Shalom from Rabbi Chalom Are We Pluralistic?

Pluralism is a positive value, especially among non-Orthodox Jews. It means that we accept multiple options in Jewish life as valid and meaningful for their adherents, and that our approach may be right for us but not for everyone. 25 years ago, I wrote an article as a rabbinic intern titled "Pluralistic Judaism Means Referral Judaism." My key point:

The real challenge of pluralism, something that the mainstream debate has yet to take on fully, is the full acceptance of other forms of Judaism as equally valid as your own. This means....Referrals. If someone comes to a Reform Temple but is

really a Humanist, they should send them to us. And if a Conservative Jew, unsympathetic to Humanistic Judaism, wanders in our front door, we should point them in the right direction. It's really a strategy for successful Jewish life: niche marketing and giving the customers what they want and need. And if what you're selling doesn't interest them, send them somewhere else.

The difficulty is stopping yourself from arguing with the Jew who has found the wrong Temple. If you believe in your own brand of Judaism, why not try to sell it to everyone, even if it doesn't fit them? And for some temples, the drive for membership and dues is more important than the quest for finding a meaningful form of Jewish identity for all of those members....

On a moral, 'pluralistic' level, 'Referral Judaism' is probably right. On a 'Jewish survival' level, it is almost certainly right; if Jews are very different people, we can't expect one form of Judaism to satisfy them all.

If we want to be part of a diverse Jewish future, then we need to be good Jewish neighbors. And "referral Judaism" also benefits Kol Hadash, both by pointing potential Humanistic Jews in our direction and by enabling us to have clearer boundaries regarding our values, beliefs, and practices. A potential KH member who wanted to impose gender segregation in services would be changing who we are; we can direct them to Orthodox congregations that already reflect their values.

We live a pluralism paradox: we affirm the right of everyone to make up their own mind and find (or found) Jewish communities that reflect their Judaisms, yet we also affirm our right to be who we are as a distinctly Humanistic Jewish congregation. In other words, every Jewish family has the right to celebrate Jewish life as they prefer, but not all of those preferences will be consistent with Humanistic Judaism. If we were everything to everyone, always internally pluralistic bordering on undefined, we would not be ourselves.

A true pluralism allows different Judaisms be what they are in their unique approach to Jewish life.
