Fall Holidays continue: A Season of Gratitude and Torah

Dear Temple Family,

It was so wonderful to join together with you to celebrate our High Holy Days last month. While our holiday observances have been unlike any other, we were still able to join in prayer, worship, celebration, memory, and reflection. As we continue through the Hebrew month of Tishrei, two of our four fall holidays remain: Sukkot and Simchat Torah.

Sukkot, which we as a Temple family will observe in conjunction with Friday night services at 5:30pm on October 2, is our fall harvest festival. We celebrate the bounty of our earth and the blessings of having enough to eat. Of course, the Berkshires and the changing fall foliage provide a beautiful backdrop to celebrate this holiday. I encourage you to get outside in any way that you can and give thanks for the changing seasons!

Additionally, this is a time of year when we consider the gifts that we have and how we might share with those in need. We are grateful to PFTY for continuing to coordinate our annual High Holy Day food drive, and to the many of you that participated again this year.

We are also so blessed that Janie and Larry Pellish, our social action chairs, are once again our able leaders in our food drive for the Thanksgiving Angels project. This year, we've been asked to collect cans of green beans. There is no better way to link Sukkot, the Jewish festival of giving thanks, with Thanksgiving, the secular observance of gratitude, than to participate in this worthwhile endeavor! Like all of our yearly traditions, Thanksgiving Angels will look different this year, but the need for contributions is greater than ever.

Just one week later, we conclude our holiday season with Simchat Torah, our celebration of completing one cycle of reading the Torah and beginning again. Normally, we gather in our sanctuary to unroll the entire Torah scroll. Since we cannot safely gather to do so, we will meet virtually and celebrate in a new way. I'm grateful to Barbara Viniar, Hannah

Gellman, Andy Hochberg, and Lanny Zuckerman, who have stepped up to share reflections on a Torah portion that is meaningful to each of them. They'll be sharing their words of Torah, in honor of our Torah, at our Shabbat and Simchat Torah evening services on Friday, October 9 at 5:30pm. I am eager to hear what they have to share, and I hope you will join us to learn from each of them!

The next morning, Saturday, October 10, Gabe and Maddie Henner will be called to the Torah as B'nai Mitzvah. What luck that their celebration falls on Simchat Torah - Gabe will read the final words of the Torah for us, from the book of Deuteronomy, and Maddie will start off a new cycle of Torah reading from the very first words of Genesis. More information will be shared about how to honor Gabe and Maddie at this time. We send our best wishes and blessings to their parents, Nadine and David, older brother Alex (who had the same portion for his Bar Mitzvah), and of course to Gabe and Maddie for their flexibility and dedication to becoming B'nai Mitzvah during these unusual times.

Even as we head into the second month of the Jewish year, Heshvan, there is still much to do at TAA. After the bustling month of Tishrei, there are no holidays in Heshvan! That means it is a perfect chance to take a breath and refocus on what is core to daily and weekly Jewish life - joining together in study, community, and prayer. Shabbat services continue each and every Friday at 5:30pm; our lively Torah study group meets each Saturday morning at 9:30am. I encourage you to check out the other opportunities to gather detailed in this bulletin.

Finally, an additional note of gratitude for all those who made the High Holy Days possible - to our staff, lay leaders, musicians, choir members, youth, and to each and every one of you for continuing to put your sacred trust in Temple Anshe Amunim.

May our nascent year of 5781 be one of blessing, thanksgiving, learning, community, and peace!

L'Shanah Tovah!

To My Temple Family,

For my message this month, I'd like to share again my remarks from the first night of Rosh Hashanah:

It's an honor and a privilege to be able to speak to you this evening as your Temple President as we welcome the New Year. The High Holidays are the culmination of a period of personal reflection and self-examination that began a month ago with the beginning of the Hebrew month of Elul. While we perhaps focus internally more during this period, I think that the idea of personal examination is an ongoing process as we deal with the ups and downs of life, the challenges and the joys.

I reflect on the journey that I've taken in the past few years that has brought me to this place and time. I've only been a member of this Temple for about 4 years. Due to some personal changes in my life, I decided to join this congregation, not really sure where it would lead me. To repeat a quote from Martin Buber that Rabbi Liz made me aware of, and which I love, "all journeys have secret destinations of which the traveler is unaware." I knew that I would get involved in social action, but not much more than that. What I found was that the services, and then torah study, tapped into a spiritual side that I didn't know I had. I also found a welcoming community, with incredibly caring and dedicated people, that I wanted to embrace. I kind of dove in, with the result that I've found myself in the position as your president, with its challenges, but most certainly with its joys.

