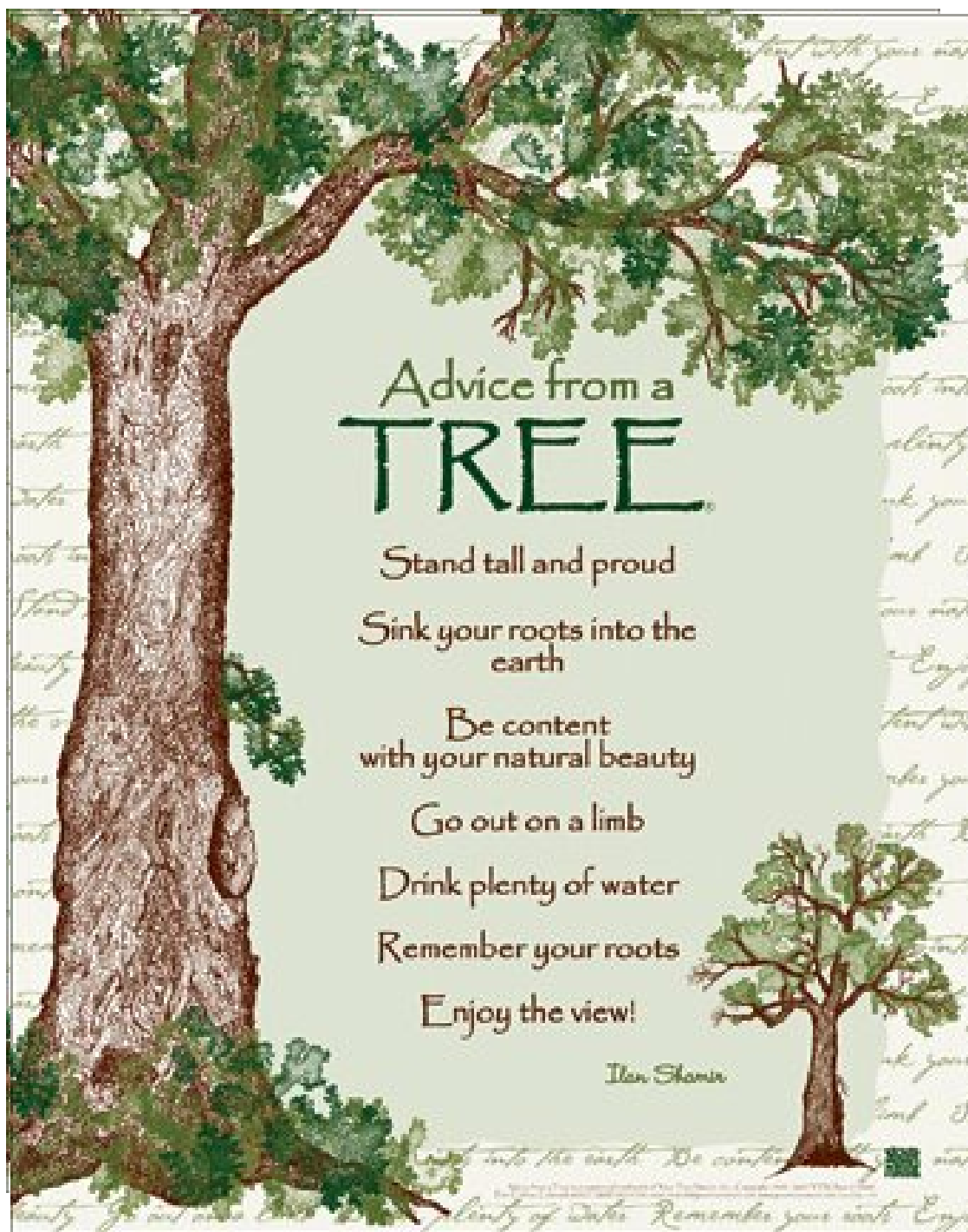

From the Rabbi's Desk

Jews live according to the rhythm of two different calendars - the secular and the sacred. To a certain extent, living by both of them leads to a kind of schizophrenic experience. The night of December 31 is an exciting time in one tradition, but meaningless in the other. And, at the same time, the first of Tishrei takes on cosmic meaning for the Jews, but has no meaning for the secular world.

According to the *Mishnah*, there are four different new years: one for kings and festivals, one for cattle, one for years (sabbatical and jubilee), and one for trees. On February 10, we will observe *Tu B'Shevat*, the New Year for trees.

In the context of the rhythm of our secular calendar, celebrating a new year for trees in the dead of winter seems, at best, incongruous. The trees around us are bare, their green leaves turn brown or fall off, branches sway perilously in winter winds, and winter descends upon us.

But, *Tu B'Shevat* reminds us that the rhythm of the Jewish calendar, our frame of reference, is ever present in our lives. Even though we may find ourselves in the dead of winter here in New England, in Israel, where is it also winter, the first and earliest harbinger of spring has already arrived. As that famous *Tu B'Shevat* song says, "*Hashkediah Porahat* – The almond trees begin to bloom and the sun shines."

