The Educational Perspective

Becoming B'nai Mitzvah is an important milestone on a lifelong journey of Jewish learning. In addition to continuing to learn at TIRS or in day school and attending services regularly, we provide a variety of quality educational experiences to make the most of the B'nai Mitzvah experience.

B'NAI MITZVAH PREPARATION - GROUP

Enrollment Requirement

Parents are required to enroll their student in at least five (5) years of formal Jewish Education that includes 6th and 7th grade. Acceptable venues for this education are either Temple Israel Religious School or Charlotte Jewish Day School. Beginning in sixth grade, students need to be enrolled in TIRS, even if they are enrolled at CJDS. Parents commit to have their student meet a 75% attendance rate for their formal Jewish Education. Private tutorial does not qualify.

Post-Date Obligations

Your student(ren) must remain enrolled in Jewish Education through the 7th grade year and full-membership status must be maintained with Temple Israel.

B'nai Mitzvah Basics at TIRS

Kitah Vav (6th) students are automatically enrolled in B'nai Mitzvah Basics class. Temple Israel clergy will teach students the prayers, blessings and trope recited during Shabbat services. Students who are not enrolled in TIRS because they are participating in another educational program are required to participate in this class on Sunday mornings during their sixth grade school year as part of their B'nai Mitzvah training.

Shabbat Attendance Requirements

5th and 6th graders are required to attend at least 10 Shabbat morning services during the school year of September-May. Students may attend either the main service with at least 1 parent or Junior Congregation. Students can also get credit for attending Friday night services in lieu of attending Shabbat morning (up to 5 Friday night services can be counted towards fulfilling this requirement).

Seventh graders are required to attend at least 12 Shabbat morning services. In addition, during the final three months of preparation, parents and student should attend one Friday night and one Saturday morning service a month. This provides the students with repeated exposure to the service which helps them as they prepare to become a Bar/Bat Mitzvah. Students also get credit for attending Friday night services in lieu of attending Shabbat morning (up to 6 Friday night services will be counted towards fulfilling this requirement).

Recording Attendance

Attendance at TIRS and Shabbat services is recorded weekly and reviewed at the end of each semester. Although students are encouraged to attend the entire Saturday morning service, to receive attendance credit they must arrive no later than by the beginning of the Torah service at 9:55 a.m. and stay until the end of services. For the Friday evening service, your student must attend the entire service to receive attendance credit.

Attendance at a friend or relative's B'nai Mitzvah service will count towards the service attendance requirement. Students should pull their Shabbat attendance card from the appropriate box (Friday evening, Shabbat morning or Junior Congregation) and place the card in the corresponding box. The Shabbat attendance cards are located outside of the Sanctuary or in the Chapel, depending on the location of the service. B'NAI MITZVAH PREPARATION - INDIVIDUAL

One-on-One Tutoring with Cantor Lissek

When it is time to begin one-on-one B'nai Mitzvah tutoring, Katharine LaBadie, Clergy Assistant, will contact you to schedule sessions with Cantor Lissek. Cantor Lissek will meet with your student for 30 lessons in weekly, half hour sessions at Temple Israel outside of TIRS hours. Students may request additional lessons at the Cantor's discretion. Additional tutoring lessons fall outside the scope of the B'nai Mitzvah fee and therefore carry an additional charge.

Meeting with Rabbi Wolk and Preparing D'var Torah

Approximately three months prior to the ceremony, B'nai Mitzvah parents and student will meet with Rabbi Wolk to discuss the details of the ceremony and to ask questions. After this initial family meeting, the student will meet individually with Rabbi Wolk to work on his/her D'var Torah. The family meets with the Rabbi again in the final weeks leading up to the ceremony.

Bimah Rehearsals

Cantor Lissek will meet with students in the sanctuary or chapel during the month leading up to the ceremony. Families are welcome to attend the bimah rehearsals, and we ask that one or both parents attend at least once prior to the Friday Dress Rehearsal.

Dress Rehearsal

The clergy lessons culminate in a dress rehearsal with Cantor Lissek and Rabbi Wolk at 10 a.m. the Friday morning before the B'nai Mitzvah ceremony. If the B'nai Mitzvah is shared, both families attend a dress rehearsal the Friday morning prior to the B'nai Mitzvah.

Mitzvah Project

In the spring of their 5th grade year, students will meet with Alan Johnathan, who will approve their Mitzvah project as well as offer guidance and support. Each student is expected to complete a Mitzvah Project (a minimum of 10-12 hours) to demonstrate their commitment to Mitzvot and to help create a better world in their own special way. The form can be found in Appendix G in the back of this Handbook.

