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
# \* SULAM Beth El - Seek. Understand. Learn. Act. Marvel.

### Better Late Than Never: Dirshuni - Israeli Women's Midrash, and the Missing Half of the Jewish Bookshelf



### Let's Keep the Sweetness in the Good



On Rosh Hashanah when we dip apples in honey, we wish each other a good and sweet year. And of course, it's a way of saying that we fervently hope that the weeks and months ahead will have as much sweetness as the honey and apple combination.

Of course, we all want the sweetness, the pleasure, good friends, shared celebrations, tasty food, and beautiful music to bless us in the New Year.

But I've come to believe there's something even deeper about that traditional greeting. It's not enough to hope for a good year that will also be sweet, but we should have the real privilege of knowing that the very idea of goodness will remain sweet.

Many of us make a kind of Jewish set of New Year's resolutions this time of year. We apologize and make amends. We resolve to be more generous, sensitive, and patient. Many commit themselves to spending more time on a Jewish journey of exploration.

We dare not surrender our vision of what ought to be, for our communities and for ourselves. A good New Year means a year in which we always strive to touch everything around us with the passion for making it better.

There is nothing more magnificent than remembering that this is the sweetest thing of all.

### The Yamim Nora'im (Days of Awe): Their Special Music and Texts



The music of the High Holydays, as well as the music of each period of the year in the Jewish calendar, is profoundly special

to itself and the period that it represents.

When we gather for the opening sounds and melodies on the special evening that ushers in the beauty and mystery of Rosh Hashanah, and when, on the following morning, we rise to hear the awesome sounds of the shofar just after the reading of the Torah and its accompanying Haftarah, and when we hear the breathtaking and imposing texts of the Unetaneh Tokev and B'rosh Hashanah with the dictum that in the end we only know that we can control what we can control, and as the service unwinds we pass on to the

celebratory *Kaddish Shalem* and the special *Ein Keloheinu* at the conclusion of both days of Rosh Hashanah, we understand that this music during this holiday is meant to connect our souls to all that God represents.

When we as a congregation hear the *Kol Nidre* with that special melody that accompanies only THAT text, and soon after, the texts of the *Ya'ale* and *Ki Henei Kachomer*, with their plaintive, beautiful, and poetic melodies, and with our choir, soloists, and congregation singing as if in a conversation with each other, there is an innate feeling of affirmation, a sense that these moments are pregnant with meaning and anticipation.

And when, as the holy day of Yom Kippur draws to a close, we experience a profoundly beautiful and poetic *Neilah* Service, with its collection of radiant melodies and texts that describe the closing of the doors that concludes this period, we enter back into our daily lives with new resolve, with a new sense of the "better" person we can be.

This is that special time that our prayers present themselves as sparkling stars and galaxies that seem to allow us to dream and, if but for a moment, reach out and touch the infinite.

So, to all of you, I wish a period of reflection and anticipation for a year that can be filled with a cornucopia of meaningful and happy, healthy times for each one of us!

# \* Israel Engagement Committee

### The Jews of Morocco

In Israel, descendants of Moroccan Jews number over 1 million and have a powerful impact on Israeli culture. Their customs, music, and cuisine are ubiquitous and admired.

Jews lived in Morocco for over 2500 years, with many arriving following the destruction of the Second Temple in 70AD. Others came fleeing the


persecution of the early Christian era and the Middle Ages. From 1492-1496, Jews expelled from Spain and



Portugal augmented Morocco's Jewish community, creating a golden era of Moroccan civilization.

Following the Arab conquest in 703, a spirit of tolerance pervaded Morocco, producing a thriving diversity including Jews with their commercial capabilities. This golden age lasted almost 300 years, seeing the creation of yeshivahs and the writing of brilliant scholars, poets, and grammarians. One was Rabbi Isaac of Fez, known as "Rif," who inspired generations of disciples and wrote the Jewish law book that impacted all future Jewish law codifications,

including the *Shulchan Aruch*. Rabbi Moses
Maimonides, a prolific and influential Torah scholar, lived in Fez from 1159 to 1165, leaving Cordoba to escape the Almohad persecution. Here, Maimonides, a physician to the Sultan, wrote his Commentary on the Oral Law.






The Jewish population experienced many waves of unfavorable treatment, dependent as they were on the ruler's tolerance. Harsh persecution occurred during the strict Almohad dynasty, (1121-1269). Jews were faced with conversion to Islam or death. The again peaceful and fruitful coexistence that followed was strained by French and Spanish colonization.

Morocco was home to some of the greatest kabbalists including Rabbi Chaim ibn

Attar and Rabbi Abraham ben Mordecai Azulai. Their tombs have become pilgrimage sites.



The first mellah, Jewish quarter, was created in 1438 in Fez. For protection, the mellahs were usually situated near the royal palace or the residence of the governor, since Jews played a vital economic role. To this day, mellahs have lively markets, with many road names

memorializing the once bustling Jewish populations.

A French colony, Morocco was subject to antisemitic decrees from Nazi-allied Vichy France during



WWII. In 1941, Sultan Mohammed V refused to deport Morocco's Jews, saying "there are no Jewish citizens, there are no Muslims citizens, they are all Moroccans." Some antisemitic laws were imposed on Morocco, and many Jews lost their jobs. There were a few pogroms in 1942. In June 1948, bloody riots killed 44 Jews, wounded scores more and an unofficial economic boycott was instigated against Moroccan Jews.

