

From the Desk of our Board President— Kimberly Olker

As we approach the High Holy days this year, I find myself, again, reflecting on the past year hoping to gain insights and inspiration for the year to come. The year 5778 has been a difficult one for me personally, filled with many transitions.

At Temple Or Rishon, I went from Vice President to President, during a time when TOR was going through significant changes. We doubled the size of our campus through the acquisition of an adjacent property. The possibilities of this expansion are endless and exciting.

In my family, my eldest son graduated from college and moved back home. While we cherish the time we have with him, we know his destiny likely lies away from us.

The most significant transition this year, for me personally, has been with my parents. I came close to losing my father in March. While he has slowly returned to health, I've also watched my mother struggle with her own debilitating medical conditions. Over the span of four months, my siblings and I have had to take on the herculean task of assisting our parents with selling their home, getting their legal affairs in order, and moving them into an Independent Living apartment. Fortunately, they are now happy, working towards regaining their health, and thriving in their new community. I realize this is something many of us have already had to face with our parents, or will eventually face, but this has been an extremely trying and difficult time for me and my family.

Reflecting back on this past year, I recognize what most helped me get through this difficult period were two things: Family and Community. My immediate family provided comfort and support through this difficult time, while my siblings and I came together as a close-knit team, strengthened by our resolve to ensure our parents safety and well-being. We've never been closer as a family, though the


circumstances were obviously not what we'd want to bring us together.

I cannot express how truly blessed I've felt by the outpouring of support my family and I have received from the Temple Or Rishon community during this trying time. Your thoughts and prayers helped me get through the stress of multiple cross-country trips, intensive care and post-operative therapy visits, housing changes... The struggles of my personal journey over the past year reminds me of the importance of the upcoming High Holy Days.

Temple Or Rishon is a strong community. We are here to love each other, support each other, grieve with each other, celebrate with each other. Most of all, we are here to ensure all of us get through life's transitions. I am blessed and honored to have the TOR community as an extended part of my family.

How can we support and uplift those in our Temple family who are struggling? These are questions I will continue to ask myself as we enter into the New Year.

A holiday message from Rabbi Alan Rabishaw

Dear TOR,

I am deep into preparations for this year's High Holy Days, our 36th as a sacred congregation, and my 10th as your rabbi. We live, as they say, in interesting times—times that fill our lives with challenge, chaos and uncertainty. For me, and I hope for us, the messages of the High Holy Days, coupled with the community we share, have the power to fill our hearts and souls, and inspire us as we head into the New Year.

I am reminded of a teaching shared by Rabbi Shlomo Riskin, the founding chief rabbi of the Israeli settlement of Efrat in the West Bank, who would often use the metaphor of coffee to describe his ongoing struggle to love and live in Israel. When he arrived in Israel for

the first time in the late 50s, he learned that essentially he had two choices of coffee: Nescafe, which everyone called Nes (coincidentally, the Hebrew word for miracle), or Turkish coffee -- so thick that everyone called it Botz (the Hebrew word for mud) because the grounds sunk to the bottom and formed a thick sludge to be avoided as you finished your drink. And, so, he surmised, you get to Israel and your choice is Nes or Botz...miracle or mud.

Rabbi Riskin's teaching is not only about living in the land of Israel, it also illuminates for us the different perspectives through which we can see and understand the reality of our lives today, and what our world may look like in the future—

Nes or Botz...miracle or mud.

Of course there also has to be something in between--something between the miracle and the mud. And this, among other things, is what we will explore together during the High Holy Days . . . coming to terms with the reality of our lives, and strengthening the hope for our families, our Jewish people, and the world.

I look forward to sharing moments of prayer, reflection, community, hope and joy as we gather over the next month for Selichot, Rosh Hashanah, Yom Kippur, Sukkot and Simchat Torah.

To make everyone's High Holy Days experience meaningful, all services will start on time. Special thank you to our ushers who will greet you and help you find seating. Please remember that there are no reserved seats except for a few seats in the front that are set aside for service participants.

Additional parking is available at The Life Center on Creek Oaks Lane, across from TOR. If you can manage the short walk from the church, help us leave TOR parking for those who must park close because of disability, or other compelling reasons. Please remember that parking is not permitted on Creek Oaks Lane because it is a private road.

TOR will employ off duty Sheriffs to help keep our High Holy Days services safe and secure. These officers will be present throughout our gatherings. Your cooperation with tickets and parking will help ensure a safe environment.

Tashlich September 10th at 4pm

On Rosh Hashanah afternoon, September 10th at 4:00 pm, Tashlich (Hebrew for "Casting Away) will take place at the American River. Tashlich is an inspiring ritual that emphasizes the theme of renewal as we begin the New Year by tossing bread crumbs into the flowing water, symbolic of our desire to cast away our wrongdoings of the past and begin the year anew. Please plan to stay for our annual "Birthday of the World" birthday cake! Tashlich is appropriate for all ages. Join Rabbi Rabishaw, Mary Frank and their families for this moving ceremony and fun party.

