#### From the Rabbi's Desk

The most obvious symbol of Hanukkah is the Menorah (more correctly - the *Hanukkiyah*) and it is referred to as the Festival of Light *(Chag HaUrim)*. Yet Hanukkah is essentially a celebration of a military victory- one that could not have been expected. After all, it was the small non-professional army of the Jews led by the Maccabees against the mighty Greek Empire. Judah the Maccabee is so revered for his military prowess that a statue of him (they don't actually know what he looked like) is at West Point. His innovative guerilla warfare tactics vanquished his mighty enemy. Yet the *Hanukkiyah* still stands out as the most obvious Hanukkah symbol.

I think it has to do with our fascination with light. It is such a special and beautiful symbol and it lends itself to a myriad of interpretations. Light can supplant darkness and show us the right path. Light means education, culture and purposeful living. It has all the metaphors you could think of. One, which the Rabbis loved to focus on, was the fact that the light of a lamp remains undimmed even if you use it to light dozens of wicks and flames. The candles continue to burn just as brightly and warmly as they did before they were used to light another candle. The Rabbis liken that to a Mitzvah. When we give of ourselves to others we are not diminished, we do not really lose anything. We give *Tzedakah*, visit the sick, comfort mourners, study Torah or help make a Minyan we not only aren't diminished - we are actually strengthened. We feel stronger as a result of the *Mitzvah* we did. Think about it. You may be exhausted when you need to stop by a house to make a Minyan but when you leave you are exhilarated that you made the effort. We give generously to the causes that are dear to us and we feel better about who we are and about our community.

There was a great debate in the Talmud about how we should light the *Hanukkiyah*. The Academy of Shammai taught that we should start with 8 and then diminish the light by one each night. The Academy of Hillel taught that we begin with one candle (plus the *Shamash*) and we increase each night by one until all 8 burn on the final night. Hillel's argument obviously won out. Why? Because it is psychologically damaging to see

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things as diminishing rather than growing. expanding and Shammai may have been more scientifically correct in that the amount of oil must have diminished with each passing But Hillel was psychologically correct suggesting that a person needs to see his/her world as getting brighter and better with each passing day.



There is a very serious battle going on in the world today between good and evil, and we are caught up in it in every way conceivable. We are Americans and our country and our way of life is under attack. Concomitantly, we are Jews which means our concern for Israel has us in a state of great anxiety. Learn the lessons of the Hanukkiyah. Whatever we give for Israel and for our country will only serve to strengthen us - not to diminish us. Know that we are only at the beginning of the struggle. Just the first candle is burning and each successive period of time in this battle against the evils of terrorism will find us lighting additional candles. The Maccabees knew that the day would arrive when they would enter the Temple and liberate it from the 'heathens' who had defiled it. They just weren't sure what day that would be. We light the *Hanukkiyah* - adding a candle each night - to remind ourselves that whatever sacrifices we are called upon to make now will leave us stronger- not weaker - and the day will arrive when the light of freedom and peace will burn brightly for us in America and for our brethren in Israel. And when that happens it will burn brightly and the entire world will bask in the glow and the warmth of the light that it we will bring to the world by bringing terrorism to its knees.

#### From our President (continued)

First, may I say, Ahavath Torah IS a highly respected, conservative Jewish synagogue, in Stoughton, MA. I do not know your location, and if you are on the South Shore.

We have been a traditional conservative congregation for over 120 years. Our kitchen works under traditional conservative standards as well.

We are a synagogue based upon serving the South Shore of Massachusetts. As you mentioned 'upcoming events', here is a short list of our activities. -

- November 12, ATC (Ahavath Torah Congregation), hosted the American Jewish War Veterans, celebrating
  Veteran's Day, for a second time in recent years. Our attendees included, besides many Jewish War Veterans,
  members our Massachusetts Congressional delegation, several high-ranking military offices, from all branches, one
  of the last surviving Tuskegee airmen, directors of the American Jewish War veterans, and the Consulate General of
  Israel. The Consulate General has participated in several ATC events.
- November 5, ATC hosted a breakfast to promote "Stand With US", an Israeli based organization to educate American Jews about the Hamas-Israeli conflict and history. This event was sold out.
- AND in October, ATC has raised thousands of dollars to assist Israeli organizations providing medical needs and food to those Israeli families with families in need. In need, as we know it, are those families with members in the IDF, terrorized, or assisting families of hostages.
- In years past, ATC hosted Magen David and assisted to provide an ambulance, with "partial" donation by ATC members.
- ATC has a tremendous strong bond with Israel, hosting over the years Israeli dignitaries and events.
- When the IDF seized a boat carrying weapons from Turkey to Gaza, ATC hosted the Israeli Navy Seal Team.
- ATC celebrates Shabbat Across America each year. This year, on March 1, where we will have musical entertainment by Tufts University's Shir Appeal
- When our town's high school needed a 'quiet location' for testing, they called ATC for help. For many years, our social hall served their needs. When our Town needed a location for fund raising events, our Shul provided the necessary means, as their location.
- Each month, ATC provides food donations to Jewish Family Table, and twice a year, ATC has food drives for the Stoughton/Sharon Food pantry though ATC's Project Isaiah.
- Music and Comedy ATC hosted the largest contingent of Boston Comedians ever in one building: including Steve Wright, Bill Burr, Lenny Clarke, Chance Langdon, Jimmy Tingle. AND Blues bands from around the country. We actually are hosting it on December 2, which is listed as an upcoming event.
- As for Christianity and Christmas, Ahavath Torah Congregation does not celebrate this holiday, however, never has, nor ever will. Our office is open on December 25 (except Shabbat). 8 years ago, an elementary school nurse approached us to ask if we could help a family with no means to provide gifts for their children. Upon hearing this, our first and simple question was, "will the local churches assist"? Our answer was they do not. And to this day, they do not.



