

Spring is in the air and Passover is upon us. For many Montrealers winter and spring is a time for travelling. There are many sunny destinations that when accessed make the long winter tolerable. Many of those destinations are exciting and even provide a Jewish touchstone. The old synagogues of the Caribbean or Rangoon are just a few examples. Of course, there are destinations which are exotic and have very little Jewish history or connection to our peoples past. These journeys are certainly fun and informative.

But there is nothing like a journey to a foreign, enchanting land which provides insight to a Jewish world that many of us know little about accompanied by tens of Jews from a variety of walks of life representing the Jewish tapestry of Montreal.

In past years, many joined my wife Muriel and I as we led glamorous and colorful trips to Morocco. Both my wife and I were born in Morocco, but these trips are much more than a home-coming. It is an opportunity for Jews of Ashkenazi and Sephardi descent to learn and discover this corner of the world that to this day remains a jewel of Sephardi Jewry.

One of the participants saw the trip as "not only an opportunity to renew some acquaintances but also to visit and tour the amazing country of Morocco." He writes: "the trip opened my eyes to the fact that Morocco was not only a place where these great sages, kabbalists and teachers had lived, but also a place where Jews fleeing persecution elsewhere had been able to come despite the considerable difficulties in-

The King of Morocco, Muhammed V was reported to have told the Nazi commander demanding a list of the Jews living in Morocco, "We have no Jews in Morocco only Moroccan citizens." This is the background to a

country which has hosted Jews for over a thousand years. The group will share not only the beauty and splendor of the country but experience the lives of Morocco's remaining 1500 Jews through their eyes. Morocco has taken wide-ranging steps to preserve Jewish heritage. Many synagogues and Jewish cemeteries have been refurbished and declared National Historic sites. Projects like the Moroccan Jewish Museum in Casablanca, keep sites and memories of Jewish life alive and safe. From Casablanca to Fes, Marrakesh to Essaouira, through the Atlas Mountains to the blue city of Chefchaouen the group will experience the eclectic sights, sounds and tastes of one of the most intriguing countries of North Africa. From eating fresh sardines in the ports of Essaouira, to praying the evening service at sundown in the Sahara Desert to the casbah, to the Kings palace and more, the country calls us from afar. From goats that stand on branches to carpet shopping and camel rides in the desert, Morocco awaits us.

But in the end, we will create our own memories and experiences and discover what it really means to travel Jewishly and travel communally.

# Chevra Shaas Words From Rabbi Menahem White TAZRI'A / HA-HODESH 5782

This week we read from 3 Torah scrolls: the regular parasha Tazria, the portion for the new Month of Nisan, and "parashat ha-hodesh" from Shemot, chapter 12.

The reading from the  $2^{nd}$  and  $3^{rd}$  Torahs is a wakeup call to all of us: Pesach is fast approaching. In the selection we read from the  $3^{rd}$  sefer (Shemot/Exodus chapter 12), Moshe is telling the people to prepare themselves for the Paschal sacrifice and for leaving Egypt.

The selection begins: "this month is the first of all the months." The great 13<sup>th</sup> century Spanish commentator Nachmanides (Ramban,) in his comments on Exodus chapter 12, points out that the month names with which we are familiar do not appear in the Torah. Rather, the months are

simply numbered beginning with the first month, which we know as Nisan. Thus, Rosh HaShanah, the beginning of the year, is in the 7<sup>th</sup> month! Go figure! You need a yiddesh kop to figure this out!

Well, according to Nahmanides, the answer is simple. We count the months from Nisan, in order to remember the great event of the Exodus, which happened in Nisan. This is modelled after the fact that there are no names for days of the week in Hebrew. Unlike English or French or Yiddish, which call the 2<sup>nd</sup> day of the week "lundi," or "Monday, "or "Montog," the Hebrew speaker says simply *yom sheni*, "the 2<sup>nd</sup> day." That is, the 2<sup>nd</sup> of the week, which will culminate in Shabbat!

