

Yom Hazikaron to Yom Ha'atzmaut **Event**



On Tuesday night, we hosted a ceremony to mark the transition from Yom HaZikaron to Yom HaAtzmaut. The evening began with a touching tribute to fallen soldiers and civilian victims of terror, with the Israeli flag at half-mast. Charly-Marco Hadid and David Nathaniel recited Yizkor. Our ShinShin, Ariel Levy, then explained the meaning of the transition ceremony, eloquently describing how difficult it is for Israelis to shift from solemn and somber remembrance to jubilation and celebration, and how important the process is. He also expressed how special it was for him to bring the ceremony to our synagogue.

During the ceremony, Hazan Sheni Benjamin Harrouch sang "Shir Hamaalot Essay Enay," a beautiful

psalm about how Hashem watches over the state of Israel at all times. Juliana and Rebecca Salama read a poem about a flower in both English

and French translated from Hebrew. We were honoured to welcome a young and talented singer, Rachel Chemtob Stadtlander, who sang "Keshehalev Boche" by Sarit Hadad. *Lisette Shashoua* read a moving letter from the widow of a fallen soldier. We concluded with a performance from a group of grade 5 girls from Solomon Schecter Academy who sang the prayer for the Israeli Defense Soldiers. Ariel Levy then raised the flag, signaling the transition to Yom HaAtzmaut. He was joined on stage by the other ShinShin, and together they read

"The Silver Platter" by Nathan Alterman. Rose Simon Schwartz read the English version of the poem.

When planning the event, we expected it to be emotional. The readings that Ariel selected were particularly beautiful, and the songs were incredibly

powerful. The readers and performers exceeded our expectations. Their passion resonated in every word they said, in every note they sang. PERASHA KEDOSHIM - One Torah

"... and love your neighbor's well being as it were your own..." (19,18

In the gemara it is told about a gentile who came before Shamai. He said to him – Convert me, so you can teach me the entire Torah while I am standing on one foot." He pushed him away. When he came to Hillel the Elder Hillel gave him wonderful advice and said, "That which is hated by you do not do to another." This is the mitzvah of "love your neighbor's well being as it were your own" and "That is the entire Torah". This is what Rabbi Akiva says, "Love your neighbor's well being as it were your own" is a great rule in the Torah, for it is truly the foundation of the entire Torah.

We therefore find at the giving of the Torah "And there Israel encamped before the mountain" and Rashi explains that the Children of Israel encamped before the mountain "like one person with one heart". We see that unity amongst Jews between one another is the basis of the entire Torah.

The Chid'a wrote that each person receives his portion of Torah at Sinai and if he is pious he will produce that which his soul received. No one else can say the new Torah idea because it is his portion that his soul received.

The Gaon of Vilna ob'm said that it says in the gemara that the fetus is taught the entire Torah. Before it comes into this world angel comes and hits his mouth to make him forget the entire Torah. The idea here is that a person is taught his portion of Torah that he is to clarify in the world and he is then made to forget it so that he merits to achieve his portion in Torah

We find that wholesomeness in Torah is only when all of Israel is unified. However if, G-d forbid, there is a separation in Israel, there will be a separation in all the parts of Torah.

We can now understand the request of the convert to Shamai and Hillel and their answers to him. He knows that every person in Israel has his special portion in Torah that belongs only to him and he therefore asked Shamai to "convert him so that he can teach him the entire Torah while he stands on one foot". He wanted to achieve, not only his portion in Torah but all parts of all of Israel in wholesomeness. Shamai therefore pushed him away for that is not possible for one person, for each person has only his portion of his Torah that he received at Sinai.

However when he came to Hillel the Elder Hillel gave him wonderful advice how to achieve the entire Torah by telling him, "That which is hated by you do not do to another", i.e. fulfill the mitzvah of "love your neighbor's well being as it were your own", to love all of Israel as one person and thereby it will be considered as if he achieved all parts of the Torah. That is what is written "As one person with one heart" to allude to the fact that if there is unity in Israel, they are like one person with one heart. Therefore when a person loves his neighbor as himself knowing that we are all responsible for one another like one body with one heart - then if his neighbor fulfills a certain mitzvah that he cannot, it is considered as if he fulfilled this mitzvah as well.

LAG B'OMER START A FIRE & CELEBRATE WITH JOY

Lag B'Omer is traditionally celebrated with great joy. Jewish sources offer a range of opinions as to the origins of this joy. The Talmud says Lag B'Omer celebrates the halt of a plague that took the lives of thousands of students of the great teacher Rabbi Akiva. Other sources say Lag B'Omer celebrates a victory for the armies of the Jewish leader Bar Kochba. Some associate Lag B'Omer with stories about Rabbi Shimon Bar Yohai, a student of Rabbi Akiva and writer of an important Jewish text.

CELEBRATING THE 33RD DAY

A number of traditions and customs have developed around the holiday of Lag B'Omer. In Israel and beyond, many families light bonfires to brighten up cities and countryside alike. In addition, many Jewish couples schedule weddings and parties on Lag B'Omer. Interested in celebrating Lag B'Omer this year? Try one of these fun activities:

Build a Campfire Lag B'Omer falls in mid-to-late spring, making it a great time to break out the camping gear — or at least light a fire in a fire pit. Don't forget to make a <u>BBQ!</u> and s'mores!

Put on a Parade Some communities stage parades for *Lag B'Omer*. Your family can organize a parade of its own. March around the block or just around the house and yard.

Get a Haircut Yes, a haircut! The Counting of the *Omer* is treated as a semi-mourning period, and observant Jews refrain from haircutting during such a time. Because *Lag B'Omer* suspends that restriction, it is a traditional time for young children to get their first haircuts.