#### From our President (continued)

- That year, our members helped 50 Stoughton families that year, without questioning religion, so they had a holiday celebration, with food, entertainment, and gifts. During and after Covid, ATC continues to help families, with the assistance of Stoughton's first responders, The Shriner's Clowns, and numerous town folks (of many religions) to be sure families have a holiday celebration.
- This year, we will be serving some eighty families. We do not ask about their religion, but once again, there will be ATC and members of our community who will cry with satisfaction watching children receiving gifts their families could not afford.
- We do this event for our community. We do this with NO publicity from radio, TV, or print. It was decided at the beginning, not to promote what ATC does for our Stoughton families in need. We want to help, not make this a marketing tool.
- From this, our Stoughton Police department began a toy drive, where ATC assists in both donations and sweat equity.
- ATC provides holiday meals to our first responders, each year, as a thank you for serving our Stoughton community.

As for the trending issue of Anti-Semitism and the safety of our synagogue, we have upgraded our security systems, added new secure doors, provided better secure windows, and established 'safe rooms' for our Jewish members during services. The leadership provides armed security for all shul services and events.

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This is only a snapshot of ATC. Similar to your email, seeing a snapshot of our upcoming events.

As for myself, my family is a 34-year member and I am serving as president, for a second time (not term). I am a proud first-generation American Jew, raised Orthodox. I would not be here if ATC is Reform, Reconstruction, or tends to be leaning toward Christianity.



#### Stand With Us

On November 4, ATC had the privilege of hosting Charlotte Korchak, Senior Educator at Stand With Us, a non-profit pro-Israel education and advocacy organization established in Los Angeles in 2001 by Roz Rothstein, Jerry Rothstein, and Esther Renzer. #### The Fast of the Tenth of Tevet/Asarah b'Tevet

The Tenth of Tevet (Heb, Asarah b'Tevet) marks the day on which the Babylonian siege of Jerusalem began in the year 588 BCE, an event which eventually led to the destruction on the Temple in 586 BCE and the first exile from Israel. Though the day usually falls out near the time of Hanukkah, the two holidays have no significant relationship with each other. The Tenth of Tevet is considered a "minor fast" and orthodox Jews refrain from eating or drinking from sunrise to sunset on the day of fasting.

In Israel, the Tenth of Tevet has also come to be marked as a memorial day for the 6 million Jewish victims of the *Shoah. Kaddish* is recited on this day for people whose date or place of death during the Holocaust is unknown and that is how the date has gotten the unofficial Hebrew moniker, *Yom Ha-kaddish ha-kleli*, literally translated as The General Kaddish Day.

"And it was in the ninth year of his reign, in the tenth month, in the tenth (day) of the month, that Nebuchadnetzar, King of Babylon came, he and all his hosts, upon Yerushalayim, and he encamped upon it and built forts around it. And the city came under siege till the eleventh year of King Tzidkiyahu. On the ninth of the month famine was intense in the city, the people bad no bread, and the city was breached" (Second Melachim 25).

We see then, that the tenth of Tevet - on which the siege of Jerusalem began, was the beginning of the whole chain of calamities which finally ended with the destruction of the *Beit Hamikdash*/The First Temple.

The essential significance of the fast of the Tenth of Tevet, as well as that of the other fast days, is not primarily the grief and mourning which they evoke. Their aim is rather to awaken the hearts towards repentance; to recall to us, both the evil deeds of our fathers, and our own evil deeds, which caused anguish to befall both them and us and thereby to cause us to return towards the good. As it is said: "And they shall confess their transgressions and the transgressions of

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their fathers." (Leviticus 26. Rambam Hilchot Ta'anit Chapter 5). The aim of fasting, therefore, is to subjugate our evil inclination by restriction of pleasure; to open our hearts and stir us to repentance and good deeds through which the gates of Divine mercy might be opened for us.

Therefore, each person is obligated to examine his deeds and to repent during these days. As it is written of the people of Ninveh: "And the Lord saw their actions " (Jonah 3) . . upon which the Rabbis say: "It is not said, He saw their sackcloth and fasting, but rather their actions " (Ta'anit 22). We see hence that the purpose of fasting is repentance.

Therefore, the people, who fast but engage in pointless activities, grasp what is of secondary importance and miss what is essential. Nevertheless, repentance alone without fasting is also insufficient. There is a positive commandment of Rabbinic origin to fast on his day.

The tenth of Tevet can never fall on Shabbat and is the only public fast, which can fall on Erev Shabbat.
