

* From the Rabbi's Desk

One Passover – Two Kinds of Freedom Rabbi Jim Rosen



What does it mean to be free? Especially after a terrorist attack as recently occurred in Brussels, the answer seems obvious. To be free is to be rid of external threats, liberated from those who would conquer, torture, or enslave others causing misery in the service of a grandiose vision of power. Others rightfully point to internal challenges. The fears, worries, overwhelming depressions that afflict so many in day to day life.

The external and the internal challenges to our freedom are both represented in Torah. Think of the 10 Commandments (literally, the "10 statements"). The first reads, "I am the Lord your God who took you out of Egypt..." The last one reads "you shall not covet" (i.e. do not be obsessively jealous of what your neighbor has and you lack"). The first passage describes the Egypt of this modern world. There remain nations and especially terror groups that would dominate and intimidate others to fuel their own ambitions. Groups such as ISIS employ sexual slavery as a tool of terror. There remain, as well, far too many currents of anti-Semitism, racism, misogyny, and more in so many places.

The second quote from above embodies a different kind of wish. To be liberated from the feelings that darken and consume our days and leave us no respite at night. How many are afflicted by depression, anxiety, and much more? How wonderful if we could be free from both scourges, the outer and inner.

In Hebrew, the word Egypt is "Mitzrayim," which literally means "a narrow place." As such, Pesach urges us to ask: "how might we make a world free of the political, military, and social Egypts that literally squeeze the life out of people?" And how do we help each other escape the narrow confines of feelings that leave so many frozen in a limbo they yearn to escape.

It's Passover time. Time to imagine the world outside and within as it might be. It's time to get out, to be free.

LIBRARY CORNER A Spy Story and Practical Advice Roberta J. Buland

On April 18, 1983, a bomb exploded outside the American Embassy in Beirut, killing 63 people. It was the beginning of the political force, Hezbollah, and it eliminated America's most influential and effective intelligence officer in the Middle East – CIA operative Robert Ames. *The Good Spy; The Life and Death of Robert Ames*, Kai Bird's Pulitzer Prize-winning biography, is the compelling portrait of Ames, a man

who might have helped heal the rift between Arabs and the West. As a child, Bird lived in the Beirut Embassy where Ames was his neighbor. Bird draws on informational interviews with Ames' widow, scores of current and former American, Israeli, and Palestinian intelligence officers, and other players in

the Middle East, and hundreds of his private letters. The masterpiece-level narrative of the making of a CIA officer is a history of the 20th-century conflict in the Middle East and the Beirut Embassy bombing. Bird has used his reporter's skills to expose the shocking truth of where the attacker's mastermind resides today.

Why are young people dropping out of religious institutions? Can the trend be reversed? In *Got Religion? How Churches, Mosques, and Synagogues Can Bring Young People Back,* Naomi Schaefer Riley examines reasons for the

defections and why we should care. Traditional markers of growing up - marrying, and becoming financially independent – are being delayed by young adults today, often a full decade longer than their parents and grandparents. This "emerging later adulthood" diminishes involvement and saps strength and vitality of young people in religious institutions creating a more barren religious landscape for those who eventually do return. Yet, clearly there are some churches, synagogues, and mosques that are making strides in bringing young people back to religion. Roman Catholic groups have tried to recreate a shared living experience through the Alliance for Catholic Education and Jewish groups through Moishe House. Other faiths have tried other approaches. *Got Religion?* offers in-depth reporting about the most successful of these institutions and how they may be adapted to work for others.

* Worshipping Together - Passover

A mitzvah of Passover is the removal of all *chametz* (leaven), both physically and symbolically, and all that has had contact with *chametz*. Jewish law forbids eating (or even possessing) any food that can contain leaven.

According to Jewish law, pots, dishes, and utensils that are used throughout the year absorb leaven and therefore may not be used on Passover. Today, in traditional households, it is customary to have special dishes that are only used during the Passover festival. However, vessels may be used for Passover if they undergo the process of *kashering*, thus purging and cleansing them of any and all leaven they may have absorbed.

Bedikat Chametz – Search for Leaven

In anticipation of Pesach, it is traditional to engage in a thorough spring cleaning. Then, there is a formal search that takes place right after sundown on the night before Pesach. A blessing is said, and the search is done by candlelight or flashlight, with a small bag to sweep up the crumbs, usually with a feather. Since the house has already been cleaned thoroughly, it is customary to put crumbs in a few places where they can be easily found. The following morning, the leaven is burned (*biur chametz*). No *chametz* is eaten after this ritual until the end of Passover.

