Weekly and Monthly Learning and Discussion

Tanakh (Bible) Talks

A weekly and lively time for discussions on and around Biblical texts, current events, and everything we are inspired to discuss.

Going on for two decades, still having much to learn and discuss!

We begin with a Jewish text to start our discussion on the topic it presents, and on the many more matters that we bring to the text from our own perspectives, life experiences, and current events around us.

All texts are provided, in English, and there is no previous experience needed - Open to all, led by Rabbi Ariel Edery, all **Mondays from 10:30 – noon**.

Adult Hebrew is Returning!

By popular demand, Beth Shalom will offer a new **Adult Hebrew** class, starting right after the High Holy Days. The class, taught by Rabbi Mike Stevens, will meet on Zoom on **Sunday mornings, from 10:00-11:30 a.m., from September 19 through December 19.**

No previous knowledge of Hebrew is required. The class is open to beginning students, as well as those who would like to brush up on their skills; students in our previous Adult Hebrew classes are invited to take the course as a refresher, or “drop in” at any time. At the end of the course, students will be able to read Hebrew fluently, will be able to follow along and participate in a Shabbat service, and will have a prayer vocabulary of about a hundred words.

Each session of the course will be recorded, to help students practice their reading between classes, and Mike is always available by phone, on FaceTime, or on Zoom to practice with you.

The book we use for the course is *Learn Hebrew Today: Alef-Bet for Adults*, by Paul Michael Yedwab and Howard I. Bogot (URJ Press, New York).

Get to know, hear, and chat with real people who will share from their personal experience what it means to live in Israel.

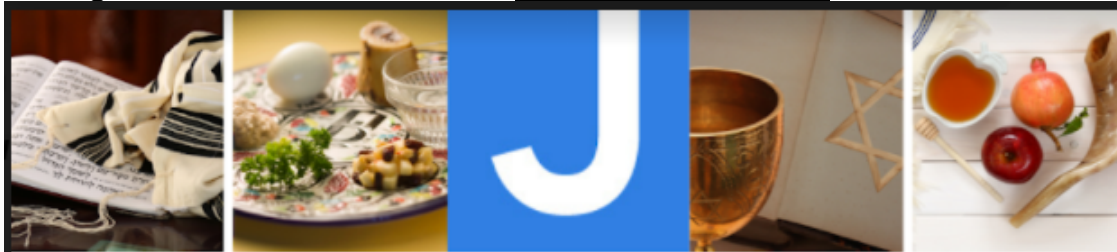
We envision each conversation as a piece of a mosaic – let’s observe each one, and we’ll see much better the fuller picture of Israel.
