# **Parashat Beha'alotekha**

# פָּרָשַׁת בְּהַעֲלוֹתְדְּ

In this week's Torah portion, Parashat Beha'alotecha, Aaron is commanded to raise

light in the lamps of the menorah, and the tribe of Levi is initiated into the service in the Sanctuary.

A "Second Passover" is instituted in response to the petition by a group of Jews who were unable to bring the Passover offering in its appointed time because they were *tameh* ritually impure. G-d instructs Moses on the procedures for Israel's journeys and encampments in the desert, and the people journey from Mount Sinai, where they had been camped for close to a year.

The people are fed up with their "bread from heaven" (manna), and demand that Moses give them meat. Moses appoints 70 elders, to whom he imparts of his spirit, to assist him in the burden of governing the people. Miriam speaks negatively of Moses and is punished with leprosy; Moses prays for her healing, and the entire community waits seven days for her recovery.

The tribal princes did not include Aaron when they brought their offerings for the inauguration of the Altar. G-d reassured Aaron by noting that he had inaugurated the Candelabrum, which was just as important – if not more so – than inaugurating the Altar.

G-d instructed Moses to tell Aaron that whenever he would light the lamps of the Candelabrum, he should hold the fire to the wick until it remained burning steadily on its own. Spiritually, this means that when we "light the flame" of our own soul or the soul of another person, we should not just deliver some quick

inspiration and then move on. We should remain near, nurturing the soul's flame until it becomes a steady and self-reliant glow.

This reminds me of a marvelous story retold by Yehuda Avner in his best-seller, "The Prime Ministers". Yehuda Avner was an Israeli prime ministerial advisor, diplomat, and author. He served as Speechwriter and Secretary to Israeli Prime Ministers Golda Meir and Levi Eshkol, and as Advisor to Israeli Prime Ministers Yitzhak Rabin, Menachem Begin, and Shimon Peres.

In one of his visits to the Rebbe with Yitzhak Rabin, the Rabbi suddenly turned to him and asked; " Why have to come around to your Judaism"? Mr. Avner murmured a few words that he later somewhat regretted and waited patiently for the Rebbe's response. Raising his palm in a gesture of reassurance, and with an encouraging smile, he said, "Let me tell you what I try to do. Imagine you're looking at a candle. What you are really seeing is a mere lump of wax with a thread down its middle. So when do the thread and wax become a candle? Or, in other words, when do they fulfill the purpose for which they were created? When you put a flame to the thread, then the candle becomes a candle." "The wax is the body, and the wick the soul. Ignite the soul with the fire of Torah and a person will then fulfill the purpose for which he or she was created. And that is what I try to do - to ignite the soul of our people with the fire of Torah."

So Mr. Avner rose and took his leave, pausing at the door to ask, "My candle – has the Rebbe lit it?" "No," he said, clasping my hand. "I have given you the match. Only you can light your candle."

#### THE INSTITUTION OF PRAYER BY THE MEN OF GREAT ASSEMBLY

The Men of Great Assembly instituted the prayers and the blessings. They established the wording of the Shemoneh Esrei and decided on the phrasing of all the berachot, including Birkot Keriat Shema and Birkot HaNehenin (blessings recited upon deriving pleasure from something). They also instituted the recital of the three daily prayers, Shacharit, Minchah, and Arbit.

The members of the court of Ezra HaSofer, which was established in the beginning of the time of the Second Temple, are called Anshei Knesset HaGedolah (The Men of Great Assembly). This was the biggest court ever founded in Israel. It was comprised of 120 elders, among them prophets and sages, such as, Chagai, Zechariah, Malachi, Daniel, Chananyah, Misha'el, Azariah, Nechemiah the son of Chachaliah, Mordechai, Bilshan, and Zerubavel, as well as many other sages, the last one being Shimon HaTzaddik.

During the time of the First Temple, Am Yisrael merited supreme spiritual accomplishments; the Shechinah dwelled in the Temple and the devoutly pious of Israel merited prophecy. Despite this, throughout most of the nation, grave sins including idol worship, forbidden relations and murder, were widespread and eventually caused the Temple to be destroyed and the nation of Israel to be exiled. Hence, when they were able to build the Second Temple, Anshei Knesset HaGedolah formed a supreme court, set boundaries to guard the laws of the Torah, instituted religious guidelines, and worded and arranged the prayers and berachot. They created a full framework for Jewish life which gave expression to the values of the Torah in an organized and established manner within everyday living, thereby distancing the nation from sin and bringing them closer to serving Hashem.

## WORDS FROM RABBI WHITE Beha'alotekha 5780

This Friday is 20 Sivan on the Hebrew calendar. This is a day that had particular significance for the Jews of pre-war Europe, but, probably due to the many persecutions they had endured, has been mostly forgotten in the past couple of generations.

In the year 1171, there was blood liable against the Jews of Blois in central France. This led to the burning at the stake of 31 (or perhaps 40) Jews. They had been offered their freedom if they would renounce their religion, but they accepted martyrdom 'al giddush HaShem. There is a tradition that as they were being executed, they sang in unison "aleinu leshabeah." Rabbeinu Yaakov Tam, one of the greatest Talmud scholars of all time, who was contemporary to this event, decreed it to be a fast day.

Subsequently, it was renewed as a fast day to commemorate the Chmielnicki massacre, when many thousands of the Jews in Poland and Ukraine were killed, in 1648/49. This is known in Jewish history as gezeirot tach vatat. (Estimates by scholars vary from 10.000 to 300,000 victims. Whatever the exact number, these pogroms and massacres demoralized the Jews of Europe, led to messianic movements, such as Shabbetai Tsvi, on the one hand; and to the popularity of Hasidism on the other hand (as the Hasidic rebbes were a source of encouragement to the mass of Jews.) Perhaps due to the many other tragedies that have befallen our people in the past century, very few Jews today observe it as a fast day, but it is still very important to keep it in mind; to recall the tragedies that befell European Jews, and to remember, that despite everything, we are still here! And we will, be'ezrat HaShem, get over this current plague, with renewed energy!!
