





* From the Rabbi's Desk - Passover Post Pittsburgh



It's only been a few months, but all the pain and anguish of the synagogue shooting in Pittsburgh seems to have dissipated. It is a well-known pattern: a great tragedy followed by a sense of business as usual. The anguish and rallies, they have already receded into memory. The sense of a caring

community. How wonderful it would be to be united this way when all is peaceful.

But if we ponder where we are as a Jewish community we have no choice but to confront something that is very different. There is no questioning that we face anti-Semitism rearing its head both on the left and the right. Sometimes with horrific results.

And now we approach the first Passover post Pittsburgh. What might we find in our embrace of Pesach that can help us, inspire us, in this challenging time?

For me, the key is found in two passages in the Passover Haggadah that each begin with the phrase "in every generation." One states, "in every generation there were those who sought to destroy us."

It's true isn't it? There have been countless experiences throughout the generations of those who wished the Jewish world bodily and spiritual ill, if not destruction. I know that this line from the Haggadah will ring powerfully to those sitting at Seder tables in Pittsburgh this year. And for us as well.

But there is another "in every generation."

It's a line that continues "one must see oneself as if you personally were brought forth from Egypt." Which is to say that we are to work very hard to feel this sense of freedom and redemption. We are to live as liberated human beings who can help others know the dignity of freedom.

This is our responsibility, an opportunity, and a cause for celebration.

We would surely demean the losses of sacred souls were we to <u>pass over</u> the memories of those killed for simply being Jews. But we bid them and ourselves great honor by also living and celebrating as Jews.

For what is Pesach if not a precious opportunity to gather, experience freedom, and share it with all who are hungry?

Sometimes, celebration is defiance. And living meaningfully, a joyful assertion of who we are.

At the core of so much anti-Semitism is a conspiracy theory of Jewish power wielded to the harm of others. We know, and the world must know the truth. Our mission is to nurture the pinprick of conscience, the possibility of dignity, the beauty of freedom.

This Pesach let us proudly live this truth.

From our home to yours, a sweet and happy Passover.

★ Cantor's Corner - A Concert in Russia



Thoughts about my trip to Russia

I have always been fascinated and inspired by the liturgy, folk songs, and artistic work

that have been at the forefront of the collective culture of the Jewish people. So, when I was asked three years ago by the son of one of the greatest of all the *chazzanim* in the last 150 years to take his father's melodies and songs and recompose them for orchestras and choirs, I was intrigued by the idea.

Leib Glantz was born in 1898 in Russia. Over the course of his cantorial voice and davening, he was *sui generis* (unique) among cantors of the 20thcentury. I have always revered his honest and visceral approach to the text of our liturgy and have been moved time and time again, listening to his recordings.

I took about 25 of Leib Glantz's melodies and wove them into a continuous tapestry along with the reading of excerpts of Night by Elie Wiesel describing memories of the death of his family, the death of his own innocence, and his despair as a deeply observant Jew confronting the absolute evil of man. These readings were juxtaposed with my re-compositions of powerful texts confirming the principal tenets of Judaism and the strength of our belief in those tenets. The idea was also to have a program/concert that would call for a stop of the hate that is so much a part of the world as it is, by referencing the Shoah as the example of what happens when the powers of hatred are

unleashed.

conductor, three fabulous soloists, and four of the best choirs in Eastern Europe, and to make sure that the musical result met my approval. The outcome was wonderful, mostly because everyone involved in this project was dedicated to making an honest presentation by working together as a team.

It was a pleasure and an honor to be a part of this collaboration and I hope that my contributions added to the success of the whole project.

Cantor Ness traveled to Kaliningrad, Russia, for the world premiere of *The Night Holocaust Project* – a movement to portray the memoir of the late Elie Wiesel via the works of cantor and composer Leib Glantz. The premiere took place at the famous Kaliningrad Dome, on January 27 – the United Nation's International Day of Holocaust Remembrance.

The Night Holocaust Memorial event will be performed around the world by symphony orchestras and large-scale mixed-voice choirs. In addition, a professional actor will narrate 18 excerpts from Wiesel's *Night* memoir in the language local to the performance. Cantor Ness arranged most of the music for the orchestra, choir, and soloists!

* Preparing - Passover

A mitzvah of Passover is the removal of all *chametz* (leaven), both physically and symbolically, and all that has had contact with *chametz*. Jewish law forbids

eating (or even possessing) any food that can contain leaven.

According to Jewish law, instruments that are used throughout the year absorb leaven and may not be used on Passover. In traditional households, it

is customary to have special dishes that are only used during the Passover festival. See the next page for the process of *kashering*.

Bedikat Chametz - Search for Leaven

In anticipation of Pesach, it is traditional to engage in a thorough spring cleaning. Then, a formal search takes place right after sundown on the night before Pesach. A blessing is said, and the search is done by candlelight or flashlight, with a small bag to sweep up the crumbs, usually with a feather. Since the house has already been cleaned thoroughly, it is customary to put crumbs in a few places where they can be easily found. The following morning, the leaven is burned (*biur chametz*). No *chametz* is the eaten until the end of Passover.

