

Cantorial Soloist's Message



Shalom chaveirim - hello my friends,

As these words find you, we are in the midst of the Jewish month of Elul. This month is the last month of our Jewish calendar year and, as it leads to Rosh Hashanah and then Yom Kippur, it provides us an opportunity to prepare for the High Holy Days the Yamim Noraim. During this month, we reflect on the year that was and on who we were during that year. Did we achieve our goals? Were we kind? Did we act out of love? Did we pursue justice? Did we stand up for what we thought to be good and

right? If we missed the mark, did we acknowledge and then refocus and double our efforts? Did we learn anything in our many failures? Are we better people? What should we take with us into the new year? What should we leave behind?

So many hard questions and so many difficult answers.

Usually, my words to us on the last month of our Jewish year have been about either this accounting of the soul that we begin to work on in the month of Elul or a prayer for the new year. As this year has been anything but usual, I instead feel it more needed to put to paper (or rather to screen) — to acknowledge — maybe a little of where we have been and what we are still going through.

Some of us have recovered from injures and sickness. Some of us are still battling injury and sickness. Some of us have lost jobs and found new jobs. Some of us are searching for employment right now. Some of us have moved to new neighborhoods, new schools, new professions. Some of us are in a holding pattern — waiting to make important life changes, waiting to move forward with their lives. Some of us have gone through major changes in relationships. Some of us have begun new relationships. Some of us have watched, bittersweetly, our children move away. Some of have joyously brought new lives into our homes. Some of us have lost loved ones and friends and are walking down an unfamiliar path trying to make sense of the world. And all of us continue to navigate an unfamiliar and unpredictable world of pandemic, economic challenge, and social upheaval.

Together, as we navigate though this month of Elul . . . as we look back at the year that was, I offer on behalf us all, this prayer for 5781:

May your words be kind. May you act with compassion. May your deeds be a blessing to others. May your relationships be strengthened. May you and all those you love have good health. May you be free of pain. May the memories of those you have lost be a comfort. May your children and grandchildren grow strong, wise and fulfilled. May you deepen your commitment to your community. May you find meaning in your journey. May *Adonai* hear your prayers.



Our final Mysteries of the Machzor class will explore the Aveinu Malkeinu (Almighty and Merciful), a haunting set of supplications which are also a reminder of our relationship to G-d as the source of our blessings.



ZABAN PARADIES CENTER HOMELESS SHELTER: This is a very rewarding project, and we need your help in fulfilling our commitment. Take your child, grandchild, friends, or spouse. If your bar/bat mitzvah

child is looking for a project, this is something they might consider doing.

Volunteers are currently being asked to provide a meal — home-prepared or purchased — for the residents. Due to COVID-19, serving the residents is currently on hold until further notice.

The Zaban Paradies Center assists couples transitioning from homelessness to resettlement and independence by providing shelter, basic necessities, and counseling services.



HOMES AGAINST HUNGER: Due to COVID-19, this is on hold until we can determine how to proceed. Stay tuned for updates.

There is still a need for food to feed families and children. In lieu of collecting food, if you so desire, we ask you to make a monetary donation to the following. It will be very much appreciated.

COAT DRIVE: North Fulton Community Charities indicated they will be sponsoring this drive and will let me know the details in September. Keep an eye out for more information on dates for collection, etc.

GAN TAMID: So far this year, our vegetable garden has produced more than 212 pounds of food. The harvested produce is provided to North Gwinett Food Co-Op in Buford.

Planting is completed, although weeding is an ongoing and laborious job. Thanks to Debbi Eskenazi and Lesley Radov for being dedicated to this. Anyone interested in helping weed our garden is welcome to do so. Contact Lesley Radov at Iradov85@gmail.com for details.





BEANIES FOR PRE-MATURE BABIES: We will be mailing the completed beanies and octopuses to the Northside Hospital NICU. Our Knitting/Crochet Group continues to meet weekly and continues to create these adorable beanies and octopuses.

If you know of another hospital or charity that can use our handmade beanies and octopuses, let me know and I will contact them.

MITZVAH DAY — MLK WEEKEND: Rabbi Jordan continues to meet with the Johns Creek Interfaith Alliance on a monthly basis. He is working with them to do a group project, and additional information will be provided soon.

NEW PROJECTS — STAY TUNED FOR DETAILS:

Action Ministries: Virtual food drive similar to backpack buddies, but we wouldn't be responsible for a specific school and number of meals. We are thinking we might shoot for November in keeping with Thanksgiving or possibly in conjunction with a Jewish holiday, maybe early December just before Chanukah.

Individual families will purchase needed items and put them into gallon size bags called SuperPacks. This can be done as a Zoom project, so individuals will have a social outlet. It can be done with children/grandchildren or as a possible bar/bat mitzvah *tikkun olam*/social action project

CDT Outdoors Cleanup Day: Our goal will be to clean the CDT outdoor premises to include the pathway and meditation garden, as well as Gan Tamid (vegetable garden). This is still in the discussion phase. More details to follow.

Canine Assistance: This organization trains and places service dogs with people who have mobility difficulties, Type 1 diabetes, epilepsy/seizure disorders, and other special needs. They also place Community Service Dogs who provide therapy services to children and adults primarily in children's hospitals. They provide a Disabilities Awareness Education Program and K-9 Kids Reading Program for school-age children, as well as Animal Assisted Therapy services. There are many ways to participate in this program.

I appreciate and applaud those involved with the conception and setting up of this year's High Holy Days. It starts with wonderful and heartfelt videos of Elul: A Journey to the Days of Awe. The programming and collaboration with Temple Beth Tikvah, other rabbis, and speakers throughout Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur services is truly AWEsome. Thank you to everyone involved for all the time, effort, and energy that is being put into all the upcoming services. Although we will all miss being together physically, we really will be there, together, through the next best thing to being there — Zoom.

Which is exactly what I did with Dad and his 100th birthday.





The Caring Committee's ability to help starts with you! If you or someone you know could use some support, please reach out to us and let us know what's going


