Rabbinic Reflections



Dear friends,

Now that the High Holy Days are over, we have moved into the Hebrew month of *Cheshvan*, or as the rabbis call it *mar Cheshvan* (the bitter month of *Cheshvan*) due to its lack of holidays. However, here at CDT, we have continued, and will continue, our full calendar of virtual and in-person services, classes, programs, and events in order to keep us all connected so that this month may be, in fact, *matok Cheshvan* (a sweet

month of *Cheshvan*). Among all of the great opportunities we have, I want to make sure to mention four specific ones that are sure to bring sweetness to our community.

First, on November 6, we will celebrate the confirmation of the class of 5780. This class has had their confirmation service postponed due to the pandemic, but I am excited to say we will have the opportunity to celebrate their accomplishments and honor them during our 7:30 Kabbalat Shabbat service held outdoors on the patio at CDT.

The following Shabbat, during services on November 13, we will be joined by Dr. Michael Meyer, who is the Adolph Ochs Professor Emeritus of Jewish History at the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion in Cincinnati. If you were not at the first concert in this Fall Concert Series, trust me, this is an evening you do not want to miss. Please watch your email and our website for more information soon and to RSVP.

Lastly, I am honored to be joined by my friends and colleagues, Reverend Brian Daoust of Johns Creek Presbyterian Church and Mr. Tareef Saeb of Masjid Hamza, as the three of us hold a panel discussion about the ideas of Thanksgiving in our three faith traditions. This conversation will be held on Zoom on Thursday, November 19, at 7:30pm.



Shalom chaveirim - hello my dear friends,

I hope that you and your loved ones are doing well. Heartfelt Gratitude


November is a month we, as Americans, reflect on the things in our life for which we are most thankful. Every year my family has an amazing Thanksgiving