The names of the months that we use nowadays appear only in the later books of the Bible, such as Zecharia, Ezra, Nehemia, and, of course, Esther. Why is that? Nahmanides quotes the Jerusalem Talmud that after the destruction of the 1st Temple, and the

subsequent return to Zion, we call the months by their Babylonian names, in order to always be reminded how HaShem brought us out of the Babylonian exile and returned us to the Land of Israel.

May we merit a full redemption, speedily in our days!

P.S. Here are the names of some of the Babylonian months. Note the similarities to the Hebrew names with which we are familiar.

1. nisanu 2. ayyaru (Hebrew iyyar) 3. simanu (Hebrew sivan. As our Iraqi friends know, the Hebrew letter v was originally pronounced w. And these two letters could interchange, since both letters are pronounced with the lips (bilabials.) 5. abu (Hebrew 'av: the sounds b and v are similar.) 6. ululu (think of elul.) 7. tashritu (think tishrei) etc.

Anyhow, whatever you call this month, have a kosher and happy Pesach, and may there be peace in the world.

"This is the teaching of the leper מצרע on the day of his becoming pure..." (14,2)



#### Where's his Torah?

On the words "This is the teaching of the leper מצרע on the day of his becoming pure" the Chovat Halivavot says that when a person talks slander about another person his mitzvahs are taken away and are credited to the person about whom he spoke. Moreover, the sins of the person about whom he spoke are transferred to him.

Accordingly, the Eretz Tzvi says, we can understand the Gemara that says, "He who forgoes the slights he received has all his sins transferred away." In other words, if a person knows that slander was spoken about him and nonetheless holds himself back, all his sins are transferred from him and put on the account of those who spoke about him.

Consequently, a person who speaks slander loses all the Torah that he learned and toiled over, for everything, as has been said, goes to the person he spoke about.

However, the Torah says "This is the teaching of the leper מצרע on the day of his becoming pure" – That leper מצרע who exudes a bad name about his friend שמוציא שם רע על חברו will have his Torah returned to him "on the day of his becoming pure" - on the day he repents and purifies himself from the sins of his slander.

### **Jewish Wisdom**

WHAT REQUIRES BEDIKA

Any place where one took or one's children possibly took chametz into, requires a bedika even if one took chametz there on an occasion (SA 433-3, MB 433-13, Kaf Hachaim-30). Examples: basement, office, car, attic, pantry, furniture, clothing, etc.

Many sages are of the opinion that those rooms that one sells to a non-jew do not require a bedika (MB 436-32).

HOTEL: One who goes to a hotel for Yom Tov is required to check his room. A bracha is recited only if one is there on the eve of the 14th (SA 437-1).

IF ONE FORGOT TO PERFORM THE BEDIKA AT NIGHT or was unable to perform the bedika on the eve of the 14th is required to perform the bedika with a bracha during the day when one remembers (SA 435-1, Shulchan Aruch Harav-1, MB-2). One may not engage in any work etc. as stated above prior to the bedika (MB 431-5,433-5).

The bedika is performed in the same manner as on the eve of the 14th (e.g. Bread, candles, etc.) (MB-4). The Kol Chamirah should be recited after the bedika is finished (Shulchan Aruch Harav-1)

If one realized that the bedika was not performed, the morning one must make the bedika but the Kol Chamirah is not said (MB 435-1).

If one recited the Kol Chamirah on erev pesach but remembered on Yom Tov that the bedika was not performed, on Chol Hamoed the bidika must be done even by day with a bracha. However, if the Kol Chamirah was not recited, one must perform the bedika on Yom Tov with a candle (MB-3). The chametz should be covered for it is muktzah "separated", or "**set aside**". (Shulchan Aruch Harav-2).

THE VISIT

Hillel responded "Veahavta Lere'echa Kamocha" - Love Thy Neighbor as Thyself' - the rest is commentary. What a wonderful visit