Mekhirat Chametz - Transfer of Ownership

All *chametz* vessels (dishes, utensils, etc., and unopened food cartons or cans stored away during the Festival) should no longer <u>legally</u> be in one's possession.

How do we achieve this in accordance with Jewish law? An agent is empowered to enact a transaction with someone not Jewish. The sale has to take legal form, using a formal bill of sale. All *chametz* remains in that person's "ownership." At the end of the holiday, the agent arranges for the reversion of ownership of the now-permitted *chametz*. If ownership of the *chametz* was not transferred before the holiday, the use of this *chametz* is prohibited after the holiday as well.

You may observe this mitzvah by completing the form on page 23, or at <u>tinyurl.com/TransferChametz</u>. The form must be returned **before 9:00** AM, Fri, April 19.

Guidelines for Permitted and Prohibited Items

<u>PERMITTED FOODS</u> may require a *Kosher le-Pesach* label, and it may differ if purchased before or during the holiday:

- ♦ NO label if purchased PRIOR to Pesach: unopened packages or containers of natural coffee without cereal additives; sugar, pure tea (not herbal tea); salt (not iodized); pepper; natural spices; frozen fruit juices with no additives; frozen (uncooked) vegetables (for legumes, see *Kitniyot*); milk; butter; cottage cheese; cream cheese; ripened cheeses such as cheddar (hard), muenster (semi-soft) and Camembert (soft); frozen (uncooked) fruit (with no additives); baking soda.
- NO label if purchased PRIOR or DURING Pesach: **fresh** fruits and vegetables (for legumes, see *Kitniyot*, right), eggs, fresh fish, and fresh meat.
- ♦ NEED label if purchased PRIOR or DURING Pesach: all baked products (matzah, cakes, matzah flour, farfel, matzah meal, and any products containing matzah); canned or bottled fruit juices; canned tuna; wine, vinegar, liquor, oils, dried fruits, candy, chocolate flavored milk, ice cream, yogurt, soda.
- NEED label if purchased DURING Pesach: **processed** foods (canned, bottled, or frozen): milk, butter, juices, vegetables, fruit, milk products, spices, coffee, tea, and fish.

PROHIBITED FOODS include the following: leavened bread, cakes, biscuits, crackers, cereal, coffees containing cereal derivatives, wheat, barley, oats, spelt, rye, and all liquids containing ingredients or flavors made from grain alcohol.

KITNIYOT: Most Ashkenazic authorities have added the following foods to the above list:

- ♦ rice, corn, millet, legumes (beans and peas); however, string beans are permitted.
- ♦ Peanuts and peanut oil are permissible.
- ♦ We permit the use of legumes in a form other than their natural state, for example, corn sweeteners, corn oil, soy oil. Sephardic authorities also permit the use of all of the above.

MEDICINE: Chametz binders are used in many pills, but if required for life sustaining therapy, and general medical health, thet may be used. In all cases, capsules are preferable to pills.

Kashering Utensils for Passover

The process of kashering depends on how the utensils are used. According to *halakhah* (Jewish law), leaven can be purged from a utensil by the same process in which it was absorbed in the utensil (*ke-voleo kakh poleto*). Therefore, utensils used in cooking are kashered by boiling, those used in broiling are kashered by fire and heat, and those used only for cold food are kashered by rinsing.

- ♦ EARTHENWARE (china, pottery, etc.) may NOT be kashered. Exception: fine translucent chinaware which has not been used for over a year may be used if scoured and cleaned in hot water.
- ◆ **METAL** (wholly made of metal)
 - ♦ Utensils used in fire (spit, broiler) must first be thoroughly scrubbed and cleansed and then made as hot as possible.
 - ♦ Those used for cooking or eating (silverware, pots) must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned and completely immersed in boiling water. Pots should not be used for a period of at least 24 hours between the cleaning and the immersion in boiling water.
 - ♦ Metal baking utensils can NOT be kashered.
- ♦ OVENS AND RANGES: Every part that comes in contact with food must be thoroughly scrubbed and cleaned. Then, oven and range should be heated as hot as possible for a half hour. If there is a broil setting, use it.
 - ♦ Self-cleaning ovens should be scrubbed and cleaned and then put through the self-cleaning cycle.
 - ♦ Continuous cleaning ovens must be kashered in the same manner as regular ovens.
- ♦ SMOOTH GLASS TOP ELECTRIC RANGES should be cleaned thoroughly, and then turn on the coils to maximum heat until they are red hot. Carefully, pour boiling water on the entire surface area. **Note:** Some will not be able to be kashered.