Commitment to Jewish Learning

Temple Israel offers teens wonderful and varied opportunities to stay involved after their B'nai Mitzvah year, including USY, Hebrew High, Teen Rock Band, tzedakah projects and our Madrichim program. (A 75% attendance rate in the Kitah Zayin class is required to join our Madrichim program.) The intellectual maturation that occurs during high school years allows TIRS learners to tackle Jewish issues and concepts at a level that will carry them into college, to maintain relationships with Temple Israel friends and to stay connected to our Temple Israel family community.

The Administrative Perspective

B'nai Mitzvah Fee

The \$850 B'nai Mitzvah fee covers the cost of **30** one-on-one tutoring sessions, private D'var Torah lessons, your student's siddur, a portion of the B'nai Mitzvah class retreat, B'nai Mitzvah Basics classes, administration of the B'nai Mitzvah program, materials for your student's simcha and a high-resolution video of your student's service.

To confirm your student's B'nai Mitzvah date, the <u>signed B'nai Mitzvah contract</u> and <u>at least a \$250 deposit</u> must be submitted to Katharine LaBadie in the Clergy Office, <u>no more than 30 days after receipt of the B'nai Mitzvah contract</u>. The remaining \$600 of the B'nai Mitzvah fee must be paid no later than September 1st at the beginning of your student's Sixth Grade year.

Date Assignment Requirements

- 1. The family is current on all financial obligations with Temple Israel.
- 2. The student is enrolled in Jewish Education (see Attendance and Education Policy).
- 3. The family returns the signed B'nai Mitzvah contract and at least a \$250 deposit no more than 30 days after receipt of the contract in order to secure the assigned date.

Synagogue Bulletin - Kol Yisrael

Temple Israel spotlights each B'nai Mitzvah student in our bi-monthly bulletin (Dec/Jan, Feb/Mar, Apr/May, Jun/Jul, Aug/Sep, Oct/Nov). Information about your student should be submitted 6-weeks prior to the applicable Kol Yisrael publication (example: For April/May B'nai Mitzvah dates, info should be submitted to Melissa Lefko by February 15, for the April/May publication).

Photography and Video

For use of the sanctuary, please arrange for your photographer to come either before or after the dress rehearsal (which is 10 a.m. the Friday before the B'nai Mitzvah date). A Torah scroll will be provided for you to use during your photo session. We ask that you not move reading tables, microphones, or other equipment in the Sanctuary.

During Shabbat, photography is prohibited in all indoor spaces Temple Israel and the grounds.

All B'nai Mitzvah services are recorded in high-quality HD. Within two weeks of your student's ceremony, you will be sent a link with the video of the service, which you may download and share.

Temple Israel also provides livestreaming of Shabbat morning services. Family and friends can watch in HD from afar on our LIVESTREAM.

Invitations

When designing your invitation please consult our Rabbi for correct spelling of Hebrew names and phrases. All Shabbat morning services begin at 9:30 a.m.

Temple Israel Invitation Policy

Every member of the B'nai Mitzvah class will invite each student in the class to his/her service and party (if applicable). The current list of your B'nai Mitzvah class will be provided to you 6 months prior to the simcha. Your guest list (of invited students) must be given to Melissa Lefko 6 weeks prior to the simcha to verify that you have invited every member of your B'nai Mitzvah class to your service and your party.

Behavior at B'nai Mitzvah Parties

- We expect all B'nai Mitzvah students to exercise appropriate, respectful behavior towards others and property:
- Your student must not engage with any alcohol, drugs or smoking.
- Your student must stay in the designated areas at all times.
- Your student must display respectful behavior.
- Your student must respect all property. Vandalism of any kind is not permitted.
- You and your student are to sign a Code of Conduct (Appendix H).

B'nai Mitzvah Sponsorship Opportunities

Shabbat Morning Kiddush Requirement

We require B'nai Mitzvah parents to sponsor the Congregational Kiddush following services. Everyone who attends services is invited to this Kiddush, and it is a mitzvah to extend hospitality in this way.

The family is responsible for providing Kiddush for 100 congregants (70 adults and 30 students), the B'nai Mitzvah celebration guests, the B'nai Mitzvah class, and their families. For shared B'nai Mitzvah services, the families are responsible for working out the cost sharing arrangement with their paired family for the Kiddush. Each family is responsible for half of the service attendees, plus their invited guests. The financial arrangement should take into consideration the number of guests the family has invited. The congregant count will be adjusted if the Rabbi determines the

Temple Israel provides a list of approved caterers from which families may choose. Please send your caterer contract to the Executive Director's office no later than 30 days prior to the simcha. All approved caterers include a 9% usage fee to Temple in the total cost presented to the family in their bill. B'nai Mitzvah families are responsible for providing a minimum of Temple Israel's standard Kiddush menu.

