

At our Saturday morning Torah study class, we've been reading the story of the 10 Plagues. We're

taught that we experienced all the plagues because Pharaoh's heart was hardened. At first, God hardened Pharaoh's heart. As the story continues, Pharaoh hardens his own heart.

Commentators teach that God no longer needed to harden Pharaoh's heart because it became routine for him to say, "No," and it was too difficult to break from his established practice.

During these past two months of staying at home and not being able to do the things to which we have become so accustomed, it is easy to harden our hearts and to only see the challenges and difficulties. It is easy to feel paralyzed and not know what to do next because there's still so much unknown. And without an end in sight, it is easy to feel anxious, depressed, alone and to mourn all the "should've-beens" and the "could've-beens."

And while there is no set way to break from these feelings, our tradition does provide rituals for us to soften our hearts, to mourn our losses and to provide us with hope and a path out of these challenging times.

Upon awaking in the morning, our tradition is to recite a prayer thanking God for giving us our breath, returning our souls and giving us life. In reciting these words, we teach ourselves that matters

of life and death are beyond our control, as is the ability to control the events around us. We also recognize that life is a gift. Every morning, we pause and we force ourselves, even in challenging times, to see the good. What is one thing you see as a blessing? What if you paused every day to think of something good and thanked God for it?

When we celebrate a *simcha*, a meal is often part of these events. Why? Because food is believed to bring joy. We even have a meal of consolation after losing a loved one. From this, we can learn that doing something routine can help us through challenging times and bring joy to our

lives. What is one thing that you may not have been doing to which you can safely return? What is one action you can do that will help bring you joy?

We even have a blessing for times such as these known as the *Birkat Hagomel*. It is a blessing that one recites after recovering from an illness or finishing a dangerous journey. I look forward to, one day, gathering as a Temple community to lift our hearts together to recite these words. Until then, may you find and create your own traditions that will help you recognize the beauty in life and the joy of living.

Here we are at home. Still. As I write this, the current Executive Order is set to expire at the end of the month and we will see what the next one brings. We are still out of the building and have formed a task force to help guide us to plan for its gradual reopening and establish best practices. We recognize that despite the anticipated relaxation of some of the rules, everyone is going

to have their own individual comfort levels that will dictate their amount of participation. The only thing that everybody can agree on is that this will take time.

When the pandemic hit, one of my first tasks was to get in touch with the families who were planning upcoming b'nai mitzvah to discuss options. These families were given the choice of either picking a new date for the mitzvah, or keeping the date and conducting the service in whatever manner we were using at the time. There was uncertainty in picking future dates – when would we be able to hold an event similar to what we used to think was a typical mitzvah? Some of those dates were rescheduled and have been rescheduled again. Having spent

a long time in the mitzvah industry, I know that most parents want to make the celebration all that it can be and there are still so many unknowns.

Ethan Frank was the first to decide to keep his date after everything went completely virtual. His bar mitzvah was scheduled for May 23 at a time that we were still conducting services from the homes of the clergy via Zoom and then livestreaming to YouTube. For his bar mitzvah, we added Ethan and his family to Zoom and were also able to include his grandparents from separate locations so they could have *aliyot* like they would have if we had been in person. It was the first virtual bar mitzvah for Shir Shalom and it went fabulously well! Mazel Tov to Ethan and the Frank family!

Ethan's bar mitzvah was a perfect example of what we are going to need to do as we transition back into the building and start to resume life as we knew it, tempered by our new normal. It will require caution, creativity, planning and some patience. The leadership and staff of Temple are up for the task and appreciate all of the support that we have received from so many of you.


Getting Outside

One important facet of SHORESH and Temple is relationships. Our online community continued to build upon those relationships.

As Summer begins, we are busy preparing for the 2020-2021 year at SHORESH. Our program will look a little different next year. But, with the help of Temple's Task Force, we are working to create a safe program based on developing circumstances that will enable us to continue to fulfill our mission of helping your kids love their Judaism.




