

Dvar Torah Parashat Terumah Summary & Questions!

Parasha Terumah describes God's instructions to the Israelites regarding the construction of the Tabernacle (Mishkan) - a portable dwelling place for God's presence. The Tabernacle was to be constructed using a specific set of materials, including gold, silver, copper, and various fabrics. The Israelites were commanded to donate these materials willingly and generously.

The Parasha also provides detailed instructions for the construction of the Tabernacle's furnishings, including the Ark of the Covenant, the Table, and the Menorah. These objects were to be crafted with great care and attention to detail, and were rich in symbolic meaning.

The Ark of the Covenant, for example, was a gold-covered box that contained the Tablets of the Law and was considered the physical manifestation of God's presence among the Israelites. The Table held the showbread, which represented God's sustenance of the Israelites, while the Menorah was a seven-branched candelabrum that represented God's illumination and wisdom.

The construction of the Tabernacle and its furnishings required a significant amount of resources and skill, and the Israelites were commanded to build them with the utmost care and precision. The Parasha emphasizes the importance of craftsmanship and the value of giving willingly and generously to communal projects.

PERASHA TERUMAH Thoughts: Mayer Sasson

"....spices for anointing oil and for the incense of aromatic spices." (5, 6)

Atonement for sins

"Something hidden (the Ketoret-Incense) shall come and atone for a hidden deed (= slander)."

Concerning the service of the Cohen Gadol on Yom Kippur we learn in the gemara (Yuma) "And it shall atone for him and for the members of his household and for the entire community of Israel - What is the atonement that is good for him, his family, his fellow Kohanim and for all of Israel? We shall say that it is the offering of the Incense." The gemara wonders and asks, "Does the Incense atone?"

And it answers. "We learn from here that the Incense atones, as it says, "And he shall give the Incense and atone for the Nation." Rabbi Yishmael learns, "For what does the Incense atone? For slander. For something hidden (the Incense) shall come and atone for a hidden deed (slander)."

We learn from here that the Ketoret (Incense) atones for slander and from here we can deduce a new idea, for when our Rabbis ob'm said "As long as the Beit Hamikdash existed the Altar atoned for Israel but now - a person's table atones for him" they intended atonement for the sin of slander.

Our Rabbis ob'm said (Brachot) that the manner of those who are lax in guarding their tongues is to speak their slander when they eat together at the table. In other

words, when they eat their bread they also "eat and swallow" people with their sharp tongues. Therefore it is explained in the holy Zohar that "The time of eating is a time of war". The Zohar explains that when a person is eating his bread there is a war between his Good Inclination and his Evil Inclination, for the Evil Inclination tries with all its might to catch the person in his net and therefore a person has to fight against it with all his might.

(And we can add that the word table – שלחן is the same letters as the words "to the snake" - לנחש - to teach you that when a person eats by his table, the נחש -"Snake", an epithet for the Evil Inclination, arouses to fight against him. But if a person speaks out words of Torah by the table, the letter Lamed 5, that alludes to learning, enters the word שלחן and then it becomes שלחן – Table, as it says "The Table that is before

We learn in the gemara (Yuma) that the indication for a repenter that he has succeeded in his repentance is if "at the same time in the same place" he withstood the trial. In other words, if a person comes at the same time and the same place to where he had succumbed in the past to sin and now he overcomes his Evil Inclination and withstands the trial, this is an indication that he is truly penitent.

So now we can understand the reason why a person's table atones for him for slander just as the Altar for Incense did; for since the manner of slanderers is to speak and gossip essentially when they are eating at the table, therefore at that time and place they are worthy of atonement for slander if they hold themselves back from speaking and listening to slander and instead say words of Torah at the table.

Parashat Terumah discusses the building of the mishkan, which was the forerunner of the Temple, which in turn was the forerunner of the synagogue, which indeed was referred to as "migdash me`at," a. miniature Temple, by the prophet Ezekiel.

Synagogues are served by rabbis. So, let me tell you a news item about rabbis that was publicized last week, and that bothered me personally very much.

Background to what I want to tell: Growing up in Boston, I received my Jewish/Hebrew education in an institution known as the "Hebrew Teachers College" or HTC for short. Although not what we would call a day school, it was an intensive 5-day curriculum where we learned Talmud, Bible, Rashi, Hebrew Lang and Lit, and Jewish History. Everything was taught in Hebrew, and it was inconceivable to speak to a teacher, even in the hallways, in English. So, I am indebted to the school for having given me a solid background.

The school was founded around 1920, in order to provided teachers for future generations of students. Hence the word "Teachers" in the name.

Some time after I graduated, the "T" was dropped from the school's name. Perhaps they realized that most students nowadays had no desire to become teachers.

Around 20 years ago, they created a "non-denominational" rabbinical school. That is, you could take courses, without committing to being Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, or Reconstructionist. At least, the school held on to one requirement: in order to be admitted, or to graduate, your spouse, or boy/girl/they/friend, must be Jewish.

Last week, after much deliberation, the school announced that that requirement had been lifted. Now, according to new policy, it is not only acceptable for a "Rabbi" to officiate at a mixed marriage, but the rabbi him/ her/they/self can be married out of the faith.

Sadly, this is an example of "wokeism" carried to the extreme. I am, of course, upset at the sharp left turn my alma mater has taken.

Since we are already in Adar, and soon will be celebrating Purim, let's conclude on a lighter note: There was the man whose doctor told him last month that he was going deaf. He hasn't heard from the doctor since.