Mekhirat ChametzTransfer of Ownership

All *chametz* vessels (dishes, utensils, etc., and unopened food cartons or cans stored away during the Festival) should no longer legally be in one's possession.

How do we achieve this in accordance with Jewish law? An agent is empowered to enact a transaction with someone not Jewish. The sale has to take a legal form, using a formal bill of sale. All *chametz* remains in that person's "ownership," for the Passover period. At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted *chametz*. If ownership of the *chametz* was not transferred before the holiday, the use of this *chametz* is prohibited after the holiday as well.

You may indicate your desire to observe this mitzvah by signing the form below and returning it to the Beth El Temple office no later than **Friday**, **April 22**, **before 9:00 AM**. You might also consider donating unopened, nonperishable *chametz* to FoodShare.

Guidelines for Permitted and Prohibited Items

<u>PERMITTED FOODS</u> may require a *Kosher le-Pesach* label, and it may differ if purchased before or during the holiday:

- NO label if purchased PRIOR to Pesach: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives; sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea); salt (not iodized); pepper; natural spices; frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes, see *Kitniyot*); milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese; ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and Camembert (soft); frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.
- NO label if purchased PRIOR or DURING Pesach: **fresh** fruits and vegetables (for legumes, see *Kitniyot*, right), eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.
- ♦ NEED label if purchased PRIOR or DURING Pesach: all baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices; canned tuna; wine, vinegar, liquor, oils, dried fruits, candy, chocolate flavored milk, ice cream, yogurt, soda.
- ◆ NEED label if purchased DURING Pesach: **processed** foods (canned, bottled, or frozen): milk, butter, juices, vegetables, fruit, milk products, spices, coffee, tea, and fish.

<u>PROHIBITED FOODS</u> include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

KITNIYOT: Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods to the above list:

- ♦ rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas); however, string beans are permitted.
- ♦ Peanuts and peanut oil are permissible.
- ♦ We permit the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities also permit the use of all of the above.

<u>MEDICINE</u>: Chametz binders are used in many pills, but if required for life sustaining therapy, and general medical health, it may be used. In all cases, capsules are preferable to pills.

Kashering Utensils for Passover

The process of kashering depends on how the utensils are used. According to *halakhah* (Jewish law), leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (*ke-voleo kakh poleto*). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

- ♦ EARTHENWARE (china, pottery, etc.) may NOT be kashered. Exception: fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.
- ◆ METAL (wholly made of metal)
 - ♦ Utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible.
 - ♦ Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water.
 - ♦ Metal baking utensils can NOT be kashered.
- ♦ OVENS AND RANGES: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it.
 - ♦ Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned and then put through the self-cleaning cycle.
 - ♦ Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens.
- ♦ SMOOTH GLASS TOP ELECTRIC RANGES should be cleaned thoroughly, and then turn on the coils to maximum heat until they are red hot. Carefully, pour boiling water on the entire surface area. **Note:** Some will not be able to be kashered.

- ◆ MICROWAVE OVENS which do not cook the food by means of heat should be cleaned, then a cup of water placed inside, and the oven turned on until the water disappears.
 - ♦ **Note:** A microwave oven that has a browning element can NOT be kashered for Pesach.
- ♦ GLASSWARE requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesach, or putting them through a dishwasher. Some also soak in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours.
 - ♦ **Glass Cookware:** After a thorough cleansing, there should be water boiled in them which will overflow the rim.
 - ♦ **Note:** Glass Bakeware, like metal bakeware, may NOT be kashered.
- ♦ **DISHWASHER** After not using the machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.
- ♦ ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES If the parts that come into contact with *chametz* are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rules for metal utensils). All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.
 - ♦ **Note**: If the parts are not removable, the appliance can NOT be kashered.
- ◆ TABLES, CLOSETS AND COUNTERS If used with *chametz*, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.
- ♦ KITCHEN SINK A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. Dishes may NOT be soaked in a porcelain sink.
- ◆ CHAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS Non-Passover dishes, pots, and *chametz* whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.






