The Centrality of Temple

As I write this column a few weeks before it will land in your mailboxes, I imagine that many of you are like me – reading the news from Israel first thing when you wake up and then continuing to search for updates. Every day the situation appears more grim as escalation continues and there doesn't appear to be an end in site.

The same is true with our national news and my email inbox, which also paint a grim picture of increased antisemitism, fears for safety and the need for increased situational awareness and security. I worry for the safety, well-being and mental health of members of Temple as well as our community's family and friends in Israel.

But, as I struggle with those challenges, I also see how the strength of relationships and community brings to these difficult times, especially here at Temple. From an Israel Havdalah vigil to our Shabbat of solidarity; from Israel classes in person and online to conversations on Sundays with our high school students and individual conversations with other members by phone and email; from raising money for our community's emergency fund to grassroot efforts by members of Temple to raise money and purchase supplies for Israeli soldiers.

Seeing this and reflecting on it all makes me proud.

to demonstrate how wise our ancestors were in thinking about what a Temple should be.

Our sages believed the functions were threefold: to be (1) A beit tefillah – a house of prayer, (2) a beit midrash - a house of study, and (3) a beit knesset - a house of gathering. They realized that in difficult times, and in good times, a singular purpose would not be sufficient. Since October 7th, that has been even more apparent. We have seen and talked with more Temple members in this month post High Holidays than any other year of my 17 years at Shir Shalom. Temple

Having the additional space for prayer, for gathering and a space that was designed for study will be a blessing for us all and will help ensure that we not only continue to fulfill our threefold purpose, but that our physical space will allow us to meet all the needs of our community.

I see the thoughtfulness of individuals and the power of community. And it continues to demonstrate how wise our ancestors were in thinking about what a Temple should be.

There's No Place Like Home

I often share with others that I am so fortunate when I go to work. I am constantly surrounded by smiles, giggles, and play. The atmosphere feels busy, productive, and kind. Yes, I work in a bubble. It's as if the sun does shine even when it's cloudy and November in Michigan. This bubble is called preschool and every child that attends The Learning Center brings that feeling of wonder and awe.

With the war in Israel, please don't mistake me for a woman who wears thick rose-colored glasses. No shade of rose can color what is going on in the world. Parents coming into The Learning Center are more anxious than ever before. They worry about security. Many worry about how to talk to their children about what is occurring in our world. This is all understandable. It is not easy being a parent.

But here's the secret formula...it starts with the adults in the child's life. They are watching you all the time. You are their barometer to their sense of self and safety. Children mirror their parents' responses. Now is the time to take care of yourself first, just like oxygen on an airplane. Read yourself and listen to your own cues. Put limits on how much phone and news you are spending time with. Find what helps you be calm and present and get as many servings as possible!

When talking to your children remember their developmental stage. Consider what they might hear in elementary school. If there are older siblings, are they talking to the younger siblings? Each stage means a different kind of engagement. Preschoolers who are first born and not around older kids may not need any verbal explanation. They for sure need NO exposure to news or playing on phones. Preschoolers are seeing and hearing everything. Adults talking from the other side of the house doesn't mean they can't hear you.

Now is the time to take care of yourself first, just like oxygen on an airplane. Read yourself and listen to your own cues. Put limits on how much phone and news you are spending time with. Find what helps you be calm and present and get as many servings as possible!

Approach older kids by asking them questions: "What have you heard about the war in Israel?" "Do you have any questions you want to ask me?" Follow their lead. Just like you read yourself and your cues, read your child's cues. You know them better than anyone else.

If you haven't noticed, children have their own bubble; just like at The Learning Center. Ask if you can come in. When you spend time at home being present and playing with your child, I bet the bubble is even better and bigger than at school!



"Chanukah" or "Hanukkah"?

At this time of year writers are grateful to the translation geniuses who decided that Hebrew words, for the most part, are exempt from spelling rules. The word, חנכה, meaning dedication, has been spelled in most any form with one common belief — that it contains eight letters. Thus, you will find Hanukkah, Chanukah, and perhaps even Hannukah or Khanukah — All are correct.

Kindling the Chanukah Lights

Every effort should be made to see that all members of the family are present at the lighting of the candles. Everyone, no matter what age, may kindle the Chanukah candles.

The chanukiah should be placed near a window so that a passerby may observe the light. On Friday, the Chanukah candles are kindled before the lighting of the Shabbat candles.

Candles are placed in the *chanukiah* (Chanukah menorah) from right to left, beginning with one candle on the first evening and adding a new candle each succeeding night. The *shammas* (Hebrew for "servant" or "helper") candle is lit first and is then used to light the other candles from left to right.

