Dvar Torah Parashat Tetzaveh Summary & Questions!

Parashat Tetzaveh is the 20th weekly Torah portion in the annual Jewish cycle of readings. It begins with Hashem's commandment to Moses to gather pure olive oil to light the menorah, which is a seven-branched candlestick that was to be placed in the Mishkan, the portable sanctuary that the Israelites built during their wandering in the desert.

The parasha then goes on to describe in great detail the garments that Aaron and his sons, the priests, are to wear during their service. This includes the ephod, a special garment made of gold, blue, purple, and scarlet yarns, and fine twisted linen, which is adorned with precious stones. The breastplate,

which is to be worn over the ephod, is also described, with its twelve precious stones representing the twelve tribes

The parasha also describes the robe that the high priest is to wear, as well as the turban, the sash, and the linen breeches that are to be worn by all the priests. The intricate details of these garments are given to emphasize the holiness and importance of the priestly

Towards the end of the parasha, instructions are given for the consecration of the priests and the altar, which involved the offering of various sacrifices and the anointing of Aaron and his sons with oil. This consecration ceremony was necessary to set the priests apart and sanctify their service to Hashem.

Discussion questions:

1. Why do you think Hashem gave such detailed instructions for the clothing of the priests? What significance do you see in the use of specific colors, materials, and adornments?

- The concept of consecration involves setting something or someone apart as holy and dedicated to Hashem. How can this idea of consecration apply to our own lives? Are there specific practices or rituals that we can engage in to deepen our connection with the divine.
- The Parasha emphasizes the importance of the priesthood and their role in facilitating the Israelites' relationship with Hashem. How does this emphasis on a specific group of people serving as intermediaries between Hashem and the community affect our understanding of spirituality and religious practice? Are there ways in which we can all serve as priests in our own lives and communities, or is this role reserved for a select few?

Dear Congregants and Friends,

As the holiday of Purim approaches, I find myself reflecting deeply on the story of Esther and Mordechai, as told in the Megillah. This remarkable tale reminds us that even in the darkest of times, hope and courage can shine through and bring salvation.

The Megillah tells us of a plot by the wicked Haman to destroy the Jews of Persia, and of Esther's bravery in revealing her identity as a Jew to the king in order to plead for her people's salvation. Through Esther's courage and faith, the Jewish people were ultimately saved from destruction. This story serves as a powerful reminder that no matter how difficult the circumstances, we must hold fast to our beliefs and strive to do what is right.

Another important lesson from the Megillah is the concept of "Na'aseh V'Nishma," which means "we will do and we will listen." This phrase was spoken by the Jewish people in response to the commandments given to them at Mount Sinai, and it emphasizes the importance of taking action before fully understanding the reasons behind it. This concept is exemplified in the story of Esther, as she takes action to save her people without fully understanding the consequences of her actions.

As we prepare to celebrate Purim, we are reminded of the importance of community and tradition. The joyous holiday of Purim is a time for us to come together and celebrate our shared history and faith. Although I might not be able to be with you in person this Purim, I will be joining you in spirit as you celebrate.

PERASHA TETZAVEH - PURIM: TZAV Thoughts: Mayer Sasson

"The paupers' eyes are lifted up to the Megillah reading"

The time of Megilah reading is auspicious to livelihood and blessings

In the sefer Ateret Yehoshua of the holy Rabbi of Jikov it is brought down that the Megillah reading is auspicious to a good livelihood The Rabbi explains this according to what our Sages said "The paupers' eyes are lifted up to the Megillah reading".

The simple explanation is that the paupers wait for a long time for the Megillah reading because at that time Jews give them charity which is the custom of the day – to give gifts to the poor. The Rabbi of Jikov explains the Gemara according to what the ARIZ'L wrote: We know that when we say the verse of "Ashrei Yoshvei Beitecha we have to have intentions for the angels' names who are in charge of livelihood "פּא" who come from the initials of the words Poteach et yadecha "תח" – that come from the last letters of those words

The Rabbi of Jikov adds that the words of the blessing on reading the Megillah "על מקרא מגילה add up to 519 which is exactly the sum of the two angels of livelihood "מר" and "519).

This is the intention of the Gemara "The paupers' eyes are lifted up to the Megillah reading"-The paupers can rise in wealth and leave their poverty by reading the Megillah because by reading the Megillah one is blessed with a prosperous livelihood and and all the best from the names "מצ" and "חתק" that are alluded to in the Megillah.

The holy author of the Tiferet Shlomo added that through the Megillah reading blessings of children, life and livelihood are brought down to Israel. He added: Therefore, it is a mitzvah to spread out the Megillah like a letter, as it says in the Shulchan Aruch, so that the good blessings are spread over the entire world, Amen. SHABBAT SHALOM!!

PURIM Shulchan Aruch

1. Hear the Megillah The Megillah, is the scroll that tells the story of Purim. Participate in the reading twice: once on Purim night, and again on Purim day. This year, that's Monday night, March 6 and Tuesday, March 7. For those of you who are not able to join us in person, we encourage you to watch the reading virtually. We will be sending out the links in Friday's email and again on Purim. When Haman's name is mentioned, you can twirl graggers (noisemakers) or stamp your feet to eradicate his evil name.

2. Give to the Needy (Matanot La Evyonim) One of Purim's primary themes is Jewish unity. Haman tried to kill us all, we were all in danger together, so we celebrate together too. Hence, on Purim day we place special emphasis on caring for the less fortunate. Give money or food to at least 2 needy people during the daylight hours of Purim, March 7. In case you can't find any needy people, please give to our T'zedakah fund. For those of you who will be attending the readings, place at least two coins in the T'zedakah box.

3. Send Food Gifts to Friends (Mishloach Manot) On Purim we emphasize the importance of friendship and community by sending gifts of food to friends. On Purim day, March 7, send a package containing at least two different ready-to-eat food items and/or beverages (e.g., pastry, fruit, beverage) to at least 1 Jewish acquaintance during the daylight hours.

4. Feast (Michte) On Purim day, March 7, gather your family, maybe invite a guest or two, and celebrate with a festive Purim meal. Or better yet, join us at the synagogue for our annual purin party. Traditionally, this meal begins before sundown and lasts well into the evening. The table should be festively bedecked with a nice tablecloth and candles. Wash for bread or challah, and enjoy a meal featuring meat, wine and plenty of Jewish songs, words of Torah and joyous Purim spirit. Sing, drink, laugh, have fun together.