Directions to Tashlich at the American River:

From Greenback Lane:

Take Sunrise Blvd. south to Fair Oaks Blvd. Turn right at Fair Oaks Blvd. and continue approximately .1 mile (1/10th of a mile) to Pennsylvania Avenue (the first street on the left past the bicycle shop). Turn left on Pennsylvania and proceed 2 miles to the parking lot at the entrance to the County Park.

If you haven't noticed, our latest Homeland Security Grant enabled us to make additional improvements to our security. We now have two additional light poles; one at each of the driveway entrances. We've upgraded our camera system with the latest technology and at the same time increased camera coverage. The new cameras are capable of capturing license plates and record all persons entering our premises in full HD video. Also new is our access control system, which eliminates the need for keys, but also records every entry when the premises are locked, mak-



ing it significantly easier for key holders. And while you may not notice it during the summer, the front of the building now has lighting, so you'll be able to find Or Rishon in the dark when you drive down Hazel. And last, there will be additional security training for our ushers for the High Holidays. And yes, there will be police presence during HHD services.



Temple Or Rishon is active in the Federation-sponsored Jewish senior program called Leisure League. There are two meetings each month; one at Einstein Retirement Center and one on the second Wednesday of the month at Or Rishon. If you're a Jewish senior, have a parent that's a senior, or know of a Jewish senior, please let them know that they are

welcome to participate. You don't have to be a member of Or Rishon to attend.

In August of each year, the Blumenstein family hosts a Federation-sponsored BBQ and pool party at their house. It's become a highlight of the Leisure League program for the last few years. This Summer, Temple Or Rishon underwent major changes in the way we track, arrange, and communicate information. We migrated from our previous database system (called Rakefet) and our previous website (hosted by URJ) to a new platform that integrates our website with our database system.

The new system is called Jvillage.

With this new system, members will have the ability to log into their account to make payments, change personal information, register for adult education and religious school services, RSVP for temple events and communicate with the TOR office staff.

Very shortly, you will receive an email with log in information. Please follow the steps in the email to log in to your account.

With this change, we have also changed payment processors. We are unable to migrate previous credit card data to our new system. In order for your membership payments to be on time, you must log in to the system and set up a payment schedule. Please help us complete this transition smoothly by logging in and completing the necessary financial arrangements.

If you encounter difficulty in this process, please do not hesitate to call the temple office for assistance.

Your TOR Account—Just the Facts:

- We have a new system for capturing payments.
- If you pay by credit card or automatic bank transfer (EFT/ACH) you MUST set up your payment method by logging into the new system.
- Payments will not automatically continue beyond August.
- Please check your records to ensure you are current in your membership payments.



Reflections from Camp Newman by Deanna Stilwell

When life gives you lemons, make lemonade. I have heard this expression countless times in my life, and it is incredibly fitting for URJ Camp Newman for Summer, 2018.

Last October, after many years in operation along Porter Creek Road in Sonoma County, a majority of Camp Newman's buildings were engulfed in the Tubbs Fire. Quickly after the depth of devastation was made clear, the board and staff persevered to make sure that Summer of 2018 at Camp Newman would happen. Campers eagerly awaited the news of an alternate location. Finally, the announcement came via an email with a video clip featuring Camp Director Rabbi Erin Mason. Camp Newman would take place at the California Maritime Academy in Vallejo. It would be known as "Camp Newman by the Bay".

So many concerns and questions arose. Vallejo? Where will we be sleeping? What about the food? Where will tie-dying be done? Will we have places for all the usual activities? What about cabin time if there are no cabins? It was clear Camp Newman's newfound spot had big shoes to fill. While this location clearly was not Porter Creek Road, we were assured by camp staff that it would be a great summer.

While many approached with caution, Camp Newman by the Bay appears to have surpassed everyone's expectations. Staff did an excellent job with all the details with identifying alternative locations for camp activities at the Cal Maritime Academy. The Beit Tefillah for Friday night services which once sat on a beautiful redwood studded hillside in Sonoma County was now on the lawn along the water overlooking San Pablo Bay. The Chadar Ochel where campers gather to eat and socialize found itself in the campus dining hall overlooking the Beit Tefillah area and the bay. Instead of cabins for 8 to 12 campers, there would be college dorm rooms. The Kikar, another large gathering area, would take over the school's quad complete with music and Israeli dancing on Shabbat and session songs on Saturday nights.

Aside from the task of working out new locations for Porter Creek Road activities, my heart has been most dazzled by the ruach (רוח), the wind, breath, or spirit, of the campers and staff. It is not the buildings or location which has made Camp Newman such a special place but it is all of the people who have shown up for camp and for one another following such a devastating event. Campers have come together to learn, to celebrate, to connect, and to

grow under the thriving backdrop of Judaism. We are reminded how life comes with many varied experiences. Campers this year are encountering firsthand how they can have resilience and find love and healing in their Camp Newman community.

It is going to be a long road to recovery for rebuilding Camp Newman at Porter Creek Road in Sonoma County. Witnessing the remarkable ruach of the entire Camp Newman community, I am assured that all will be well. In the meantime, we will keep on enjoying the lemonade.

Deanna Stilwell has been a TOR member since 2005 and is a volunteer Nefesh (mental health support) staffperson at Camp Newman. This is her third summer at Camp Newman.
