The Power of Face-to-Face

The following is based on a recent Shabbat morning sermon...



One of the supreme ironies of the October 7 attack is that many of the victims were peace activists who believed in coexistence with Palestinians.

Yocheved Lifshitz, one of the first captives released by Hamas, was one of those activists. The 85-year-old resident from Kibbutz Nir Oz agitated for peace, and also helped to get sick Palestinians to hospitals in Israel over the years.

Three days into her captivity the captives were visited by Hamas leader Yihya Sinwar. Face-to-face she asked him was he not ashamed to do such a thing to people who all these years supported peace?

A face-to-face confrontation with one who masterminded the face-to-face destruction of lives and property and took 249 precious souls' captive. He had no answer.

The hostages, 129 of whom remain in captivity, have stared into the face of evil. Kudos to Yocheved Lifshitz for having the courage to confront her captors in that way.

But how do we best help those who have seen the worst in humanity to cope. How do we help others and ourselves to heal?

And the answer of Jewish tradition is boldly ironic. You do so face-to-face. In the Mishnah the question is asked, what is the latest time that one can gather for morning prayers? The answer, when there is enough light to be able to recognize the face of your friend. See that face, prayer can then happen.

In the Torah portion of *Vayishlach*, Jacob and Esau meet at long last. Jacob is fearful that after all these years, his brother will still harbor anger from their rivalry. Jacob fears for his life, but Esau does not

attack. He embraces his brother. And Jacob responds, "to see your face is to see the face of God."

The philosopher Emmanuel Levinas taught to "see someone's face is a way of saying I accept my ethical obligations towards you."

In the *Birkat Kohanim*, a blessing we share with children each Friday night at the Shabbat table, we say, "may God lift the divine face towards you."

How does Torah describe the unique relationship that Moses enjoyed with God, one of deep intimacy? God knew him *Panim el Panim*. Face-to-face. Even something as mundane as a welcome reception is known in modern Hebrew as *Kabbalot Panim* – the place where faces are received, literally speaking.

Healing begins when those who have suffered see the face of compassion and caring and know that they are not alone. Healing continues when we share the gift of presence with those who hurt.

One can be hopeful that one day, perhaps far in the future, stripped of the barbarism of Hamas and terror, Israelis and Palestinians will be able to see their shared humanity, face-to-face, and create a relationship that is both secure and accepting.

Israeli radio is now dedicating songs for the hostages in Gaza. Loved ones are invited to request a song that is beloved by those who are still in captivity. One of the most popular songs is *Hatishma Koli*, whose lyrics read in part,

Will you hear my voice, my far away one, will you hear my voice wherever you are? A voice is calling with strength, a voice is crying softly, and it sends a blessing.

It is a prayer cast into the heavens that a beloved might know they are not alone. Until such time as they can be reunited face-to-face. Please, God, let it continue to happen, and very, very soon.


There were no fewer than twelve Levites singing as a choir in the Holy Temple, and they could be increased ad infinitum. The children would then enter the Temple courtyard for service at the time when the Levites were engaging in song. And the children would add their voices to give greater beauty to the music. Because the voice of the children is clear and angelic and adds greatly to the voice of the adults. Rabbi Eliezer ben Ya'akov says: "the children would stand just below the Levitical choir and they were called the apprentices of the Levites." From Mishnah Masechet Arakhin 2:6, combined with an explanation by Rabbi Ovadiah of Bartinura (c. 1445-1515):

There were also instrumentalists in the Holy Temple! Mishnah Middot *Arakhin* 2.4 indicates that many of these singers and musicians were from the families of a place called Beth El.

It is with this ancient and rich tradition in mind that we have, in this Beth El Temple, in the years that I have been the cantor, dedicated ourselves to keeping the remnants of this heritage alive.

The first and foremost element of this has been our Beth El choir who has been, with powerful dedication, by my side, not only as the sweet singers that they are, but

as my family, my brothers, my sisters, and my children.

For the bulk of my time here, these special singers have, for

most of each year, come together, multiple times a week to diligently prepare for Shabbat, *Shalosh Regalim*, and the High Holidays, as well as those many times that this choir would, poetically, raise their voices in support of our beloved Israel and its history, both past and present, plus contribute to culture in general.

They have both urged and inspired me to write hundreds of pieces for this choir as a group and for those who sang as soloists or in a duet.