In Israel, one can see the first hints of color that will fill the landscape in the coming months. Anyone who has spent the winter in Israel knows that the incessant rain can

drain the spirit and numb the hands. But *Tu B'Shevat*, like a strangely warm day in March, provides premonitions of better and warmer days to come.

After the barrage of secular holidays a few weeks ago, *Tu B'Shevat* comes along to remind us that we are Jews and that we are connected to our land and to our faith. As we continue in the new century and battle the effects of assimilation, *Tu B'Shevat* is a healthy reminder for the need to strike a balance between living in the secular word and finding meaning and sustenance from the spiritual world.

I think it would be a wonderful idea to keep this in mind as we prepare to celebrate *Tu B'Shevat* this year. If *Tu B'Shevat* is true to its secular date, it will, in all probability, be cold outside. But if we allow the sacred calendar of the Jewish year to work its magic on us, maybe, just maybe, we can imagine how good it will be to feel warm and for it to be spring-like, with almond trees on bloom and G-d's blessings descending upon earth.

Fast of the 10th of Tevet

Asara B'Tevet/10th of Tevet, which falls on January 7 this year, is a minor fast day in commemoration of the beginning of the siege of Jerusalem by the Babylonians in 588 BCE. After two years of struggle, King Nebuchadnezzar of Babylonia destroyed the First Temple, built by Solomon, on *Tisha B'Av* in 586 BCE. Thus, the 10th of Tevet became a day of national mourning and fasting. The fast begins at dawn and ends at night.

Tu B'Shevat

Hillel and his disciples declared the 15th of Shevat/*Tu B'Shevat*, which falls on February 10 this year, a semi-holiday. It is colloquially known as *Rosh HaShana La'Ilanot* (New Year for Trees) because, by this day in the land of Israel, the annual rains have ended and a new cycle of tree growth begins.

Tu B'Shevat is celebrated by the eating of various fruits, especially the produce of the land of Israel. In Israel today, schoolchildren plant trees and are treated with *bokser* (carob) to eat.

Religious School News

Happy and Healthy New Year to you and your family.

On Friday, November 15th, we all watched proudly as our students led Friday night services for our congregation, and friends from Temple Beth Emunah. Their skill and enthusiasm was evident. They will soon begin to prepare for our Shabbat class service to be held on Saturday, March 14th.

Our Chanukah Party was very enjoyable. The children recited the blessings, led some Chanukah songs, and performed a short play. Thanks to all those who helped.

The Tu B'Shevat Seder will be held on Sunday, February 9th. We will celebrate and taste many fruits, especially those grown in Israel. The Torah praises seven fruits: barley, wheat, figs, pomegranates, dates, grapes, and olives.

The older class is participating in a program called *Hebrew in Harmony*. We examine prayers, talk about their meaning, recite them, and relate them to our lives. We are finishing the first three lines of the *Sh'ma* and will go on to the *V'Ahavtah* after the break.

We are also involved in an interactive program called *Hebrew Alive*, a conversational study guide. The students have learned some basic skills such as how to ask a person's name and how to ask how they are feeling, and answer these questions. They are now learning to count to 12.

The younger children have continued to learn to read and write Hebrew. It is amazing to see how far they have progressed. They made hand menorahs and actual menorahs that they can use for many years to come.

Thank again to all who help make our school run so smoothly. Your help is greatly appreciated.

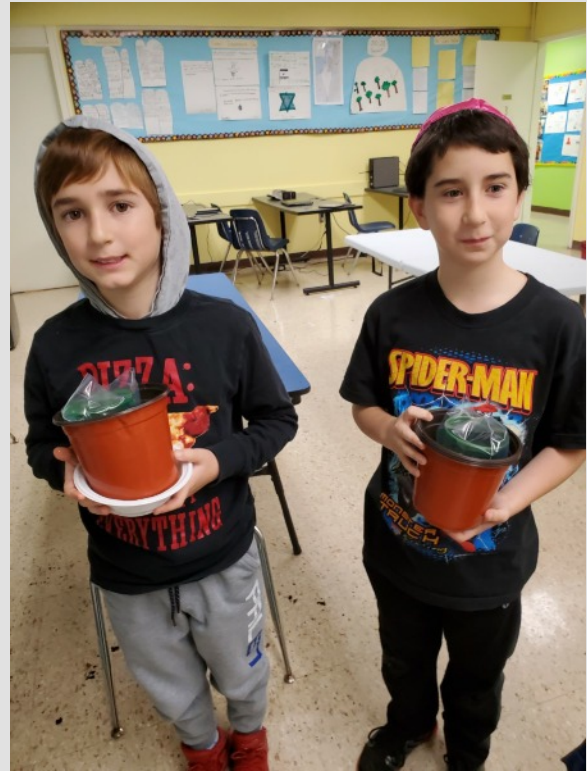
