(Croton-on-Hudson, NY) The Lorraine Hansberry Coalition, with generous support from the Village of Croton-on-Hudson, NY, has organized a two-week, four-event 60th anniversary commemoration of the Rally to Support the Southern Freedom Movement, which Lorraine Hansberry organized and chaired at Temple Israel of Northern Westchester* on June 16, 1963. The event was a significant moment in local civil rights history. Hansberry, renowned author, playwright (*A Raisin in the Sun*) and civil rights activist, was a denizen of Croton in her final years and is buried there.

1963 Rally to Support the Southern Freedom Movement: Over 1,000 people flocked to the small village of Croton-on-Hudson to hear task-force organizer Jerome Smith from the Congress of Racial Equality (C.O.R.E.), give an eye-opening, first-hand report about the state of civil rights in Alabama and Mississippi. Besides Smith, other speakers like Gene Young, who at the age of twelve was the second youngest Black American to have been arrested in Jackson, MS, gave emotional accounts from the front lines of the civil rights movement. Nearly a dozen representatives of various religious faiths joined two dozen others in sponsoring the event. Judy Collins, new on the music scene, sang folk songs along with Tom Glazer.

Thousands of dollars were raised to support the cause, and hundreds of people left the event with a new understanding about voter suppression in this county. Funds were used to bail protesters out of jail and to support boots-on-the-ground civil rights organizations. Some of the money went to purchase the station wagon that Freedom Summer activists <u>James Chaney</u>, <u>Andrew Goodman</u>, and <u>Michael Schwerner</u> were

driving in 1964 when they were captured and murdered for attempting to register Black Americans in Mississippi to vote.

2023 Rally: This year's gathering and rally will be held at the original site. <u>Temple Israel of Northern</u> <u>Westchester</u> has a tradition of promoting social justice. Participants of all ages will connect to significant local civil rights history as they explore the importance of equality and voting rights in the 1960s and today.

The multi-media event will include special guests: Croton's <u>Mayor Brian Pugh</u> will introduce featured speaker <u>Mondaire Jones</u>, U.S. Commission on Civil Rights and former congressman for NY's 17th district; acclaimed folk-jazz artist <u>KJ Denhert</u> will perform; <u>Dr. Carla J. DuBose-Simons</u>, PhD, Assistant Professor of History at Westchester Community College, will address "The American Civil Rights Era and Voting Rights"; and <u>Professor Ed Ginsberg</u> from Temple Israel. Croton-Harmon High School students will premiere their short film of interviews with Croton residents who either attended the 1963 rally or interacted with Hansberry.

This event will provide a rare opportunity to meet with, and hear from, award-winning photographer William Abranowicz.

Standing on Edmund Pettus Bridge in Selma, Alabama, in 2017, the site of one of the civil rights movement's most defining episodes,1965's "Bloody Sunday," Abranowicz was struck by the weight of historical memory. This experience inspired him to create and assemble a collection of affecting civil rights related images that became his book, *This Far and No Further*. Through stunning photographs of locations, landscapes, and individuals, he connects us with the civil rights struggles of the 1960s, which were the impetus for and aftermath of Lorraine Hansberry's 1963 Rally for the Southern Freedom Movement, and its living legacy today. He also underscores the importance of protecting and exercising voting.