By 1948 the largest Jewish community in the Arab World was 280,000; today 2,500 remain. The Museum of Moroccan Judaism in Casablanca is the only museum on Judaism in the Arab world. Restored but nearly empty synagogues speak of the flourishing past and once vibrant Moroccan life that has found a new home in Israel.

#### The Wedding That Wasn't! Roberta J. Buland

Crazy To Leave You, by Beth El's own Marilyn Simon Rothstein, is a delicious story of a 41-year-old woman left at the altar. Could it be the best – or worst – thing that ever happened to her?

Rothstein weaves a delightful tapestry about Lauren, one of three daughters whose mother, a perennial size four, continues to give her unsolicited dieting – and other – advice. "Stay on your diet and freeze your eggs," she

counsels her hardly-slim workaholic advertising daughter. To achieve her new, hard-won size 12, Lauren has been subsisting on egg whites and steamed broccoli with a side helping of self-hatred.

Growing up pressured to skip dessert, Lauren was jealous of her naturally-thin younger sister and frustrated by her mother's relentless critique of her looks. When her fiancé, Eric, fails to show up for the wedding, she laments that all her careful work has been upended. She immediately abandons her recently-found healthy eating habits, devouring juicy cheeseburgers while still in her wedding dress.

Dysfunctionality permeates the story as it does Rothstein's other novels, *Lift and Separate* and *Husbands and Other Sharp Objects*. Lauren's older sister, Margo – a small time actress also with weight challenges – shows up unannounced to stay with Lauren, adding to the family drama.

With its many twists and turns, *Crazy to Leave You* is a self-deprecatingly funny take on the well-known career woman searching for love narrative. The characters, combined with Marilyn's wonderful use of language, creates a page-turner where readers laugh (a lot) and cry (a little). Many of us will find ourselves understanding Lauren's question as she looks in the mirror and asks: "... does this body make me look fat?"





# THE JEWISH CALENDAR, CHAPTER 3: Rosh Hashanah as the New Year and so much more Jason Kay

Exodus chapter 12 begins, "And God said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt: This month shall mark for you the beginning of the months; it shall be the first of the months of the year for you." Numbers chapter 29 begins, "In the seventh month, on the first day of the month, you shall observe a sacred occasion. You shall not work at your occupations. You shall observe it as a day when the horn is sounded."

when the horn is sounded."

At first glance, these two sentences seem to be in opposition to each other. The "first of the months" and the "day when the horn is sounded" both sound a lot like Rosh Hashanah, don't they? However, according to the verse in Numbers, the day when the horn is sounded is actually at the start of the seventh month. And furthermore, the verse from Exodus was actually spoken by God to Moses and Aaron as the Israelites were getting ready to leave Egypt, thus describing the month that we call Nisan, the seventh month.

In biblical times as described in the Torah, the Jewish year began on the anniversary of the Exodus from Egypt, and today, that event is sanctified smack dab in the middle of the year. According to the Torah, the first day of the seventh month should be observed "as a day when the horn is sounded," and various sacrifices are brought. That's literally all the information we have about the day that is now one of the pinnacle days of the calendar, the day called Rosh Hashanah. So how did it happen that the first month became the seventh and the seventh became the first? Even more so, where did the whole concept of Rosh Hashanah as the new year come from? And how did it all of a sudden become the Day of

Here's the incredible thing – we really don't know. By the time of the codification of the Mishnah around 200 CE, these ideas were already set, so the change happened some time between biblical times and the time of the Mishnah. Theories about the origins of this change are numerous, yet none, as far as I can tell, are universally accepted. Some ancient semitic cultures celebrated the New Year with fall-time harvests (Sukkot is such a fall-time harvest festival on our

Judgment and oh so much more?

calendar). Some argue that the Holy Day described in the Torah with the blowing of the horn became associated with the Babylonian new year celebration.

Whatever the reason, what is known for sure is that our calendar features multiple new years – four to be exact. The 15<sup>th</sup> of the month of Shevat (Tu Bishvat) is the new year for the trees, the first of the month of Elul is the new year for taxation, and then we have the first of the month of Nisan as

prescribed by the Torah and the first of the month of Tishrei which we now know as Rosh Hashanah. There are great discussions in the Talmud as to which New Year is more important – the month of Nisan (and the Holy Days of Passover) or the month of Tishrei (and the Holy Day of Rosh Hashanah). There is a common understanding that in Nisan, we celebrate the Jewish

people as a nation. On Rosh Hashanah, we celebrate the creation of the world and of all people.

That's right, somewhere in the passage of time, Rosh Hashanah, in addition to the "day when the horn is sounded" also became the celebration of the creation of humanity and the world in general. That is the origin of the passage in Musaf on Rosh Hashanah when we say (three times),

"Hayom harat olam, today, the world came into being." And if Rosh Hashanah is the annual celebration of the creation of humanity, then it is also the right time for humanity as a whole and as individuals to stand in judgment before God, the creator. And thus begins the traditions of the Book of Life, the 10 days of Repentance, and the association

ife, the 10 days of Repentance, and the association of Rosh Hashanah with Yom Kippur.

To me, it is telling that Rosh Hashanah has an incredibly rich history, most of which is not well documented or understood. We are left to wonder what brought it from being simply a Holy Day "when the horn is sounded" and no work is done to the two-day Festival we have today, the pinnacle of the Jewish year, New Year's Day, Judgment Day, and the birthday of the world.





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
