From the Rabbi



In our tradition we ask for forgiveness for two types of transgressions on Yom Kippur. The first type are transgressions between us and God, these are called *bein adam l'makom*. The second type of transgression are sins between a person and another person, *bein adam l'chavero*. The Mishnah, a collection of Jewish oral laws redacted in the year 200 C.E., states the following regarding Yom Kippur and atonement:

If a person plans to sin and later repent, he is not given the opportunity to repent. If he intends to sin relying on Yom Kippur to effect atonement, Yom Kippur will not affect atonement. Yom Kippur only atones for sins a person commits against God. If a person sinned against another human, Yom Kippur will not atone until he has appeased the victim. Rabbi Elazar ben Azariah derived this from Leviticus 16:30: "you will be cleansed of all your sins before God." Yom Kippur only atones for sins between man and God; for sins between one person and another, Yom Kippur does not atone until the offender appeases his victim.

There is no free pass when it comes to apology. We are not let off the hook magically by the arrival of a day; rather the time leading up to Yom Kippur needs to be a time of soul searching and soul cleansing. This cleansing only comes from honest self-reflection and examination. While it may be hard to seek forgiveness, do we not owe that effort to the person we have wronged? If they choose not to forgive, that is their choice, but asking for forgiveness is our choice.

Judaism does not make cleaning our conscience easy, yet it does make such work possible. It gives us a path, a direction and advice on how to repair the damage we may have caused on purpose or inadvertently. Yom Kippur is an opportunity to sweep the slate clean. However, it does require a great leap of faith and confidence from us to make things right.

There is another teaching in the *Mishnah* from *Pirkei Avot*, ethics of our ancestors, that says:

Rabbi Tarfon said: The day is short, the task is great... and the reward is abundant (Avot 2:20).

Asking for forgiveness from our fellow human being is indeed a great task, and not always pleasant, but the reward can be outstanding.

Shanah tovah!

From the President



I'm writing this near the end of my first month as President, and "so far so good"! July is a quiet month, which helps. But I also have the benefit of a great team to work with. Starting last Spring I've been meeting regularly with Rabbi, outgoing President Kim Math and incoming Vice Presidents Kathy Krechevsky and Harold Kramer. Over the Summer I've had many conversations with members of the board, past presidents and fellow congregants. A number of common themes have come up, and they fall into three main priorities I want us to focus on over the coming year.

The first is the need to reduce our dependence on membership dues. Close to 80% of our operating budget comes from these pledges, which means that any increase in our costs are largely passed directly to our members. Not all of us are equally able to bear these increases, and while we have never turned anyone away due to an inability to pay, we know we need to find a way to broaden our sources of revenue. The work our Endowment Committee is doing will continue to be an important part of this, as is the \$50,000 donations goal we've set for ourselves as part of our 50th Anniversary celebrations.

The second opportunity for us is to streamline how we operate. Between our Rabbi search and new office administrator, we've experienced a great deal of change over the last few years. We need to take the time to look at how we do the many "back office" processes that keep the temple running and make sure that we're doing the right work and doing it as efficiently as possible.

And most importantly, we need to make sure we are doing everything we can to strengthen the connections between TBD and our members. Connection is at the core of our mission and our principles, and if we get that right our other priorities will fall into order.

I'm excited about the coming year, and I'm looking forward to working with Rabbi, the board and all of you. Please reach out with any suggestions you might have, and of course we are always looking for people who are interested in lending a hand. You can reach me at president@tbdcheshire.org.



This means that we are now in *Devarim* (Words) or *Deuteronomy* (The Second Telling), the last book of the *Torah*. It's all downhill from now to the High Holy Days and *Simchat Torah*.

We now convene every Saturday morning at **8:45 AM** for bagels plus. In that way we can have a full hour of study starting at 9:00 AM and not have to talk with our mouths full! The size of our study group varies, but we always have a great group for exciting discussion. Come join us!


