"That's some new kitchen Rebecca just had done. State of the art!" "WOW. . . .

did you see the new car Isaac just purchased? Common conversation, everyday talk.

They tell of a sales representative on the road, who had broken all records for sales in his company. When asked the secret of his success, he explained that the first thing he said when someone opened the door was, "Did you see what your neighbor Mrs. Jones just got?" That trick never failed him.

This was never the Jewish ethic, however. We were taught differently, and our ancient value system is as relevant as ever in contemporary life. Privacy, modesty and discretion are all characteristics our people have cherished since we became a nation.

"Balaam raised his eyes, and saw Israel dwelling according to its tribes" (Numbers 24:3).

What was so special about the Israelites' dwelling? Rashi offers one interpretation of the verse, that the doorways of the Israelites' tents in the wilderness were arranged so that they did not face each other. That way, one person was not able to see into his neighbor's tent, and their privacy was protected. A possible interpretation of "not looking into your neighbor's tent" might be this: Do not look into your neighbor's tent to help you decide what you should be doing. Your decisions in life should not be based on what other people are, or are not, doing. Certainly not on what your

neighbors have or do not have.

Social workers today will painfully testify that family breakdowns are often a result of financial difficulties and the stress that these put on marriages. Many of those stresses are self-imposed. Their clients confessed that they didn't really need the new kitchen or the new car, but once their friends were moving up in the status stakes, they felt under pressure to maintain their social standing.

Why? All because we are busy looking over our shoulders or peering into the next -door neighbor's place.

The principle even applies to tzedakah. There is an appeal for the shul or a Jewish charity, and how do we respond? "Well, if so-and-so, who is a multimillionaire, only gave \$10,000, then all I should give is \$10!" What difference does it make what someone else gave or didn't give? You should give what you can, irrespective of what others gave.

How much resentment, bitterness and disappointment we would avoid if we didn't try to measure ourselves by other people's standards! We would be much happier people if we looked into ourselves and achieved what we could and should, without drawing comparisons with others.

If you want to enjoy the blessing of "goodly tents," or even just good housekeeping, keep your eyes and your nose in your own tent

THE "SHEHECHEYANU" BLESSING

Our Sages teach us that one should recite the "Shehecheyanu" blessing upon seeing a new fruit that renews once a year. Even if one sees this fruit in the hands of another person or on the tree, one should recite the "Shehecheyanu" blessing.

Nevertheless, the Shulchan Aruch (Chapter 225) writes that nowadays, one should only recite the "Shehecheyanu" blessing only upon eating the new fruit. The Sages discuss several reasons for why one should recite this blessing specifically when eating the fruit as opposed to when one sees it. The Magen Avraham writes that when one sees a new fruit and plans on eating it at a later time, one should only recite the "Shehecheyanu" blessing when eating the fruit, for the primary enjoyment of the fruit is when one eats it. Thus, it has become customary to always recite this blessing when eating the fruit.

Nevertheless, if one did recite the "Shehecheyanu" blessing upon seeing the fruit for whatever reason, one should not repeat this blessing when one eats the fruit, for the individual is exempted by the blessing he recited at the time he saw it. However, it is improper to deviate from the prevalent custom established by the Shulchan Aruch, which is to only recite this blessing when eating the fruit.

In any case, we see that the primary establishment of the "Shehecheyanu" blessing is for the enjoyment one has from the fruit, either when seeing it or eating it. Thus, if one does not derive any enjoyment from the fruit, such as, if one was served a new fruit and one does not particularly like this fruit and only wants to taste the fruit to see how it tastes or if the fruit is not yet ripe enough and it is bitter or sour, one should not recite the "Shehecheyanu" blessing upon eating the fruit.

Similarly, since the primary enactment of the blessing was for seeing the new fruit and the enjoyment this engenders, clearly, even if one eats only a small amount of the fruit, one may still recite the "Shehecheyanu" blessing since one is happy and enjoys the new fruit.

# WORDS FROM RABBI WHITE Huqqat-Balaq 5780

This year is being marked as the year of UN75, to commemorate the anniversary, on June 26, of the signing of the UN Charter. And that brings to mind a personal story:

When I was in elementary school, my Jewish school was connected to my parents' synagogue. One day, when I was 12 years old, and sitting in class, there was a knock on the classroom door: "Rabbi Poll wants to see Menachem White." Rabbi Poll was the shul's bar mitzvah teacher, who taught us to read the haftarah and put on tefillin.

As I got to the door, and was about to leave. my teacher, Mr. Harris, asked me what my parasha was. I said "Balag" (which is this week's parasha.) Without missing a beat, he began quoting by heart the first verse of the haftarah, from the prophet Micah: ve-haya she'eirit ya aqov be-qerev ammim rabbim ketal me'et HaShem "the remnant of the Jewish people will be in the midst of many nations, like dew from God." Now remember, my story takes place not that many years after the holocaust. So, Mr. Harris interpreted the verse: "after the destruction of the holocaust, the remnant of the Jewish people will be like dew in the midst of many nations." And Mr. Harris continued: the gematria, the numerical value of the Hebrew word for "like dew," ke-tal, is 59. And Israel was the 59th nation to be admitted to the United Nations!

Back in those years, we had great hopes for the UN as a force for good. How disappointed we are now!! However, as my great teacher Rav Soloveitchik said in his famous speech *qol dodi dofeq*, perhaps the UN was established, by Divine plan, for one purpose only: to recognize the State of Israel!!
