## **Rabbinic Reflections** Dear friends,



As we approach the end of another programming year, I want to thank all of you for the continued support you have given our congregation as we have navigated our new world shaped by the pandemic. Our community's continued support for one another has kept our community strong and vibrant. For my newsletter article, I would like to share with you a piece of my address from our recent annual meeting.

For the Jews who stood at Mount Sinai, it was not only Torah and *mitzvot* that were revealed. They also discovered their own true, inner essence. They attained a sublime level of natural purity and intuitively proclaimed, "We will do." We will follow our natural essence, unhindered by any spurious, artificial conventions.

This past year has allowed us to tap into that intuitive knowledge. Among my colleagues, the running joke for the past 15 months has been, "They didn't teach us this in rabbinical school." And yet, for all of us, we have had to adapt, go with the flow, be flexible, and try new things in order to maintain our connection to Judaism and to each other. Na'aseh. We will do . . . and we did.

We moved our services online, taught religious school over Zoom, connected to one another online and via phone calls, and found new and virtual ways to connect to Judaism and CDT.

V'nishmah . . . we will hear. We did not always understand what we were doing this past year, but the pandemic gave us the opportunity to learn new ways of forming community and has allowed us to begin discussions about how to take what we have learned and bring those lessons back into a hybrid or in-person model.

It has truly been a year where we have had many ups and down, and we have many people to thank.

First and foremost, I want to thank our Medical Advisory Committee made up of CDT members who are also part of the medical field for their guidance, expertise, and support in making decisions. Thank you to Elliot Raizes, Lesley Radov, Penny Blitzer, Sheri Zager Lew, Glen Lew, Marty Duke, Craig Brown, Marilyn Margolis, and Andrew Frazer for all you have done this year.

I also want to thank the staff. Stacey, Mike, Molly, Ruthanne, and Mo have worked tirelessly and creatively to adapt our program and continue to serve each one of our member families at a high and compassionate level this year.

This year was challenging for all of us, but the most important thank you I have is to each one of you. We have shown each other time and again over the past year the strength of community, and we have had ample opportunities to give each other strength as we worked through this year.

And there is good news as we look to the coming year. Beginning several weeks ago, we have begun having Friday night services in the building. We are raising our numbers allowed for b'nai mitzvah, and we hope to be able to expand service attendance in the near future. And, most importantly, we have been given the direction from our medical team to start planning for both in-person religious school next fall and in-person High Holy Day services. While we don't yet know exactly what that will look like, I can tell you that I am extremely excited to be able to plan for this return to normalcy.

As we keep adapting based, as always, on the scientific data at our disposal, we will continue to follow the directions and suggestions of our medical committee based on CDC guidelines. We ask your patience and understanding as we continue to adapt our policies, since we will need time to discuss, adapt, and implement new policies as the guidelines continue to change.

There is a lot to be excited about as we enter into this new year, from long term security and a return to gathering in person to the ability to examine who we are as a community coming out of the pandemic to see how we can grow together as a community, we truly have much to look forward to. I want to thank you all for your support over the last year and look forward to going into the future with each and every one of you.



Shalom chaveirm - hello my friends,

I hope you and your family are well and enjoying our beautiful Spring weather. This past month, you honored me with a wonderful tribute for my 15 years at Congregation Dor Tamid. It was a wonderful evening full of music, friends, and fun. The very meaningful gift (a guitar and mirror art piece) is so appreciated. For those of you who have not had a chance to see it, I will be hanging it in my CDT office. As we are getting closer and closer to a full and safe return to our building, I hope that (when possible) you will come and see me and the beautiful gift. On the gift is inscribed "... שָׁיָרוּ לֵיהוָה, שִׁיר חָדָשׁ *Shiru ladonai,*