This Temple has a rich, 150 year history as a Reform congregation. Reform Judaism has always had an evolving nature, an ability to adapt to a changing society, while retaining its core principals. Right now, we find ourselves in an unprecedented time. Out of necessity, we are holding our services this year entirely virtually, but our values and our sense of community will prevail. I know that our beloved building is certainly important to us, as a place to gather, a place to find inspiration, a place to celebrate, a place to embrace one another. The Building, however, is not what makes the Congregation. It's the people, the community, the caring for one another that continues to go on in an even more heightened way. We may not be able to physically embrace, but there is no question that we have continued to strongly embrace one another. There is a reason that we refer to ourselves as a Temple Family.

I know that our services, and the entire High Holy Day experience, are going to be creative, meaningful and inspiring. I want to give thanks to all those who have worked so hard to put everything together, and to thank in advance all those who are going to

participate.

First of all, I want to thank Rabbi Liz. She has provided inspired leadership and guidance in the conceptualization, design and execution of all that's going to happen.

We're grateful to have Cantor Rachel Slusky join us once again this year, now as an ordained Cantor, to help bring musical richness to our services. That musical richness is enhanced by the always incredible work of our musical director, Alan Gold, and the members of our choir.

Thanks have to go to Yael Farber, who has been brought on board as a special project manager to help coordinate the many moving parts of this experience. Also deserving of thanks is Ryan Cowdrey, the technical coordinator of our virtual services who has skillfully woven everything together, and Cantor Jacob Harris, who provided audio mixing and backup vocals.

Special thanks have to go to our facilities manager, now also special technical jack of all trades Dave Wallace, for his work assisting those who needed it to make sure that all members of the Congregation are able to get on line and participate in the services. And special thanks need to be given to office manager/administrator Diane Koch, who does such incredible work making sure that myriad tasks get done and everything runs smoothly.

I also want to thank Mike Duffy and Hannah Gellman, who will be our shofar blowers; Deb Cole Duffy, Alba Passerini and Janie Pellish as Caring Committee Chairs who also organized our Drive Thru Machzor pick up day; and Zelda Schwebel for the beautiful at home "Bima" Flowers for Rabbi Liz.

Aside from the need to adapt how we operate in the face of the pandemic, our Temple has gone, and continues to go, through a period of transition as we continue to evolve to best meet the needs of our members, and those who are not yet members. We now have Rabbi Liz as our settled Rabbi, after 2 years in a transitional position. We are so lucky to have her as she guides us, leads us in prayer and in song, educates us, provides compassionate pastoral care, and so much more.

We have an evolving lay leadership, where we are also in a time of transition, with a combination of those who are relatively new, like myself, and those how have served in leadership for many years. I'm following Josh Cutler, who served so very strongly as President and who continues to provide his support and wisdom. Barbara Viniar, who like me, is also relatively new, is working hand in hand with me as Vice President. We have a strong management team that includes, besides Barbara and me, secretary Mike Duffy, Robin Rosen and treasurer Nan Gagnon. Along with the rest of the Board, we are looking to provide a vision and meet the evolving needs of our Temple Family and those who may become part of that

family, while continuing to be mindful of the past, of the rich history of this congregation. I need to make special mention of our members of the year, Andy Hochberg and Deb Cole-Duffy who, along with Josh and others who have been long time leaders, provide wise guidance and assistance with their knowledge of all things Temple Anshe.

I'd like also to mention the strong role of our social action committee, so ably led by Larry and Janie Pellish as it pursues the work of tikkun olam; the great work of Barbara Wasserman, as chair of the membership committee, with a number of new members recently joining; the work of Rachel Alemany over many years with our youth; and Alba Passerini and the house committee. Once we are back in our building, you'll be able to see that it's in the best shape it's ever been in.

If you're not already involved in temple life, or would like to get more involved, there are many ways that you can do so, whether it's through leadership, participating on a committee, or lending your talents to a task or two. We welcome your participation, your ideas and your energy.

We of course also welcome whatever financial assistance you are able to give. As you know, an anonymous congregational family has once again this year pledged to match \$10,000 in Supplemental Dues, and will continue to match dollar for dollar congregational donations up to \$15,000. We're well on our way to meeting these goals, so thank you for your continued generosity.

I wish that we could all be together in person to greet each other in our beloved building, where we will hopefully be able to return sooner rather than later, but please accept my virtual embrace and wishes for a sweet New Year. L'Shana Tovah Tikateivu - may we all be inscribed in the Book of Life as we welcome 5781.