Kiddush when other simchas take place on Shabbat

It is possible that other families will be celebrating a baby naming or an Aufruf at services and we will make sure that each family enjoys their simcha. Should this be the case, the B'nai Mitzvah family has primary responsibility for the Kiddush. However, the other family holding a simcha is required to cover the cost of Kiddush for their family and guests, as well as any additional menu items added to the Kiddush.

Please refer to the Fee Schedule in Appendix D. The fees listed are guaranteed through 6/30/22. The fee schedule is updated every July to coincide with the Temple Israel fiscal year.

The Synagogue Perspective

Becoming B'nai Mitzvah at Temple Israel

The B'nai Mitzvah weekend at Temple Israel includes Friday evening Shabbat at 6:15 p.m. and Shabbat Morning at 9:30 a.m., leading Tefillot and Kiddush from the bimah.

What our students learn

Shabbat Morning: Students prepare to chant the maftir *Aliyah* from the Torah, chant the Haftarah (weekly reading from the Prophets), lead prayers, and give a short D'var Torah, a teaching and reflection on the Torah reading or haftarah. Students learn to lead Tefillot (prayers) as outlined in the Order of Service, Appendix B.

Parents and clergy work closely to customize the materials for students as needed in order to make each and every student shine to the best of their abilities. There is no expectation for students to read extra Torah but for those who wish to do so, the decision involves a variety of factors: their Hebrew reading and chanting abilities, work ethic, and how much time is left before the ceremony. However, if the Cantor and parents agree, materials for the extra *Aliyah* or prayers will be provided for the student. We do not recommend adding additional Hebrew one month out before the ceremony.

In addition, if other members of the family would like to read Torah, please let us know as early as possible so that we may reserve the Torah reading for your family member.

Attending Services

Students in our Temple Israel Religious School (TIRS) attend many Shabbat services and programs including Junior Congregation. A mandatory part of our program is the service requirement (see page 7). We encourage our day school students to join these experiences as well. We also encourage all families to come to Friday night services, holiday services, and services on Shabbatot without Junior Congregation. The year of their B'nai Mitzvah, all students are encouraged to attend each other's ceremonies and join each other on the Bimah to lead Ein Keloheinu. Attending services regularly will make your students more comfortable and prepared for their own ceremonies. Students log their service attendance by pulling the appropriate card from the box located outside the Sanctuary or in the Chapel or via the online Shabbat Service attendance form:

Sharing a Service

Occasionally at Temple Israel, we have the joy of celebrating two students becoming B'nai Mitzvah. This is a wonderful milestone to celebrate together. We encourage families to meet in the months

leading up to the day to help foster a sense of community. We are happy to make those family introductions.

Honors Form and Rehearsal

Families may select people to honor during the service. Any and all honors are optional. The clergy are available to answer any questions you may have regarding honors. One month before the ceremony you will email the *Honors Form* filled out with your honoree's names to Katharine LaBadie at KLabadie@TempleIsraeInc.org. Family members that are participating may attend the dress rehearsal Friday Morning at 10 a.m. the Shabbat of the Simcha. Photographers are encouraged to take portraits before or after the rehearsal and action shots during the rehearsal.

Greeters

At every Temple Israel Shabbat service, Temple members serve as greeters to welcome congregants and guests visiting our Temple. It is the responsibility of the B'nai Mitzvah family to provide greeters for their simcha.

Saturday morning:

- 1. Two greeters are needed for Saturday morning services from 9:30 10:00 a.m. For shared B'nai Mitzvah, each family will provide 2 greeters.
- 2. Greeter responsibilities begin at 9:30 a.m., so greeters should arrive by 9:20 a.m.
- Greeters should be Temple Israel members. Greeters should wear a nametag which will be in the Tallit box.
- 4. Greeters will hand out service programs to congregants as they enter the sanctuary.
- 5. It is the greeters' responsibility to ensure that congregants and guests follow these Temple Israel traditions and rules before entering the sanctuary:
 - All males are asked to wear Kippot.
 - All Jewish males over 13 are asked to wear a Tallit on Saturday mornings. Tallis is not required on Saturday evenings, unless ascending the bimah during services.
 - Head coverings and Tallit are optional for Jewish females. All women ascending to the bimah during services are asked to wear a head covering on top of their head.
 - Congregants should turn off cell phones and all other electronic devices before entering the sanctuary.
 - Tallit should be removed before entering the restrooms.
- Greeters should direct and assist any mobility-impaired person to the designated handicap seats in the rear of the sanctuary. Devices for the hearing impaired are available in the Tallit box.
- 7. During designated times, no one should exit or enter the sanctuary unless there is an emergency. Greeters should close the Sanctuary doors at the beginning of the Amidah during the Shacharit and Musaf services. These services immediately follow the introductory Kaddish and last until the end of the Kedushah (following L'Dor va Dor). Greeters should also close the doors whenever the Ark is opened and during the Rabbi's sermon.
- 8. Only students accompanied by an adult are allowed to enter the balcony.
- 9. Prayer books are available at congregant seats.

