### From the Rabbi



How do I measure success? For me it is how much I can help a congregant along on their Jewish journey. In many jobs we are trained to employ a customer service model to determine how well we are doing. I know in my life I have often gauged success by counting the number of participants that attend events and the total number of congregants a congregation has in their membership.

The problem with measuring success solely on numbers is that numbers reflect only quantity and not quality. However, there is a way to measure quality of the experience of an individual congregant, not just recording their attendance. This model is one I like to call congregant success.

The congregant success approach is to think of our time here at Temple Beth David in terms of how successful our experiences are at Temple and not just on attendance. By utilizing this approach, it allows me, our staff, and the Temple to be proactive about your experience as opposed to reactive. It allows us all to take a long-term approach to our Jewish journeys as opposed to the short-term triage Judaism of tackling issues as they arise.

One needs to look no further than the past few months to see how we have become a success driven congregation. January saw us send three families to the Eisner-Crane Lake Family Ski Weekend. During this weekend we not only worked on our ski skills but deepened our connection to each other. Also, in terms of numbers we made up 10% of the families participating. We also sent eight of our teens to L'Taken in Washington D.C. to advocate on different social action issues. We participated over the Martin Luther King Jr. weekend in a communal worship with Mishkan Israel and other New Haven congregations. We went to Temple Emanuel for the Debi Friedman Memorial concert. We had eight men join for brotherhood's spirits and spirituality for drinks and jokes. There was also our partnership with the JCC which launched in January with a kids Yoga class on Mondays and Brushes and Boudreaux Night.

Again, it is not just the number of events or the number of people we have engaged, it is about the approach to the attendants at these events. It is about building a successful long-term experience for each of you. I am truly proud of all we have accomplished together and am looking forward to how much we will accomplish together in the months and years ahead.

## Update on youth programming

First where are we - as we had hoped, we've had one teen focused event a month beginning with Chopped in October, going to the New Haven Green on Mitzvah day in November with the blessing bags put together by our religious school, December cooking for Abraham's Tent,

and also doing a coat drive (teen led by Sydney Carim- an idea put forth by a teen and implemented by her!) In January, Rabbi Micah and Jodi Harris took 8 teens to L'Taken in DC (learning to do advocacy work - with a program run by the URJ -specifically the Reform Jewish Action Center, the social justice arm of the Reform Movement) more info about what is L'taken This program is for high school students so those with younger kids it is something to look forward to! Besides these teen geared programs, we should also note that a few of our teens are at TBD playing instruments with the adults in the Ruach Shabbat service which is awesome to see. Next service is Feb. 9 so please make sure to attend and support them! And also we need to remember the record number of madrachim (teen aides) at Religious School. Our teens are an integral part of life at TBD but we want to do more to engage them.

So where do we hope to go for the rest of the year? Jodi Harris, Mindy Fricke, and Rabbi Ellenson met recently to brainstorm more social/fun activities that may entice greater participation. We discussed having events for two groups, grades 6-8 and grades 9-12. We have a great core group of younger kids and we are making progress to build relationships the older teens so we want to give this a try. We have a plan to do 2-4 activities for each group between February and May. Ambitious? Yes, but we think it can happen. We will take care of getting the events on the calendar and then will definitely need help to implement them. Just to share a few subject to availability of locales - (go to an Escape Room, do a limo scavenger hunt, a day trip to NYC, and a sports night perhaps at the JCC. We are also hoping to see our 8-12 graders participate in regional events with NFTY that are coming up. As we strengthen our TBD youth community we hope to increase their willingness to branch out to the greater Jewish community. I know that some older teens are members of BBYO which is great but doesn't preclude anyone from doing a TBD event and/or a NFTY event as well! Let's fill up their social calendars with Jewish youth events!


## Torah Study




