From the Rabbi's Desk - The Room Where it Happens



Were you in the room where it happened? Do you know how lucky you are to be alive right now?

Last month, the hit musical Hamilton came to the Bushnell. Judging from my Facebook feed alone, tons and tons of us were there. It was an amazing

experience to finally see the actors and choreography after hearing the music for several years. I enjoyed running into members of our community that night at the Bushnell. Everyone was happy and excited. Everyone felt so grateful to be "in the room." There was an incredible sense of shared experience, shared blessing, and shared opportunity.

Then I came home from the show to hear that my dear friend's father had died. Somewhat expected, incredibly tragic, too soon, and too young. I found myself – at 11pm that night – rearranging my entire week so that I could be with my friend and her family for the funeral and shiva. As a working mother, this is never easy, and I am so grateful to have a supportive team to help cover my absence both at work and at home.

But here's the point: as I drove to New Jersey the next morning at 5am, and as I sat in the synagogue waiting for the funeral to begin, and as I snuck into the family room to hug my friend, I realized it was only then that I was "in the room where it happens." We participated in what Judaism calls the ultimate act of kindness, *chesed shel emet*, burying the deceased and placing earth into the grave, knowing he can never thank us and never repay us. While no one felt "lucky" at that moment, we certainly felt blessed to be together.

Contrasting these two experiences – a musical and a funeral – in both we celebrate together, we grieve together, and we show up for each other. Again and again, I am reminded that WE make this community what it is: holy, supportive, joyous, meaningful, and so much more. I hope to see you at more musicals than funerals in 2019 – *auf simchas*, as we say in Yiddish, only joyous occasions! But wherever it is, and for whatever reason, may we be together in the room knowing how lucky we are to be alive and to be a part of the Beth El Temple Family.

***** Reflections from the President



The end of 2018 brought forth a dumpster fire full of anti-Semitism. We watched in horror the tragic losses at a Temple in Pittsburgh and,

closer to home, Jewish students being harassed at public schools in Woodbridge and West Hartford. We know these instances are increasing. The Anti-Defamation League has reported dramatic rises in anti-Semitic acts over the past few years. Of course, anti-Semitism is not a new problem for us as Jews; it has proven stubborn in its perseverance.

Looking back on our history, we often focus on oppression. But the

story of the Jewish people is one of survival. It's about a proud people who preserved the faith over thousands of years, through the rule of Romans and Babylonians, the Inquisition, pogroms, the gulags of Soviet Russia, and Nazi death camps.

We have taken prudent measures at Beth El to protect our synagogue from those misguided souls who wish us harm, and have many more ideas and plans in the works to guard our safety. At the same time however, we must deny those with the design to terrorize, to make us feel unmoored. Our goal is to say, 'You will not control our destiny."

As President Lincoln said at one of our darkest times,

With malice toward none, with charity for all, with firmness in the right as God gives us to see the right, let us strive on to finish the work we are in.

So, this year, I took exceptional pride in placing my menorah in my window for the world to see. I would not let a dark shadow be cast by anti-Semitic forces in our society. Instead, I let this beautiful light shine to my community as a beacon of hope and a badge of honor.

We are not going away, my friends. This synagogue and our ideals and beliefs in kindness and goodness will be here long after we are gone.

One might wonder how and why a group of young musicians from so far away came to Beth El Temple of West Hartford. This amazing connection happened because of



A Historical Refresher

This minor holiday wasn't always a festival. Instead, it was a key farming date that lews marked in ancient times.

"When you enter the land [of Israel] and plant any tree for food, you shall regard its fruit as forbidden. Three years it shall be forbidden for you, not to be eaten" (Leviticus 19:23).

The fruit a tree bore in year four was offered to the priests in the Temple, but the fruit of the fifth year (and all the ones after!) was for the farmers. The Rabbis established the 15th of the month of Shevat as the "birthday" for trees, regardless of when they were planted during the year.

* Sharing from Our Members

Once in a while, members submit an article to be shared with our community. For this issue, we received two notes with a similar theme. To the right is a *Thank You* letter to both our clergy and community. Below is the *D'Var Torah* written by a Trustee that was presented at the December Board Meeting (originally timed for the end of her mourning period at the November meeting, but that was cancelled due to weather).

They share similar lessons:

- ☆ importance of minyan attendance
- ★ healing power of minyan and community at a time of loss
- ★ reaffirmation of faith in God at a time of profound loss
- the importance of traditional Jewish mourning practices, including (in the latter) the mitzvah of *kibbud av v'aim*, honoring one's father and mother

At this time of Thanksgiving it is appropriate for me to say "thanks" to Beth El. I have been coming to morning minyan this month to say Kaddish for my brother, who passed away a few weeks ago.

Actually "thanks" doesn't even come close. It's been hard for me to deal with my brother's passing and the morning service has been very comforting. I am so grateful to all the "regulars" who come, for their warmth and comfort and for making me feel so welcome.

We are incredibly lucky at Beth El to have our Rabbis and Cantor who, day after day, teach and guide us with a kindness that is truly special.

I also appreciate the importance with which they treat the service and especially my need to say Kaddish. On the one snow day last week, when we didn't have a minyan, they and some of the congregants who were there got right on their phones to call around and ask for anyone who could to come in to make 10.

And it felt to me like it was their obligation, not just a kindness to me personally, to gather a minyan for someone needing to say Kaddish. I consider myself so fortunate to belong to our synagogue.