- ◆ MICROWAVE OVENS which do not cook the food by means of heat should be cleaned, then a cup of water placed inside, and the oven turned on until the water disappears.
 - ♦ **Note:** A microwave oven that has a browning element can NOT be kashered for Pesach.
- ♦ GLASSWARE requires only a thorough scrubbing before Pesach, or putting them through a dishwasher. Some also soak in water for three days, changing the water every 24 hours.
 - ♦ **Glass Cookware:** After a thorough cleansing, there should be water boiled in them which will overflow the rim.
 - ♦ **Note:** Glass Bakeware, like metal bakeware, may NOT be kashered.
- ◆ DISHWASHER After not using the machine for a period of 24 hours, a full cycle with detergent should be run.
- ♦ ELECTRICAL APPLIANCES If the parts that come into contact with *chametz* are removable, they can be kashered in the appropriate way (if metal, follow the rules for metal utensils). All exposed parts should be thoroughly cleaned.
 - ♦ **Note**: If the parts are not removable, the appliance can NOT be kashered.
- ◆ TABLES, CLOSETS AND COUNTERS If used with *chametz*, they should be thoroughly cleaned and covered, and then they may be used.
- ♦ KITCHEN SINK A metal sink can be kashered by thoroughly cleaning and then pouring boiling water over it. A porcelain sink should be cleaned and a sink rack used. Dishes may NOT be soaked in a porcelain sink.
- ◆ CHAMETZ AND NON-PASSOVER UTENSILS Non-Passover dishes, pots, and *chametz* whose ownership has been transferred, should be separated, locked up or covered, and marked in order to prevent accidental use.




Library Corner

Rabbi Rosen calls Robert Alter's The Hebrew Bible: A Translation with Commentary "an astounding work that provides a truly fresh approach to the entire Hebrew Bible. He adds, "Alter's work is far more than a new translation. Embedded in his English version is a sometimes subtle, sometimes provocative

presentation of the world-view of these treasured texts illuminating them for readers of all backgrounds."

Alter's highly acclaimed work was begun in 1995. But judging from his over 30 scholarly previous works, he began to think about writing it many years before. It seems to be a culmination of his life's work.

In this work, Alter labored alone, singlehandedly translating the Bible in three volumes: *The Five Books* of Moses, Prophets, and Writings. Verse by verse, chapter by chapter, book by book, year after year, he labored to produce this exquisite Bible translation with his own thoughtful commentary. He found the hardest material in the *Prophets*, because of the form of elevated speech created by individuals with a mastery of poetry and rhetoric.



poetic couplet at Isaiah 1:3, "The ox knows its owner / and the donkey its master's stall," illustrates the pattern of focusing or concretization in the movement from the first verse to the second in biblical poetry. The first verse demonstrates the general relation of beast to owner; the second verse then focuses on the place of nurture connecting beast and master." Thousands of such examples support the scope and wonder of Alter's work.

Highly accessible to lay readers, *The Hebrew* Bible should be on everyone's bookshelf.

Israeli conservationists crowdfund to save endangered species – for as little as \$1, anyone can contribute to This is My Earth (TiME) to purchase and protect land in

biodiversity hotspots. Donors vote on where the money will go. www.this-is-my-earth.org

High tech paint uses the sun's rays to cool buildings – Herzilyabased SolCold makes a paint that uses the sun's rays to activate a cooling mechanism, providing air conditioning without



electricity. This electricity-free solution can be used anywhere from malls to homes, offices, cars, planes, etc. Trials are currently underway and potentially could mean a decrease of up to 60% in electrical costs!

One drug to treat a variety of incurable diseases – a novel peptide developed by Hebrew University-Hadassah Medical School Prof. David Naor is showing promise in its ability to treat a host of incurable diseases from Crohn's to Alzheimer's. If the clinical trials bear out this could potentially prove to be a miracle drug.



Special plastic wheel chairs distributed to needy children – Wheelchairs of Hope, colorful,

lightweight, inexpensive, low maintenance wheelchairs are the brainchild of plastics-industry executives Pablo Kaplan and Chava Rotshtein. Sized for kids, they are now helping children from South Africa to Vietnam, Peru, Tajikistan, Argentina, and Guatemala.

Israeli experts help community leaders after the Parkland school shooting – professionals from the
Israel Trauma Coalition arrived within days to train
teachers, social workers, law enforcers, clergy, and first

responders in resiliency strategies. They have also helped communities in Houston and Pittsburgh. Also on hand to provide help were Israeli aid organizations ZAKA Search and Rescue, United Hatzalah Psychotrauma & Crisis Unit, and Dream Doctors.

Automated handwashing stations for Indian Children – thanks to



Soapy, children in areas of India that lack running water can clean their hands properly with off-grid, solar-powered, self-sustaining hygiene stations. This social-impact start-up has developed a machine that starts automatically when someone approaches delivering a precise dose of soap along with water harvested from the air.

No-prep alternative to colonoscopy wins CE approval in Europe – now in pilot studies in the U.S., <u>Check-Cap's</u> C-scan ingestible x-ray capsule passively collects data allowing maps of the colon before being eliminated naturally. Physicians look at the maps on a clinical data viewer to identify any abnormalities needing further examination.



Israeli NGO, Save A Child's Heart (SACH), received the 2018 UN Population Award – SACH has treated, at no charge, more than 4800 children

from 57 countries, Gaza, and the Palestinian Authority territories, and has trained cardiology teams from those countries.