Chanukah Prayers

Facing the *chanukiah* you recite the following prayers:

Baruch atah, Adonai Eloheinu, Melech haolam, asher kid'shanu b'mitzvotav v'tsivanu l'hadlik ner shel Hanukkah.

Blessed is the Eternal our God, Ruler of the universe, who hallows us with mitzvot and commands us to kindle the Chanukah lights.

On the first night we add:

Blessed is the Eternal our God, Ruler of the universe, for giving us life, sustaining us, and for enabling us to reach the season.

After We Light the Candles

As one candle may kindle many others yet lose none of its own light, so Judaism has kindled the light of truth for many religions in many lands and still shines brightly to this day.

Each Candle's Meaning...

The first light reminds us that **God is One**. As God is One, so may we all try
to work together for the good of all.

Day 2 The second light is the light of the lamp unto our feet and a light to our path.

Tzedakah. Even in our greatest joy may we remember and give to those who do not have as much as we.

The fourth light is the light of *Family*.

May the togetherness that binds us today be with us through all of our tomorrows.

Understanding. May we grow by being not just understood but by being understanding as well.

Day 6

The sixth light is the light of **the**Jewish People. We are one people tied to each other by our history and our faith.

Patience. May we be a little more patient with each other and our world.

The last light is the light of **Shalom** (of **Peace**). Let there always be peace among members of this family, this community, this country, and our world. May we work for peace throughout our lives.

How to Play Dreidel



Why Are There Letters on a Dreidel?

The four Hebrew letters on the dreidel—Nun, Gimmel, Hey, Shin—represent the Hebrew phrase, "Nes Gadol Haya Sham," which means "A Great Miracle Happened There."



What You'll Need

- Two or more players
 - An equal number or gambling pieces for each player (about 10-15).

 Traditionally, hard candies, nuts, or gelt are used, but pennies, buttons, or plastic chips work well
 - A dreidel (spinning top) for the group

Rules of the Game

- **1.** Each player puts one or two pieces into the middle to form a "pot".
- 2. Take turns spinning the dreidel, with each player acting according to the letter which comes up after the dreidel stops. (When a player gets gimmel, they empty the pot, and then everyone tosses a piece into the pot to start a new round.)



3. The winner is the person who collects all of the pieces (or has the most after an agreed upon number of rounds).

Personal Armor

Scribe

In my High Holiday address this past holiday season, I mentioned that as Jews we can stand up to antisemitism by belonging to a temple and taking part in a strong united Jewish community. If you are reading my *Scribe* article, I suspect you share this view. At the risk of sounding redundant, it's one reason I feel that Shir Shalom is such a special and important

place. Well, I also believe that being connected to each other through shared religious values is personally enriching at every stage of life. The new Netflix documentary, "Blue Zones," takes this a step further by proving that shared religious connection is a factor for longevity. I've been wondering then, given these proven benefits, why as Jews are our affiliation numbers drastically diminishing. I understand that many reasons point to the way we live in modern society and how and if we take time to adopt age-old religious traditions. Maybe we assume it won't be relevant or we have a negative impression lingering from our own childhood religious education?

Lately, I've been thinking there is another side to this. I wonder if, for some, living with a Jewish identity comes with too much heaviness and danger? Certainly we are a minority

group that receives a disproportionate amount of hatred and violence. We've all felt it. In this Jews are not alone. But one difference is that we Jews can actively disassociate from our "otherness." Many minority groups don't have this option. My own daughter, Naomi, was just lamenting that both of her Judaic studies courses this semester at U of M are heavily focused on Jewish hatred. She was looking for courses that celebrate Jewish history and culture. Instead they are reiterating that our history comes with the inseparable, heavy burden of antisemitism. Even in Jewish Film Studies where, for example, she was looking to learn about Jewish creativity, the focus thus far is on Nazi-created propaganda films to negatively portray Jews.

Moving towards (rather than away from) our Jewish identities is the silver lining to our historic struggle.

I am certain that we have all experienced how draining this can be. But this brings me back to the importance of unapologetically engaging in our religion, community and culture. Moving towards (rather than away from) our Jewish identities is the silver lining to our historic struggle. It has potential to provide each of us with personal armor. There is so much beauty and meaning here to uplift us. Collectively, we certainly felt it during our moving High Holy Day services. In fact, we at Shir Shalom strive to find the celebration of our Jewish identities in all that we do (even with handprints hidden under new carpets, bike clubs and euchre tournaments). This coming fall and winter, we have such a fantastic variety of programs; each event and opportunity will provide you with a way to foster connection, joy, and purpose. I sincerely hope you will join me at some of these events. While you are at it, bring a friend so they, too, can partake in our Shir Shalom community.
