York, led by me and accompanied by Stacey Jahanfar. We had great adult learning all year, including our weekly Torah study, recent discussions about Jewish-themed movies, and a very well-attended series "An In-depth Look at the Basics of Judaism." From a phenomenal pulpit exchange between Pastor Shaun King of Johns Creek Baptist Church and myself and my appointment as a Johns Creek Fire Chaplain to our community's continued commitment to social action by raising money for the Hunger Walk, bringing meals to the Zaban shelter, and making masks for the residents of The Cohen Home, we have shown our commitment to the broader community and made sure that CDT is a leader in the North Metro Area. Since our physical closing and transition to an online community, we have had services, classes, and events attended by so many of you. While these community touch points are truly not the same as meeting in person, they have allowed many of us to stay connected to one another, and for some to become reconnected to our congregation. All of these things don't happen on their own. We are truly a village, and a village succeeds based on the vision and commitment of those dedicated to its success.

That said, I would like to thank just some of the many people who have been instrumental in making the last year happen. First, I would like to thank our staff. Cantorial Soloist Mike Zuspan, Director of Education Molly Peled, Executive Director Stacey Jahanfar, Administrative and B'nai Mitzvah Coordinator Ruthanne Warnick,

custodial staff members Stacey Bell and Mo Alquarahuli, CDTTY advisors Jaime and Eric Benson, Susan Grossman, our b'nai mitzvah tutor, and all religious school teachers, who all work tirelessly in the office, in the school, in the sanctuary, around the building, and in the community making sure that our programs, services, classes, and care of our congregation is at a high standard. They all, each and every day, truly put their hearts into CDT.

To our Board of Directors, committee chairs, and committee members, thank you for all of the work that you do and for all that you give, in all the ways that you give, to CDT. You truly are my partners in the holy work that is our service of the Jewish people, and I want to acknowledge you and thank you. You deserve all of our gratitude for helping make our community the amazing place it is. Thank you.

Finally, I want to thank our outgoing president, Dan Rosen. Dan, you have challenged me to be the best rabbi I can be, and we have truly worked together to overcome the challenges our community has faced. While your official time as president is ending, I know that you, Wendy, Sarah, and Ellie will continue to be active members of our community, bringing your passion, your excitement, and your energy to our congregation. You have worked tirelessly for our community, which, it is clear, you truly love. Thank you for all you have done and will continue to do for CDT.

So, standing on the top of this mountain, looking out to the wilderness, where are we going? How will we reopen our congregational home? And when will that be? The answer to that last question is still very much uncertain. The how we are working on. Our community is truly blessed to have the resources it has, and I, along with Dan, Stacey, and our new president, Leslie Fox, have been fortunate to have been advised throughout this crisis by CDT congregants Elliot Raizes, Sheri Lew, Penny Blitzer, Marty Duke, Marilyn Margolis, Andrew Frazier, and Lesley Radov. All of them are members of the medical field and have given their time, expertise, and wisdom to help us understand how COVID-19 affects CDT and what the proper path for us should be. To that effect, we are putting the finishing touches on a document detailing the eventual phased reopening of our congregational building. When it is complete, we will share it with the community, as well as information about the High Holy Days and how they will look this year, while trying to balance the spiritual needs and safety concerns of our congregation. While we all have a desire to return to our physical spiritual home, the Jewish value of *pikuach nefesh*, the saving of and protecting of human life, has always been, and will remain, at the forefront of our decision-making process.

The recent annual meeting signaled the near end of another fiscal year. You have all continued to trust us, to engage with us, and to support our community during this trying time. My promise to you is that I, along with the staff and lay leadership of CDT, will continue to serve our Jewish community, whether virtually or in person, to the best of our abilities, and it is my hope that each of you will stay engaged and continue to support our congregation into the future.

We are all here together and for each other as one congregational family. From our youngest babies to our oldest adults, we are all, together, what makes Congregation Dor Tamid a special congregation. Some day, hopefully soon, I know we will be able to be together again in person. We need each of you to stay active and engaged, so that when we are able to open our doors we can ensure that we will always be the active and thriving congregation that we love.

As we come down from the mountaintop into the next year together, we pray that God will help us go through the wilderness to the Promised Land and will allow us to strengthen each other and strengthen our Congregation Dor Tamid. Amen.

Cantorial Soloist's Message


Shalom Chaveirim — Hello my friends,

It happens that, as I write this, I have just completed mixing the audio and producing a split-screen video of all of the Reform Jewish cantors and soloists singing Tree of Life for Erev Shavuot, the holiday that celebrates the giving of the Torah to Moses and the Children of Israel at Mt. Sinai. I can tell you that this recording project was filled with technical challenges for all involved — each one of us recording on our phones, computers, or other various home-studio setups. Each one of us completed our recordings on different days at different times. Because we were all using different equipment and recording in different acoustical environments, each of the recordings I received sounded so very different from one another. By themselves, the recordings (especially mine at two o'clock in the morning), though nice, were really nothing special. But, when I started laying each track over the other, the recording started to really "pop". After much work, I — or rather we — ended up with something kind of amazing. Cantors and soloists from all across the Metro Atlanta area coming together to sing and celebrate the Torah without having ever been together in the same room at the same time even once. It occurs to me that we worked together as does a tree, with some of its leaves separated by sometimes 100 feet and yet still part of a whole, connected by twigs, branches, trunk, and ultimately earth. This is the Jewish people — a tree, with each of us part of a whole, connected no matter how far away. We, ourselves, are a Tree of Life. We are Torah.

