As we begin a new phase of opening our doors, I now start to wonder that for the past

many months, the all-important question among our temple leadership had been how to create a meaningful and transformative High Holiday experience, in person and through live streaming, while at the same time keeping our community healthy? We took the task of creating a safe environment with the necessary protocols very seriously. At a time when other temples were making the difficult decision to move their High Holiday services solely online, we were busy brainstorming ways to give our congregants the opportunity to attend service in person, with occupancy limits for the sanctuary. We are so proud to say that ATC provided that meaningful holiday season, complete with well attended streamed services, where our members and quests worshipped while watching and listening to our most talented ensemble of Rabbi J, Hazan Dan Bauman, soloist Betty Bauman, and our Shofar musical director, Dr. Amanda Glickman. Even under these conditions, ATC was home to thousands of viewers, locally, across the country and Canada, and even globally.

From the Rabbi's Desk

A rabbi visited a woman in her nineties who was in the hospital.

The woman complained to the Rabbi, "Rabbi, I am in such pain from my arthritis. Why did G-d strike me with arthritis? My mother never had arthritis, and neither did my grandmother."

The rabbi asked, "How long did your mother and grandmother live?"

The woman replied, "My mother died in childbirth, she was just shy of forty years old. My grandmother, for that time period, lived quite a long life... until she was in her mid-sixties."

The rabbi answered, "Your pain is coming from your blessings. You have been blessed with over ninety years of life on this earth, but you must live with curse of arthritis." So often, our biggest struggles come from life's blessings.

It is cliché to say, "We simply must look at the glass as half full and not as half empty." Rather, we must be able to bless G-d for what we have in life regardless of whether we see the good or the bad. The mechanism that we have for this is *berachot* - blessings.

We have blessings for nearly every experience, for hearing bad news, for eating food, even for using the rest room. A blessing is both a 'thank-you' and a 'please'. When we say the *HaMotzi* over the bread, we both thank G-d *for bringing forth bread from the earth* and raise consciousness of those without enough food. The blessing after using the rest room reads: "Blessed are you G-d who has created miraculous openings and closings, that if not working properly would prevent us from standing before You in worship." This blessing thanks G-d for our miraculous body and reminds us (and G-d) of those whose bodies are not working properly.



One easy way that we can incorporate a little bit of Jewishness, recognition of G-d's blessings and a sense of spirituality in our everyday routines is by saying *berachot*/blessings over our food.

In America, we have an entire holiday dedicated to recognizing G-d's blessings - Thanksgiving. We can make this American Holiday into a Jewish holiday by both saying the *berachot* over the food that we eat and taking a moment to recognize the blessings we have in our lives. Our Jewish family celebrations need not be limited to the times on the Hebrew calendar. Thanksgiving gives us the opportunity to transform a turkey dinner into a highly spiritual experience.

From my family to yours, a most meaningful Thanksgiving.

Fast of the 10th of Tevet Tuesday, December 14

Tenth of Tevet (*Asarah BeTevet*), the tenth day of the Jewish month of Tevet, is a fast day in Judaism. It is one of the minor fasts observed from before dawn to nightfall. The fasting is in mourning of the siege of Jerusalem by Nebuchadnezzar II of Babylonia - an event that began on that date and ultimately culminated in the destruction of Solomon's Temple (the First Temple), downfall of the Kingdom of Judah, and the Babylonian exile of the Jewish people. The fast day is not related to Hanukkah but happens to follow that festival by a week. Whether the 10th of Tevet occurs 7 or 8 days after the last day of Hanukkah depends on whether the preceding Hebrew month of Kislev has 29 or 30 days in the relevant year.



Please note that as of this printing, Minyan, Kabbalat Shabbat and Havdalahs will be virtual. Saturday morning Shabbat services will take place in person, and be live streamed.





All this praying during the High Holidays proved to be good for ATC. In our third attempt, Ahavath Torah was awarded a Homeland Security House of Worship Grant. This Grant is enabling our Building and Grounds Team to replace our entry doors, add additional security to the windows, provide several added security cameras, and repair the entryway from years of neglect. We recently began work and hope all have driven by the synagogue to see our progress, which we hope to be finished by month's end.

Temple Beth Emunah has settled in to make 1179 Central Street their new home. A refreshed island sign now stands proudly showing a co-branded house of worship with not one, but 2 Congregations.

November is upon us and with our Re-Opening Team's guidance we are beginning to bring ATC back INSIDE to ATC. On November 11, ATC opens our doors to honor

Jewish War Veterans. Religious School will host our first Friday night Shabbat dinner and class service. Sisterhood returns with in-shul programs, while continuing to Zoom to members. 





Building our own Sukkahs

Shalom,

We can once again see the proverbial light at the end of the tunnel, and we are now ready to start re-opening the building for worship and events. The reopening committee has met and has taken into consideration all of the CDC guidelines while at the same time considering the health and well-being of our congregation and all who enter the synagogue. Therefore, the requirements stated below might even exceed the guidelines of the CDC and the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

While we are looking forward to seeing everyone in person, we want to remain vigilant and safe. Therefore, until further notice, everyone entering the building will need to adhere to the following requirements. These requirements exist for the safety and comfort of everyone who uses the building.

- If you are coming into the building, you are expected to do your part to not put yourself or others at risk.
- If you are eligible to be vaccinated, you must be fully vaccinated (regardless of whether or not you had COVID). Depending on the type of event, we may ask for proof of vaccination.
- If you or someone in your household is feeling ill, then you cannot come into the building.
- If you have been exposed to someone with COVID, then you are expected to follow the State's and CDC guidelines for contact tracing and follow up.
- Once in the building, you are expected to keep a face covering on unless you are actively eating, drinking, or leading services.
- We will be starting events up with limits on participants. These limits will be communicated for each event and must be observed. Events in the social hall will be limited to 150 people. Other participant limits will depend on the room being used.

We are excited to start welcoming people back into the building and look forward to see you there. Please let us know if you have any questions or concerns regarding these policies or upcoming events.




ATC Receives Security Grant

Ahavath Torah Congregation (ATC) of Stoughton has been notified by the Office of Grants and Research, Homeland Security Division, that they have been awarded, from the Federal Fiscal Year 2021 Nonprofit Security Grant Program, a substantial amount of funds. The award was recently announced through the Office of the Governor in recognition for ATC's commitment to public safety. The synagogue has been serving the Boston Metro South Area for over 127 years.

The grant will be specifically used to update and improve safety for the congregants of ATC as well as their visitors and staff. The scope of the project is to replace the existing entrances which are high risk and vulnerable areas of access to the synagogue with solid steel impact resistant doors and also to improve the existing accountable singleentry security system. The update to the security system will be accomplished by modifying the electronic keyless entry system with audio/visual doorbells and adding interior cameras along with adjustments to the existing video surveillance system.

The entire project should be completed by the time Ahavath Torah Synagogue reopens their doors to the public for the weekly Bingo Program on Monday evenings which is anticipated to restart in January. There will be more specific announcements in the near future.


