# Israel

My Dear Friends,

There is a war raging in the Middle East, and we are here, in the West - some of us feeling helpless, angry, sad, unsure what to think, perhaps disappointed by decisions that have been made, perhaps confused, emotional, fearful, outraged.

When the war broke out on October 7th, many of us were glued to the news – AROUND THE CLOCK. I had a ritual of listening first thing in the morning, I would read headlines all day between meetings, text my Israeli friends and family throughout the day, and end my evenings by watching the news until my soul couldn't bear it anymore.

Novelty is a funny thing though...it actually feels strange to use the word "novelty," as it does not seem exactly fitting, but in my loss for words, "novelty" will just have to suffice. As the war has continued, with



overwhelming bloodshed and pain, many of us, myself included, have stopped following the news as closely and as often. The "novelty" of the situation has worn off, and perhaps some feel jaded or withdrawn or even ambivalent about the situation in the Middle East. As we just passed the 150 day mark, we ache at the thought that there are still so many hostages in need of immediate release, our brothers and sisters in the IDF are serving on the front lines, and innocent lives on both sides continue to be lost. It is absolutely heartbreaking!

Many of my colleagues and friends have taken part in solidarity missions to Israel since the start of the war. Upon their return, they have shared that the Israelis they met feel that the world has failed them, leaving them to feel alone, depressed, anxious, and scared about the future. I know many of us as Jews, with the shocking rise in antisemitism, feel this as well.

Although many of us have experienced news fatigue, I urge us not to turn our backs on Israel. Not right now! And, by the way, if you fall into the category of experiencing news fatigue, I'm not saying you should go back to watching long hours of news. The news is traumatic and hard for many of our souls to bear!

For me, it feels exceptionally painful that our Israeli brothers and sisters feel alone in this war. It is up to us to ensure that we are showing our support every step of the way, even if we are feeling a little worn down or exhausted by the news.

So, what can we do for Israel, so that our brothers and sisters there know we are still beside them? Of course, we can still give monetarily – there is always a need for this. Feel free to choose your favorite Israeli organization and send a monetary gift.

I also encourage us to think creatively about other ways to show our support. Buy Israeli products! Do you love Bamba? Or Israeli chocolate? Support Israeli owned businesses online and in person! Write letters to the IDF soldiers letting them know how grateful we are for their service and that we are praying for their safe return to their worried families. Write letters of encouragement to victims of terror. If you are in a place in your life where you can go on a mission to Israel or volunteer on a farm in Israel, I encourage you to do so. And here is one we can all do - PRAY. I believe our prayers can be felt profoundly!



#### Israeli Misrepresentation in the Media

#### "Freedom of Press" in Gaza

There is no freedom of the press in Gaza. If journalists don't follow Hamas' guidelines for press coverage, they are arrested, beaten, and/or tortured. Guidelines like not showing Hamas in a bad light. These are not controversial statements – they are based on reports from Freedom House, Reporters Without Borders, Human Rights Watch, and others (Source: Honest Reporting).

So, when international media utilize Gazan journalists without the disclaimer that they are a mouthpiece for Hamas, it is incumbent upon respected news outlets and journalists to shine a light on those practices. Which is what occurred when it was discovered that Hamas employed photojournalists who accompanied them on October 7<sup>th</sup>.


That coverage resulted in lawsuits against international media outlets, congressional letters, and 14 states attorneys general to caution the media against providing material support to terrorist organizations.

Instead of investigating their own hiring and vetting practices, the international media's response was to attempt to discredit the very organization (Honest Reporting) that brought this to light!

Why does this matter? On Thursday, February 29<sup>th</sup>, there was a horrific incident in Gaza where over 100 Palestinians died trying to get humanitarian aid. Gazan journalists blamed the IDF for shooting and killing the hungry Palestinians. Despite evidence provided by the IDF that showed these people getting trampled to death and run over by the aid trucks, the international media rushed to condemn Israel. Again.

AP, Reuters, The New York Times, SkyNews, CNN, and others know that the news they are getting from Gazan journalists is compromised. It's tainted by Hamas' oversight. Yet, they continue to amplify and legitimize their messages. This puts Jews around the world in danger, and has led to attacks against us.

Attacking these news outlets for exposing their questionable ethics when it comes to reporting from Gaza, simply further discredits them as trusted sources for news and reinforces why their work is more important now than ever. And so is our financial support!

### Cyber Attacks

We depend on our computers and cell phones more and more each day. There are some important procedures to keep in mind as you use the

internet. If you use the internet, these *Cyber Attacks* can happen on any account at any time.

When opening email messages, only open those from a source you are familiar with. If you suddenly receive a message from someone you haven't heard from for a long time **DO NOT OPEN IT!** It could start out: "I thought you might like to see some old photos . . ." or a



message from a family member who needs money and is stranded in some far away location or in jail. The message from a prince who found some money in your name is not used much anymore as they have new methods. It could be from FEDEX, UPS, Amazon, telling you they have a package and need your to confirm it, or need to make sure they can fix the problem, and they have suspended your account until you log on and use your password to clear this up. The same with your bank or store you frequent.

These are some of the ways someone is looking for a way to compromise your account and lead to much larger problems and loss of funds.

If you receive a message, contact the sender and ask if they sent it, or report what has happened, but **DO NOT OPEN THE EMAIL**.
