

Joseph, Son of Jacob



Born in the Mesopotamian town of Haran, to his parents Jacob and Rachel. Jacob displayed extra affection to Joseph, who was born to his father's old age, when presenting him with a specially-crafted garment. This prompted feelings of jealousy within his brothers. These ill feelings exacerbated when Joseph repeated two of his dreams to them, in which he was portrayed as ruling over his brothers.

One day, Jacob instructed Joseph to visit his brothers. Little did he know that this would be the last time he would see his dear son, until their reunion a long twenty-two years later. Seizing their chance, the brothers threw the unsuspecting Joseph into a pit. A short while later they spotted an Arab caravan passing the scene, and the brothers sold Joseph to the traders. He was eventually brought to Egypt, where he was sold to Potiphar, one of Pharaoh's ministers.

For a while, things started to look up for young Joseph. Divine success enabled him to find favor in his master's eyes, and he was appointed head of Potiphar's estate. However, this would not last for long.

Attracted by his handsome looks, Potiphar's wife desired to be intimate with him. To her consternation, Joseph continuously refused. One day, when no one was home other than the two of them, the mistress grasped Joseph's garment, demanding that he consent. Thinking quickly, Joseph slid out of his cloak and ran outside displaying high self-control.

But Potiphar's wife turned the tables on Joseph, telling her husband that it was Joseph who had tried to entice her. The angry master reacted by placing his trustworthy assistant in prison.

Joseph's charisma followed him to prison as well, and the warden soon appointed him as his right-hand man. In time, his unique qualities expressed themselves in an additional area: when the king's royal

cupbearer and baker were imprisoned. Joseph successfully interpreted their dreams, correctly predicting that the cupbearer would be released and the baker

Two years later, Pharaoh himself envisioned two dreams, which none of his advisors were able to explain. Remembering the Hebrew youth from his prison days, the cupbearer suggested that Joseph be summoned. Joseph, then thirty, interpreted Pharaoh's dreams as being a Divine prediction for seven years of plenty followed by seven years of famine, and advised Pharaoh to prepare by storing grain during the first seven years. Impressed by Joseph's wisdom, Pharaoh appointed him as his viceroy, second only to the king himself, and tasked him with readying the nation for the years of famine.

While in prison with Pharaoh's ministers, Joseph notices one day how miserably unhappy they looked and asks them why they are so miserable? This may sound like small talk between prisoners but in reality, it gives us a small peek into who Joseph really is. After being sold by his brothers, pursued and imprisoned by his boss in the prime of his life - how would any of us feel if that happened to us? Anger? Frustration? Depression? I mean the guy spent many years in an "ancient Egyptian" prison. Nothing close to our north American prison system. But no, not Joseph. Not only is he not angry or depressed, his concern is with someone else's well being. He can't bear the sight of two people that are miserable in prison. It is that exact attitude that turned him from prisoner to viceroy. Not letting hate poison his heart, not even when betrayed by his brothers. His determination to stay positive and face all challenges brings blessings to him and to all those around him. And in whatever situation he is in, even in prison, he knows how to keep a smile on his face. It is his sense of mission in life, his trust in the divine plan that gives Joseph the strength to overcome life's challenges and ultimately becoming the first Jewish ruler of the ancient empire.



WORDS FROM RABBI WHITE MIQQETS 5781

Last week, I wrote of an important insight that I learned from my professor of Classics in university. This week, I would like to present a different type of lesson that I learned from another important teacher.

The year after I graduated from high school, I had the privilege of spending a year in Israel. Once a week, we were fortunate to have the great teacher Dr. Nechama Leibowitz come and deliver a lesson to us.

She had a wonderful methodology. She would demand of us to think: questions such as what was the problem in the Torah that inspired Rashi to make his comment; what was the real difference between Rashi and Ramban; what is strange about this verse, etc.

Very many years have passed, yet I remember and apply much of what we learned in her class. Here is an interesting observation from this week's parasha:

Joseph's brothers had come to Egypt to purchase grain. Joseph accuses them of being spies, and incarcerates them for 3 days. The brothers talk among themselves, and say that this is certainly a divine punishment, for when they had thrown Joseph in the pit, and he was begging them for mercy, they didn't listen. (Genesis 42:21)

However, if you go back to last week's parashah (37:24) it seems that Joseph didn't say anything when he was thrown into the pit. He comes across as stoical. We see from here that "the words of the Torah are poor in one place, and rich in another." Now, you might ask, why didn't the Torah tell us originally that Yoseph had been begging his brothers? Ramban gives 2 possible answers: 1) it's obvious that a young man would plead with his brothers to save him; 2) the Torah did not want to elaborate last week on the cruelty of the brothers. The Torah waited until now, when the brothers themselves finally recognized the seriousness of what they had done.

Whenever we read this parasha, I think of my class with Nechama, and how she inspired me and many others to think about the Torah and its commentaries.

CONGREGATION MAGHEN ABRAHAM THOUGHTS FROM MAYER SASSON ~ WHO HEARS PRAYERS

"...Take... in your vessels... and take double money.... And G-d the All- to the pleas of his brethren and help them as much as possible. limiting One grant you sympathy in the presence of the man...." (43, 11-14)

"From now on you are not missing anything except for prayer. I will pray for you." (Rashi)

Rabbi Avraham Yitzchak Shein, Torah Lecturer in the Tiferet Yerushalaim Yeshiva, asks – Why did the Tribes depend on their father's prayers and why didn't they themselves pray?

He explains: In the verse above (42,21) "After all we are guilty" - it is explained that the Tribes understood that the reason for their troubles was because they did not hearken to the pleas of their brother and save him; therefore, when they themselves needed mercy they thought that correspondingly G-d would not listen to their prayer. They therefore asked their father to pray for them.

From here we learn a poignant message for any person who wants G-d to listen to his pleas at a time of troubles - he should always be sure to listen

"As soon as the morning was light the men were sent away... Yosef said to his steward - stand up, chase after the men and ... overtake them...." (44' 3-4)

Why did Yosef have to tell his steward to chase after the men? Since they were going with animals loaded with burdens, certainly the job of overtaking them would be very easy?

Rabbi Hilel Lichtenstein of Kalamia explained: Since the brothers left early at dawn, Yosef understood that if he doesn't hurry to chase after them, they will have time to pray by sunrise and thus he would not be able to blame them for stealing the goblet – for our Sages have said concerning one who prays at sunrise that he will not be harmed for that entire day. Therefore he told his steward, "Chase after the men and ... overtake them" - before they have a chance to pray.