COVID Precautions-Subject to Change

Currently anyone entering Temple Israel must wear a mask at all times. In order to facilitate six-foot distancing, every other row in the Sanctuary has been roped off. We ask that families and guests seat themselves at appropriate distances from other guests. Candy distribution during the B'nai Mitzvah service has been suspended until future notice.

Respect for Shabbat

The Sanctuary is a sacred space in which a reverent atmosphere is expected. Please refrain from using cellphones or any electronic devices while in the Temple building. All men, regardless of faith, are asked to wear a kippah and adult Jewish males (and women are encouraged) to wear a tallit. Please encourage your family and friends to open the siddur and follow the service, sing with the Cantor and be a part of the service.

Parents' Speech

Parents have an opportunity at the end of the service to bless their student. Remarks should be 3 minutes and submitted to the Rabbi no later than 2 weeks before. Highlights of his/her character, reminiscences, and tributes to family members no longer living, are all appropriate material.

Program

Congregants and guests receive a program as they enter the sanctuary on Shabbat. The program lists the honors for the service and a brief summary of the service. If you would like your honors to be listed, it is necessary that the clergy office has the Honors Form a minimum two weeks prior to the date of the simcha. When two B'nai Mitzvah share the Shabbat service, both students' names will be on the cover in alphabetical order, and the honors of both families will be jointly listed on the back page.

Kippot

There are standard kippot available at the Temple entrance. Personalized kippot are not required. If you wish to order personalized kippot to honor the B'nai Mitzvah, then the following quantity of kippot is recommended:

- 1 kippah for every invited male guest on your list
- 1 kippah for each student in the B'nai Mitzvah class
- 12-24 or more kippot for the congregation

Please ensure the kippot are delivered to the Temple Israel office no later than Thursday before the simcha.

Bimah Decorations

Decorations are required for the bimah in the main Sanctuary. An arrangement in front of each of the two lecterns is standard. You have various options for these decorations – you can provide floral arrangements for the bimah (44 wide by 40 high) or you may use the silk floral bouquets

already present on the bimah, free of charge. Baskets of goods/items or books, which can then be donated, can be displayed in lieu of flowers. You may also include these decorations in the Social Hall for Kiddush if desired.

Throwing Candy

With the approval of the Rabbi, you have the option to shower your B'nai Mitzvah student with sweetness by throwing candy at him/her. The B'nai Mitzvah family designates 1-4 people (usually younger siblings or cousins) to distribute the candy. The cost of the candy is included in the B'nai Mitzvah fee.

The Social Perspective

Should your family decide to use Temple Israel's facilities for a post-service celebration, please contact Temple office staff first. Please note the following guidelines:

Use of Temple Israel Property

Any person or group using the Temple is responsible for leaving the property in the same condition as it was found. This includes cleaning and putting items back in their proper places. All items including food and decorations must be removed from the Temple within 48 hours after Shabbat ends. Please do not remove items until Shabbat has concluded.

The Temple Israel kitchen and custodial staff have designated responsibilities as Temple employees. Should you have need for assistance outside of your own event planning staff, please notify the TI office staff prior to your event.

Catering Policies

Caterers are required to hire their own staff. Deliveries are not permitted during Shabbat and Holy Days, beginning at 1 p.m. on Friday or the eve of a Holy Day. In addition, decorations and all arrangements must be completed by 1 p.m. on Friday or the eve of a Holy Day. Temple Israel staff can confirm when items may or may not be removed from the Temple.

Reserving the Leon and Sandra Levine Social Hall

When there are two simchas on one weekend, then the evening B'nai Mitzvah family has priority to reserve the Leon and Sandra Levine Social Hall for that evening. If, at one year prior to the date of the service, the evening family has not reserved the social hall, then the family holding the Shabbat morning service may reserve the Social Hall. A non-refundable deposit is required to reserve the social hall. Payment is due in full 60 days prior to the event.

When two B'nai Mitzvah take place on Shabbat morning, the reservation will be guaranteed to the first family who completes and submits the reservation form and the non-refundable deposit to Temple Israel. This is also true for reserving the social hall for a private Friday night Shabbat dinner.

Rules for Parties at Temple Israel

- 1. It is advised that parents hire independent security to help monitor their guests.
- 2. To ensure the safety and supervision of young guests, TI requires that for every 10 students there is at least one legal adult present.
- 3. All students MUST remain in the Social Hall at all times (except to use the restrooms).
- 4. No one is allowed in the Sanctuary.
- 5. Parents of the B'nai Mitzvah student are responsible for any damage to Temple property.
- 6. A custodian must be present to ensure the Temple is left clean.
- 7. Smoking is not permitted inside.
