MESSAGE FROM RABBI DAVID SPEY

I hope that this new year of 5782 has started well for everyone. If our community's celebration of our High Holy Days was any indication, this promises to be a year of firsts. While we welcome new experiences, we also build upon our past, both successes and "growth opportunities." For example, our very hybrid approach to the Yamim Noraim, the Days of Awe, providing a spectrum of modes in which to participate, in-person indoors, in-person outdoors, and virtually, was a creative and instructive adaptation from our past experiences to deal with new challenges. I sincerely hope that everyone was able to find their path to connect with our community during the Holy Days that was fulfilling and COVID comfortable.



Personally, I took the opportunity to approach my High Holy Day sermons differently. Given the new challenges like the heat for those who sat outside, and the knowledge acquired from last year like screen fatigue for those participating on-line, my sermons needed to be shorter than usual. Rather than writing four distinct sermons on different topics, I wrote four parts of a greater sermon. While each piece could stand alone, the intent was that they would all complement each other and create a whole greater than the sum of the parts. (I leave it to you to decide if I was successful and value your feedback.)

As this new year progresses, I hope that we can all approach our involvement in our Bat Yam family and the greater world in a similar manner. May we all be valued and accepted as individuals and simultaneously work together to make our community and world better because we are together.

FROM THE CALL TO PRAYER TO THE CALL TO ACTION By Melissa Comras (she/her), President

We go into the high holidays each year with the call to prayer. At some point during traditional Rosh Hashana and Yom Kippur services, various people stand before us and speak stories of the past, talk of the present, and dreams for the future. Why do we celebrate Sukkot?

Sukkot (Feast of Booths or Tabernacles) is one of the three biblically based pilgrimage holidays. It is an agricultural festival that originally was considered a thanksgiving for the fruit harvest. Sukkot are hut-like structures that the Jews lived in during the 40 years of travel through the wilderness after the exodus from Egypt. As a temporary dwelling, the sukkah also represents the fact that all existence is fragile, and therefore Sukkot is a time to appreciate the shelter of our homes and our bodies.

We celebrate sukkot with waving the lulav and estrog, by eating meals outside in the sukkah and enjoying harvest foods.

Sukkot is a great time to experiment with new recipes based on fruits and vegetables, and to try plant based eating.


CLOSE YOUR EYES AND HEAR HIS VOICE: BUILDING THE RABBI LITTMAN MEMORIAL GARDEN

A small and determined group of members have joined in developing plans for the Rabbi Lewis C. Littman Memorial Garden. It is to be located in front of the temple, just west of the patio and south of the walkway coming from the west parking area. It will have some benches for reflection, various plantings, large round mosaic stepping stones that were saved from destruction during our major renovation (refurbished by their creator, former member, attorney Jerry Schechter), a gravel walking base with imbedded slate and a natural berm enhanced with rocks and plants, along with a memorial plaque honoring Rabbi Littman. Mrs. Ahern teaching the fifth and sixth grade class about the Torah portions in the book of Genesis.


Next year they will tackle the book of Exodus.





Every day is fun at Baer Family Early Childhood Learning Center








