

# "The Old Shall Become New and the New Shall Become Holy"



# From the Rabbi's Desk

One of the most powerful verses in the Hebrew Bible comes from the Book of Esther. As Queen Esther laments her fate and expresses fear at the prospect of confronting Haman, Mordecai says to her:

For if you remain silent at this time, relief and deliverance for the Jews will arise from another place, but you and your father's family will perish. And

who knows but that you have come to your royal position for such a time as this?" (Esther 4:14)

Esther recognizes that waiting for "someone else" to step up and save the Jewish people is ultimately avoiding a responsibility and duty that she is morally bound to honor. She was made Queen, suggests Mordecai, precisely to be able to use her position to save her people. As you know, Esther risks her life and saves her people and becomes the quintessential Jewish heroine for untold generations.

Is there a message for us in these powerful words? I think there is. We can speak up against injustice and cruelty, indifference and hate. We can work to house the homeless, feed the hungry, clothe the naked, and give relief to the oppressed. Our actions make an enormous difference in the world around us. But there is more. Our communities are sadly filled with people who have the means to support their fellow Jews, but choose not to. As a congregant in a former community of mine once said, with great seriousness, "I have plenty of money, but what do I get by joining the synagogue? My motto is if I don't get anything for myself, it's not worth my while". Another former congregant said to me once, "I'll calculate what it's worth to me, and then I'll give you that in dues-take it or leave it". (I left it).

I have always wanted to say to such a person "Perhaps your great good fortune and means have come to you precisely so you can support your Jewish community, educate Jewish children, make sure that there is regular worship, and provide assistance to those who are in need".

Or, perhaps I should simply quote the Book of Esther; "Perhaps you have come to your position for such a time as this"?

After thirty years of the rabbinate, I think I have finally found the voice to say, "If you benefit from the presence of a vibrant, active, caring, vocal, and always present synagogue in your community, a synagogue that will be there for you and for others...then like Esther you have the obligation to step up, and step forward".

# President's Message

Dear Congregation B'nai Israel family,

"Sim Shalom Ba-olam..."

"Oseh shalom bimromav hu ya-aseh shalom aleinu... May the One who creates peace on high bring peace to our world and keep us in safety..."

We recite these words at every service, as generations before us did, with the earnest plea for peace and security for ourselves and our world. Despite this hope, Jews are ever reminded not only of the oppression of biblical times but how anti-semitism has persisted through the ages: in the Haggadah, in the Megillah, the Inquisition, Jewish immigration quotas, the unspeakable Holocaust, and the violent and intimidating acts seen at colleges and synagogues today.

The deeply disturbing and distressing rise in anti-semitism and the 'why now?' remains the subject of debate, yet the answers with which to respond are generally agreed upon: education, building bridges, collaboration, rejecting misinformation, maintaining community connections.

Congregation B'nai Israel is following that guide. Since its inception to the present, we have partnered with CHHANGE, (Center for Holocaust, Human Rights & Genocide Education) their programs and speakers. We are forging important relationships with our neighborhood churches and share meaningful services and projects. Rabbi Sagal serves as chair of the Interfaith council of the JCRC of the Federation of Greater Monmouth County. We continually support efforts throughout our area to enhance the lives of those in need. We are one with our brethren who are victims of racist and anti-semitic acts, and we strive to respect 'all who dwell on Farth...'

Nevertheless, our lay leadership is not naive to the potential for harm. To that end, we continue to consult with professionals to strengthen our security measures, seen and unseen, to maintain the safety and security of our building and our Congregation. We value our ongoing and very strong relationship with local law enforcement, who monitor our building and grounds regularly, and our security personnel presence is with us throughout Gan and SHMA hours, as well as at holidays, dinners, special services and community events.

Our services, schools, minyans, meetings, study sessions, cultural programs and activities are open. We look forward to the return of a fun-filled Purim Carnival, and by popular demand, another 2nd night Pesach Seder. We plan to celebrate all our new members (since pre-Covid) at a special dinner, will hold our annual Shabbat at the Shore, and stay tuned for more.

Mid-March, we will be honored to welcome Dr. Keren McGinity, Distinguished USCJ Interfaith Specialist as our Scholar in Residence, sharing her expertise on Conservative Judaism's broadening tent and becoming more inclusive as a movement.

We are vigilant and proactive and our community activities are not deterred. Plan to join us and share all that our synagogue has to offer!


# Second Century Campaign Update



# From the Education Director

### SHMA K - 6

We continue to see truly excellent results with our innovative Hebrew Zoom lessons. The pandemic taught us that individual attention, whether in person or on Zoom, is the best method for teaching Hebrew. Every student in SHMA grades 3 - 6 has been attending their own private Hebrew lesson for 15 minutes each week. Plus, we opened it up as an option for 2nd graders and many of them are on board. We now have five teachers engaged in the private lessons.

The students are enjoying their weekly Ten Minute Tefilah Time with Rabbi Sagal. Rabbi joins our Wednesday Mincha Service that starts our SHMA session every week. After we conclude the prayer service, Rabbi Sagal engages the students in support of our tefilah curriculum, this year all about Friday Night Shabbat Services, but the topics can take many tangents.

In our Judaics curriculum, time marches on. In the spring, students will be moving along the Timeline of Jewish History through the Major Prophets, learning about the teachings of Isaiah, Jeremiah and Ezekiel. Rebecca Barabas continues to produce class starter packets for teachers to use as they see fit.

#### SHMA 7th Grade.

7th graders continue to enjoy Margo's pizza and the Rabbi's text studies. We just completed a Unit that was called "Things you have to worry about that your parents didn't!" We covered gun violence, social media, gender issues and climate change. The next unit looks at Social Justice issues, especially looking at the topic of Jews of Color; reminding the students that Jews come in all hues, African American, Latinx, Asian, etc.

#### Aleinu 8th Grade

8th graders did an amazing job with the Blessing Bag Brigade project. Blessing bags are a collection of personal hygiene products for the unhoused and needy people in the region. Students purchased a variety of the items requested by the organization with the added bonus that one family member purchased everything on the "Wish List." On our visit, students learned more about the efforts to aid the unhoused and they assembled over 100 bags, and added a lot of products to the warehouse shelves.

As an end of year "Siyum" (Completion) the 8th graders will make a trip to the Weitzman Museum in Philadelphia in May. The visit includes a docent-led tour, dinner in Philadelphia and luxury transportation, all made possible through the generosity of Judy and Louis Preselaar, in honor of their granddaughter Maya Presser's Bat Mitzvah.

### **Rosh Chodesh Assemblies**

This new "Special" is being very well received. Kids enjoy the singing and the recognition of the upcoming birthdays each month. Rosh Chodesh assemblies give us the opportunity to teach about the Jewish calendar and the important structure of the Jewish Year. New this past month for Rosh Chodesh Adar, birthday recognition included a selection from the gift table made possible by Anne and Dave Green and their Ezra Committee.

### Israeli Dancing

Bob and Regina Feldman now lead our SHMA students in Israeli folk dancing in the newest Special Assembly added to our schedule. Once a month, the Feldmans, joined by some of their folk dance cohort lead the kids in some of the classics.

## Club Kef

This is our new Youth Group for students in 3rd - 6th grade. *Kef means fun in Hebrew and the idea is to get the kids together to enjoy activities together with friends. Coming up: March 26, a chocolate Seder and April 23, a celebration of Yom HaAtzmaut (Israel's Independence Day)*




