Dear friends,



As we enter into March, I am so excited about all of the great programs and events we have coming up between now and the beginning of Passover.

On March 7, we will be welcoming artist-in-residence, Cantor Evan Kent, to CDT. Cantor Kent will be joining us from his home in Jerusalem, where he will share with us his one-man show,

"Shards: Putting the Pieces Together." This performance, which shares the story of his grandparents' immigration to the United States juxtaposed with his own experience making *aliyah*, will definitely be an entertaining and illuminating experience. Together we will explore with Cantor Kent his story, as well as each one of our own.

The following weekend, I am excited to tell you that we will be back out on the patio! Join together for *Havdalah* Under the Stars, followed by a special musical performance by Mike and Amy Zuspan. I know that I, along with many of you, have been so excited for the opportunity to see each other in person (with masks and socially distant), and this will be a great opportunity to be together to say farewell to Shabbat and listen to some fantastic music together.

It is truly an honor to be the rabbi of this community . . . and that is what makes me truly excited to be able to bring my rabbi, Norman M. Cohen, to CDT for a scholar-in-residence weekend which will examine the question, "what do Jews and Christians have in common?" On Friday, March 19, Rabbi Cohen will deliver the guest sermon entitled "What sacred texts mean to Christians and Jews" during Friday night Shabbat services at 7:30pm. Then, on Sunday, March 21, at 11:00 we will meet with Rabbi Cohen on Zoom, where we will attempt to answer the question, "Was the Last Supper a Passover Seder?"

Finally, we will conclude the month with our celebration of freedom as we welcome in Passover together with a Zoom *seder* on *erev Pesach*, Saturday, March 27 at 6:00. All of this is in addition to all of the weekly programs, classes, and services we have going on virtually and (starting in March for some services) in person. I am so excited to be able to see you all soon and hope you will join us for all of these exciting opportunities.

I love the mezuzot I created with artist Gary Rosenthal! For anyone who participated in the Mezuzah Project, I bet you feel the same way. This great project was initiated and led by Ian Oxman, CDT VP of Marketing, in conjunction with Temple Beth Tikvah (TBT) and a grant from the Jewish Federation. Every participant received a "kit," and the artist, Gary Rosenthal, Zoomed with us as we did a workshop to create our own mezuzot. He said that our group was the biggest online that he ever had! There were 109 devices logged on to the Zoom meeting, and many screens had multiple participants. There were almost 200 mezuzot created that day!

Gary is a world-famous artist known for his Judaica artwork created by using metals and melted glass. We got to interact with him and he is a wonderful mensch of a man. Several years ago, Gary created the Glass Ribbon Project to raise money for the fight against cancer, which has taken on new personal meaning for Gary after his diagnosis with pancreatic cancer. Gary explained that he will be retiring from "retail" work later this year and will focus all of his effort on this mitzvah project. I feel very honored to have been a part.

Congregants both old and new, their family and friends, and TBT friends and family all logged on to a Zoom on February 21st and worked "side by side" to create their artwork. Thank you to Rabbi Jordan, Rabbi Shuval-Weiner (TBT), Ian Oxman, Suzanne Hurwitz (TBT), Carla Birnbaum (Jewish Federation), Gary Rosenthal, and everyone who participated to make this event such a success. This is what community is all about!





Waiting to get started

In the summer, Ian did a series of workshops with the Executive Board to create a Marketing Plan. Through this program, he could define some strategic initiatives that we are focusing on. Ian has already defined a "leader" for each initiative.

What's interesting is that this program tied in many of these strategic initiatives. My dear CDT family,

I hope you all had a fun and cheerful Purim. What a great holiday. You get to dress up, act Silly, and eat lots of hamentaschen. But, in my opinion, the best part of Purim is the משלוח מנות mishloach manot (food gifts to friends and family). Judaism is an amazing religion. It considers spoiling your friends and family with goodies a mitzvah. Not only is it a wonderful feeling to make them for others and hand deliver them, but it's also an amazing feeling to receive them.

When an entire community gives and receives, it creates a sense of unity, closeness, and family.

I remember in Israel, when my two older kids were young, we would all dress up in costumes and go door to door to deliver *mishloach manot*. When you got home, you ended up with so many *hamentaschen* at your door step from your neighbors that you didn't know what to do with all of them!

I often teach my students that even though you dress up in costumes on Halloween and you do the same on Purim, there are many differences between the two holidays. A very interesting difference is that on Halloween, we go from door to door and **ASK** for a treat. On Purim, we go door to door and we **GIVE** a treat!

I was so honored to be a part of making CDT's *mishloach manot* for the entire community. Knowing that every family will be receiving the same goodies, the same mask, and the same *gragger*, makes me proud to be part of CDT's community. After reading the many thank you remarks on our website, it made me feel that, despite COVID, CDT is stronger now than ever before. We didn't give up when things got hard and just wait until this terrible pandemic goes away. We are finding new ways every day to overcome it while being safe and smart. 

The Caring Committee sent dinner (which I kept saying no to) because I didn't realize at the time it would be incredibly helpful (and delicious I might add). There was soup, challah, other dinners, texts, calls, information sent to help heal, show love and support, from so many caring people at CDT. My thanks and appreciation runs very deep.

Without my being involved with the Sisterhood, I would never have had the opportunity to not only work with, but become friends with, the wonderful women who serve on the Board. Your texts, calls, offers of help and support was overwhelming . . . thank you!