Education Director's Message

What a year it has been. It is so hard to summarize an amazing year in less than five minutes. First, I want to thank so many people without whom this year would have never been so successful. Let me start with the teachers — Annette Schulman, Yulia Levkov, Limor Kolt, Landy Gonzalez, Susan Grossman, Lori Herman, Ruth Hartman, Ariel Robins, Allyson Tibor, Marci Risner, Stacey Jahanfar, Mike Zuspan, and Rabbi Jordan.

This year, more than any other, our teachers have become family. We had weekly meetings, shared personal and professional stories, and connected as one. The teachers really stepped up to the plate when we needed to change from our regular way of teaching to virtual learning. They all left their comfort zones and taught classes online. They were so dedicated that they didn't take vacation days and taught through Passover and spring break, and they did it voluntarily! No Education Director could ask for a better staff of amazing teachers.

I would like to thank my Education Committee, especially our VP of Education, Jodi Rosa. The entire team was always there for me, to help build and perfect the school.

I would also like to take this opportunity to thank Rob Lederman, who is always ready to help the religious school in any way possible. 
A huge shoutout also goes out to our President, Dan Rosen. Ever since Dan was VP of Operations, he has had a soft spot for the religious school. Dan's heart goes out to make sure the religious school continues to be successful from year to year. Thank you, Dan, for your ongoing support to the school and for believing in me and my vision.

This year we continued to have a rich curriculum, based on "hands-on learning."

Pre-K – 6th graders learned both Hebrew and Judaic studies. The level of Hebrew this year, thanks to our amazing Hebrew teachers, has risen to a level that we have never seen at CDT. Our 2nd and 3rd graders are reading and writing and even speaking a few words in Hebrew. If their level is that high now, you can only imagine how advanced they will be in the 6th grade. Seventh graders did a year of amazing mitzvot in the community, 8th graders visited a different place of worship every week, and the 9th graders learned about "Israel – Why should they know and why should they care?" The 9th graders got to go on an overnight field trip to Chattanooga, Tennessee and spend a day at Whitwell Middle School and the Paper Clips Museum. They were able to share their experiences on the Yom HaShoah video we presented to the Congregation in April. The confirmation class had a great time bonding and learning in New York with their teacher Rabbi Jordan. Zohar, our shinshin, couldn't have had a better time this year with our students and teachers. He was able to go on both trips with us!

This year the religious school has made great efforts to unite our school projects with the entire congregation — from working in Gan Tamid, raising money with social action, working with parents for Disability Awareness Month, and having parents volunteer at our front desk, to taking a virtual tour of Israel and dancing from our living rooms for Israel Independence Day.



There is so much we can do as a congregation to make the world a better place.

I would like to thank all the members of your Social Action Committee: Jackie Berger, Larry Berger, Ruthie Cohen, Lesley Radov, Deb Eskenazi, Linda Barton, Paula Bloom and Sharon Rocco.

This past year your Social Action Committee was successful with several projects. This is only a partial list.

THE HUNGER WALK: Although the actual WALK was cancelled due to the coronavirus pandemic, thanks to Paula Bloom and the generosity of our members we collected \$2743. This is estimated to feed more than 11,000 individuals needing food. A special thank you to Molly, our Education Director, who assisted in engaging our teens and religious school students with a friendly *tzedakah* competition.

GAN TAMID: A big shoutout to Lesley Radov, who produced 305 pounds of food for the North Gwinett Co-op in Buford. Included were tomatoes, peppers, cucumbers, squash, eggplant, garlic, cantaloupe, honeydew, basil, oregano, parsley, and rosemary. In addition, she grew corn stalks for use in trimming CDT's *sukkah*.

ZABAN PARADIES CENTER HOMELESS SHELTER: We continue to participate in this rewarding project, providing and serving meals each month from October through April. Due to the COVID-19 situation, we were unable to serve in March and April, but we did deliver the food as usual. Congregants who participated are: Jackie Berger, Lesley Radov, Stacy Jahanfar, Lisa and George Winton, Ruthie Cohen, Ruth Hartman, Janet Levy, Sherry Fages, and Sharon Rocco.

BEANIES FOR PRE-MATURE BABIES: With the assistance of our knit/crochet group, we provided 14 beanies and 11 octopuses to the Northside Hospital NICU. Recently the group has been meeting weekly by Zoom to socialize and continue knitting and crocheting at home. All are welcome, so please join us. Currently we have 13 beanies and 16 octopuses waiting to be delivered and many more at various locations waiting to be collected. As soon as the hospital considers it safe, they all will delivered.

HOMES AGAINST HUNGER: Thank you to Jackie Berger for organizing this project and to our dedicated drivers Linda Barton, Deb Eskenazi, Larry Berger, Jackie Berger, Stephen Mittler, and Lesley Radov. In November, five overflowing barrels were collected, and in January we filled four barrels totaling 573 pounds of food. Thank you to all who donated so generously. Due to the COVID-19 situation, we were not able to collect food for the March 22 drive, and the May 17 pickup was cancelled, as well. Watch for info about when we will begin collecting food again.

In lieu of collecting food, if you desire to make a monetary donation to local organizations that are helping those in need, it will be very much appreciated.