It is profoundly important for me to recognize the multitude of gifted singers who have performed at Beth El Temple over these many years, for their artistic and inspirational contribution to the life of this synagogue.

What has been especially poignant and meaningful to me is the shared goal of intense dedication and work to raise the level of performing so we could feel a shared pride and satisfaction that we did the best that our abilities allowed us to achieve.



The choir culture here has been far reaching, from the wonderful mixed voice choirs to the men's and women's choirs to the amazing children's choirs. Many of these kids were very young and others joined after their Bar/Bat Mitzvah experiences. Just this past year we had a special group of nine young women, some from high school and one who was still studying to become a Bat Mitzvah, sing so beautifully with such precision and tone. I was transported.

There are so many wonderful experiences and stories, too many to recount here. I cannot express in words what each of these singers has meant to me personally and musically. My life has been immeasurably enriched!

It is one thing to be proud of our accomplishments and our history, but it is another to keep our traditions alive and with the creativity that will ensure its continuing and greater role in the lives of our Jewish communities. I am dedicated to keeping that flame burning.

* Reflections from the President



What does a synagogue president write about when in the Northeast we are likely in the throes of some very dark,

cold, and perhaps snowy days? And these past months, life has felt a little bit darker and colder as our hearts and minds continue to focus on Eretz Yisrael. As much as we saw a glimmer of hope with the release of some hostages over the Thanksgiving holiday, as I write this article, the war continues, we pray for the remaining hostages, and here at home antisemitic words and actions are on a frightening increase.

Yet, we have reason to celebrate. In our secular world, we mark special days for several great Americans: George Washington, Abraham Lincoln, and Martin Luther King, Jr. These brave men were trailblazers as they fought for freedom and humanity. And in our

Jewish world, Tu BiShevat, the 15th day of the month of Shevat, is celebrated this year on the evening and day of January 24 and 25.

So why write about a fairly minor holiday, a holiday that's not mentioned in the Bible nor has any special religious requirements? This year, that answer is easier than ever. Tu BiShevat, sometimes referred to as the New Year for the Trees, was established in ancient times by the rabbis as an agricultural holiday, and in particular, a time for planting trees. Throughout the Bible, there is reference to the importance of trees, especially trees that bear fruit. We are told in Deuteronomy (20:19-20) that when we go to war, and it takes a long time to capture the besieged city, we are not to destroy fruit trees. Similarly, in Leviticus (19:23) we are instructed to not eat the fruit for the first three years after planting. Moving into modern times, Tu BiShevat is certainly a precursor for Earth

Day. In Israel it comes at a time when the winter rains are ending and the trees start to flower. Tu BiShevat is also regarded as a symbol of Zionism and the attachment to the land of Israel. The early Zionist settlers physically planted trees and we now see green in what was a desert. The flowers of the almond trees are breathtaking. My mind brings me back to the Israeli breakfasts with tables overflowing with apricots, dates, figs, and so many more delicacies.

I'll suggest to each of you to bring a bit of Israel into your life on Tu BiShevat. Enjoy some fruits and nuts, eat some olives, plant a tree in Israel through the Jewish National Fund, and maybe sip a glass of Israeli wine or grape juice. And then, browse through the rest of this edition and the new, monthly *Temple Happenings* flyer to learn about all that Beth El has to offer. We look forward to seeing you throughout 2024.

The challenge of planning and successfully implementing meaningful programming for post B'nei Mitzvah students is a perennial obstacle across the Jewish community. Although the written word in a sacred textbook will always

be relevant and important in continuing the Jewish journey, Rabbi Heschel's quote highlights the value of experience and informal education.

One of the central goals of BET is to build a strong sense of community in our teenagers, creating a close connection to each other, to Judaism, and to the BET and larger local Jewish community. We have the following goals in mind for the program that will begin in Spring 2024:

- ⇒ Broadening the Jewish experiences and deepening the Jewish knowledge of teens in a compelling and attractive way.
- ☆ Connecting teens with each other and with the greater Jewish people.
- ➡ Bonding students as a sacred community where they can find their home, where they can turn for friendship, exciting new ideas, and an anchor for helping them make ethical decisions at a critical time in their personal development.
- ☆ Creating text people so that our students continue
 to be equipped with tools and experiences needed
 to continue their Jewish journey post B'nei
 Mitzvah.

