Rabbinic Reflections



Dear friends,

As we have now ended the Days of Awe, and its holy days of *Rosh Hashanah* and *Yom Kippur*, we are about to enter into our next set of holidays: *Sukkot* and *Simchat Torah*. These days, marked by the *sukkah* and the celebration of our *Torah*, are known by our rabbis as *zman simchateinu*, the time of our joy. Usually we would spend time in the *sukkah*, eating, praying, singing, learning, and

shaking the *lulav and etrog*. However, this year, Sukkot, just like everything else, will be a bit different. Yes, we will still have a *sukkah* at CDT, which you are welcome to come to in order to fulfill the *mitzvah* of *lesheiv ba-sukkah* (sitting in the *sukkah*). However, we will not be able to have our large community gathering, known as Pizza in the Hut. So, I would like to invite you to do two things. First, join us tonight on the patio for *erev Sukkot/Kabbalat Shabbat* service. (RSVP is required. Call Stacey at 770-623-8860.) Second, take some time, as the holiday urges us, to be outside. Go on a hike, go into the woods or see a waterfall, or simply go out into your backyard at night and look up at the stars.

Following *Sukkot*, we will enter the holiday of *Simchat Torah*. This year, we have a special treat. On Friday, October 9, following our 7:00pm *Shabbat* service, we will join together with other congregations around the country for a fantastic online concert by the Jewish Bluegrass group, Nefesh Mountain. This should be a fantastic experience and a truly joyful way to celebrate the *Torah*. Saturday night, October 10, during *Havdalah*, we will celebrate consecration.

Finally, I want to thank everyone who helped make our holy days so special. First, I want to thank our staff: Mike Zuspan, Stacey Jahanafar, Molly Peled, Ruthanne Warnick, and Mo Alquarahuli. Thank you as well to Leslie Fox, Sherry Nemiroff, Jackie Berger, Lesley Radov, and all the other volunteers. 

Cantorial Soloist's Message



Shalom chaveirim - hello my friends,

I hope that you are doing well as together we continue to navigate through these strange and precarious times. As I sit down to write, it is the day after *Yom Kippur*, and I am truly struggling to put this day —the day after *Yom Kippur*—in its proper place. For me, there has always been a sense of finality, a feeling of closure, as I have found myself in the sanctuary, on the *bimah* listening to the final blast of the shofar signifying that *Yom Kippur*, the Day of Atonement, has come to a close. I then take off my *tallit*, sing through the blessings of

havdalah, conclude with the motzi, and then break the fast with bread, and, most importantly—doing so with you, my friends. We shake hands, give hugs, wish each other well, and look each other in the eye, thankful that we have each made it through this difficult day—ready to put the past behind us and turn towards the upcoming year. And so, having traversed the bridge that is the time from Rosh Hashanah to Yom Kippur, the day after Yom Kippur has always felt like a beginning—that I have reached the other side.

This year, however, the day after *Yom Kippur* does not feel quite right. In my mind, I know that it is 5781, the new year—but, in my heart, my soul, I am not fully convinced. I wonder how many of us feel the same. Is it because there is so much going on, so much that is out of our control, so much that does not seem to appear to have an end in sight? Or is it that we were not able to celebrate and observe the Holy Days as we always have—together and in our synagogue, that makes the days after feel conspicuously out of place?

Perhaps it is that this new year, 5781, is not like the others that have come before. When 5780 was ushered in, I can't imagine that any of us expected to find ourselves unable to be in our building by *Purim* and that we would be having a Zoom *Passover Seder*. And now, in 5781, we find ourselves planning for a Zoom *Chanukah* and hoping that we won't have to repeat our *Passover Seder*—socially distanced and separated from friends and family again, as we did in 5780.

As I struggle to put today in its place, I think that what I am missing the most is the feeling of hope that in years past has so naturally and effortlessly followed the blast of the *shofar*. This year, I think, I am going to have to work a little harder for that sense of hope, *tikvah*—תקוח. This year, I will not be able to take for granted that the year will flow as it has in the past—with all of its at least somewhat expected highs and lows.

Still, I do know that as in all the years past there continues to be a substantial and compelling source of strength and promise:

Our CDT family . . . us.

I know that despite the hurdles that we face—the uncertain road we continue to travel, if we rely on each other for strength, if we are there to care for and support each other, we can continue moving into this next year propelled by the hope that our togetherness sustains.

Rabbi Nachman of Breslov is said to have exclaimed, "The whole entire world is a very narrow bridge and the main thing is to have no fear at all." Perhaps this year, the main thing is to walk that narrow bridge together— yad b'yad—יד ביד—hand in hand.