Thanks Rabbis Rosen, Garber, and Sowalsky, and Cantor Ness, for all you do and how beautifully you do it. And, thanks to all the minyanaires.

At the start of this week's parsha, Vayetze, in a place he comes to name Beth El, Jacob dreams of a ladder connecting earth and heaven. Here at *our* Beth El, at morning and evening minyan, I have found a ladder connecting earth and heaven as well. Following my mother's death almost a year ago, I chose to follow Jewish mourning practices, which involves saying Kaddish for one's parent for 11 months. I could not have known how important it would become to me, a chance to be with my feelings about my mother, in a sense to be with her, as if she was coming down the ladder, or I was going up.

The start of this parsha relates to my mourning experience in other ways as well. Following his dream and naming that place Beth El, Jacob vows,

> If God will be with me and will keep me on this path upon which I am going, and will give me bread to eat and clothing to put on. And I will return in peace to the house of my father: **then** God shall be God to me.

At this stage of Jacob's religious development, he did not yet have an *I-thou* relationship, but instead an *if-then* relationship. He would accept God if God provided for him. Part of what I found so meaningful about attending minyan for my mother was the built in absence of any transactional type *if-then* relationship. My mother had no way of giving back to me, at least not in a material sense. It allowed for a sense of pure connection that typically in life is difficult to find.

In the later part of Jacob's dream, God promises the land to Jacob's children and tells him the earth will be blessed through them. After that, the parsha describes the complicated relationships that gave rise to those children. It is a description of family, and of continuity, the connection that flows between one generation and the next. A connection that does not have to consist of interactions between perfect people. Jacob and his family were not. Yet still, a connection that goes forward and back, up and down the ladder. All of us here at Beth El are a part of it.


In the past I had attended minyan, and found it meaningful. However, I was still amazed by the support given and received during these recent 11 months of Kaddish. More than ever, I experienced, as Jacob states following his dream, "*God is in this place and I did not know it!*"

This mourning time has been a period of discovery, connection, and transition. Parsha Vayetze suggests these themes as well. As my period of mourning comes to an end, I appreciate being able to give this talk in honor of my mother. Baruch Dayan Ha-Emet – May her memory be for a blessing. *Meryl Danitz*


Library Corner

Almost Stranger than Fiction 🌣 Roberta J. Buland



A Tale of Two Citizens, by Elyce Wakerman, is a heart-wrenching story with knots-in-the-gut tension. A lie is the only thing that can get twenty-yearold Harry Himelbaum past the cold scrutiny of Ellis Island's immigration official, Will Brown. In 1929 America, economic depression and dust storms

abound. Abroad, the goose step of Nazism is intensifying. Widespread fear of "the other" has reached a fever pitch. Against this tumultuous backdrop, two families share the spotlight: the Himelbaums of Poland, and the Browns of Iowa. Harry Himelbaum wants to live somewhere happy, and to send for the wife and child he must deny having. A young, zealously patriotic Iowa lawyer, Will Brown has dedicated himself to staunchly upholding the nation's laws and keeping his America pure. Unexpectedly his childhood sweetheart and new wife, Barbara, forms a romantic attachment for Harry, the man he's sworn to keep out. Based on the true story of the author's father, this clash of love and loyalties is a picture of an America torn between being a symbol of hope for immigrants and a proud nation fighting to recreate itself.



Ending on a more hopeful note is *Never Forget My Soul*, by Michael M. Milgraum, child of a Holocaust survivor and a clinical psychologist. This psychospiritual novel describes the struggles of two men. Joe is a bold and crass surgeon, who scoffs at anything above or beyond himself and freely indulges his

passionate appetites. Adam is a painfully shy and anxious medical researcher, who seeks security in devout religious practice, but finds little relief from his discomfort. These most unlikely associates come together, with four other individuals, under the watchful eye of David Web, their group therapist. In order to find healing, the patients must tell their stories, and, in so doing, Adam and Joe find a common bond in war-torn Europe and the Holocaust, sixty years before. They must confront ghosts from that time that now live in them. Adam and Joe struggle together until both are forever changed, hope is renewed, and a new spirituality is forged.





A recent trip to Israel through AIPAC (American Israel Public Affairs Committee) gave us an eyeopening look at both political and personal aspects of life in our homeland.

In terms of Israeli security, we heard from the IDF about the massive arms buildups, including guided missile technology with rockets capable of reaching every part of Israel. Funding is from Iran, whose partnerships reach into every state surrounding Israel putting the IDF on constant high alert. In fact, we were there when the 25 hour 460+ rocket barrage was let loose on civilian targets in Israel's southern towns and cities. Yet despite being under constant threat, Israel devotes time, money, and energy to humanitarian projects that inspired us all.



Save a Child's Heart (SACH) at the Wolfson Medical Center in Holon, is an Israel-based international nonprofit organization

dedicated to improving the quality of pediatric cardiac care for children in developing countries and creating centers of competence in these countries. Every Tuesday, for example, children from Gaza and the West Bank are seen for free regardless of the political situation on the ground. This incredible mission is financed by Chupat Holim (Israel's national health plan), the Israeli government, and most importantly by donations. Over 4,900 children from 57 countries in Africa, South America, Europe, Asia, and the

Middle East, are alive today because of a small group of medical professionals who volunteer their time and expertise to perform life -saving cardiac surgery

Shalva, the Israel Association for the Care and Inclusion of Persons with Disabilities,



provides an impressive range of services for 2,000 individuals with disabilities from infancy to adulthood and their families. 