After becoming a Bar or Bat Mitzvah at BET, students have several choices to continue their Jewish development: they can participate in USY, attend JTConnect, and/or be *Madrichim* (teaching assistants) at SULAM. In addition, we are starting a new program at BET called *The Masa Program. Masa* means journey. This program is focused on exploring the Jewish journey of our post B'nei Mitzvah students through travel impact learning experiences. It is our hope that they will be engaged and remain active in the larger Jewish community in Greater Hartford.

Join Us For Minyan - In Person

Our in-person Minyan allows people to come together for worship, say Mourner's *Kaddish* (our members observe 5,300 yahrzeits every year), name a baby, provide support in good and difficult times, and build a lasting connection to those around us. It is an opportunity for prayer, community, music, reflection, and a few moments of quiet in our busy world.

What can I expect at Minyan?

Our clergy and/or a congregant leads and guides the service with English and Hebrew portions. Congregational participation is encouraged at whatever level you feel comfortable with.

Do I need to know Hebrew to attend?

No. All of our prayerbooks have English translations on the facing page of every prayer, and transliterations (using English letters to spell out Hebrew words) are provided for some prayers.

How long is Minyan?

Sun, Tues, Wed, and Fri mornings: 30 minutes
Mon. and Thurs. mornings: 40 minutes
(when Torah is read)
Sunday through Thursday evenings: 25 minutes

You are welcome whenever you show up. But, if you know your plans, please sign up to attend a Minyan. You will then receive a calendar invite and a reminder two days before your selected dates. Scan this code or visit BethElWestHartford.org/Minyan.

Tu BiShevat

A Historical Refresher

This minor holiday wasn't always a festival. Instead, it was a key farming date that Jews marked in ancient times.

When you enter the land [of Israel] and plant any tree for food, you shall regard its fruit as forbidden. Three years it shall be forbidden for you, not to be eaten. (Leviticus 19:23)

The fruit a tree bore in year four was offered to the priests in the Temple, but the fruit of the fifth year (and all the ones after!) was for the farmers. The rabbis established the 15th of the month of Shevat as the "birthday" for trees, regardless of when they were planted during the year.

Jews of Bahrain

During our recent visit to Bahrain, we visited the rebuilt House of the Ten Commandments. This small synagogue serves the Jewish community there that has dwindled to about fifty members from a high of some 1,500 in the 1920s. In Talmudic writings the mention of ports and islands in the Persian

Gulf indicate a Jewish presence. They participated in the pearl industry, crucial to this area's economy until

The land deed granting this property to the Jewish Community in 1930

1930, with the advent of the Japanese cultured pearl. Arabic sources speak of Jews in Hajar, the old capital, in 630 CE. Other communities existed in what is now Oman and Saudi Arabia. The current

community is descended from Jewish traders from Iraq who migrated to

Bahrain in the late 1800s. Others arrived from Persia and India. Many participated in the clothing business, such as the family of Ebrahim Daoud Nonoo, current head of the Jewish community.

On December 5, 1947, rioting broke out, targeting the Jewish community. A mob looted Jewish homes and shops, murdering one elderly woman. The synagogue was destroyed along with the

Torah. Some Jews found safety among their Bahraini friends. About two-thirds of Jews left after the riots, going first to India, then Israel (Pardes Hanna-Karkur) and Britain. There was more rioting after the



6 Day War in 1967 and most of the remaining 500+ Jews emigrated.

Ebrahim Daoud Nonoo, a Jewish businessman and community leader, sat in the appointed



Upper House of the Bahraini Parliament's Shura Council from 2001-2005, the first Jewish member. His niece, Houda Ezra Nonoo, was appointed Bahraini ambassador to the US from 2008-2013. She is the first Jew and third woman appointed

to an ambassadorship. She is the first Jewish ambassador of any Middle Eastern Arab country. In

2006, Ebrahim Nonoo financed the repairs to the country's only synagogue. The synagogue is now home to the Torah gifted by Jared Kushner to His Majesty King Hamad Bin

Ibn Al Khalifa in September 2020.




to His Majesty King Hamad Bin Ibn Al Khalifa

In 2007, the

Jewish population numbered only about thirty-six. As is often the case with small communities, many of the younger members are leaving. Nonoo is currently

the CEO of the Basma Company and president of the Association of Gulf Jewish Communities. They are happy to be able to worship publicly

for the first time in almost 75 years. Only time will tell what the future holds for this community.


