From the Rabbi's Desk

Why I Revere Torah



The following is being printed by request. It was the sermon of October 2, 2021.

Each year when we reach the beginning, the start of the Torah cycle where we focus on Genesis, I find myself with an almost giddy kind of

excitement. Part of it, of course, is the opportunity to visit some old friends. The power of the Creation Epic, the ever-evolving meaning of the Garden of Eden, Noah, the Flood, the Patriarchs, the Matriarchs. We've all spent a lot of time together and they still have so much more to teach.

But more than anything else, I realize that the start of the Torah cycle all over again reminds me of just how much I revere that scroll, this book, and all of the millions of pages that have been written based upon these passages.

I'd like to share just a part of that reverence with you today; it's a kind of credo if you will. You need not agree with me, of course. But hopefully, you might find yourself wondering if, maybe, there just might be some of the same feelings within you.

I revere Torah because it gives me a vision of life. It provides for me an answer to the three questions Rabbi Jonathan Sacks says every sensitive person should ask: Who am I? What is my purpose? How then shall I live?

Torah tells me that like everyone else in this room, everyone else in this world, we are of infinite value because God created us all in the Divine Image. And my purpose is to reflect that image in living a life of ethical and spiritual striving. And that every day and every moment is filled with the possibilities of significance as a result.

I revere Torah because it tells us that we are here to embrace a notion of radical equality. "Why," said the sages, "did God create a single human being?" To demonstrate that all of us trace our ancestry to that initial person. No one's blood is redder than anyone else's. No one can claim superiority to anyone else. No Pharaoh, no dictator, no monarch.

I revere Torah because it tells me I should seek ethical excellence in life. Thirty-six times we are told to respect, care for and love the stranger. The orphans and widows, the vulnerable are my business. I don't know if they would be on my radar nearly as much without these texts.

I revere Torah because it reminds me as unique and precious as every individual is, we live in community. That in the musical skills of life our culture does fine with Do - Re - Mi [me], but it doesn't tend to get

*** Cantor's Corner** - What is Trope?



יְּשָׁמֵע יִשְׂרָאֵל יְ-הָוָה אֱלֹקֵינוּ יְ-הָוָה ן אֶחֲד: Sh' ma Yisrael Adonai Eloheinu Adonai Echad Hear O Israel the Lord is our God, the Lord is One

This first verse is perhaps the central

text that speaks to the core of our belief.

The verse שָׁמַע יִשְׂרָאֵל (Hear O Israel) and the following 3 paragraphs, all from the Torah, are recited twice a day, in the morning and evening services. It is also found in other sections of the prayer service and recited as the final prayer of Yom Kippur. When we recite the *Sh'ma* and the three paragraphs that follow, we can sing through all of it. If you look at the Hebrew of the *Sh'ma* and those three Torah portions that follow the *Sh'ma*, you will notice of course, that the text has vowels underneath and on top of every word, but additionally there are other markings below and above the text:

ַןאָהַרְהָּ אָת יִ-הוָה אֶלֹהֵידִ בְּכָל־לְבָרְתָּ וּבְכָל־נִפְשְׁהָ וּבְכָל־מְאֹדֶך

Those markings are called *ta'amim* (tropes), and they tell us how to chant the melody for these words. Tropes are found in our liturgy as early as the 6th century from Babylonia. But in that time there were no visible markings. (continues on facing page)

These tropes were learned by ear from generation to generation and aided by the use of chironomy (hand signals) used by a knowledgeable person to show the Torah reader whether the melody for the text would ascend or descend. These *ta'amim* not only show the melody but how the words in the text should be accented, and they even dictate how the phrase structure of the text is to be followed.

There were three main sources for these tropes:

- 1) the Babylonian
- 2) the Palestinian
- 3) the Tiberian

The first two systems were the oldest. The Tiberian manner of marking their tropes (10th century) is more similar to the markings we use today.

Over the course of time, the Jewish people migrated to various corners of Europe, including the Eastern (Ashkenazic) areas, to Spain and Morocco (Sephardi) and even to Italy; all these areas carried their own flavor of melodies – the tropes that would be used for reading the Torah, haftarah and the various *megillot* (scrolls):

- 1) Shir Hashirim on Passover
- 2) the Book of Ruth on Shavuot
- 3) Eicha on Tisha B'Av
- 4) Kohelet on Sukkot
- 5) the Book of Esther on Purim
- 6) and even a different trope for the Torah and Haftarot on the *Yamim Noraim* (High Holydays)

These *megillot* would have different melodies for the various holidays to emphasize the overall ideas and themes of each holiday.

What a deep, beautiful, and rich tradition we have to glean from! We, at Beth El, are committed to bringing these traditions to you and for those who would like to learn more about these "*ta'amei hamikra*" we would love to hear from you!

We transition from Shabbat to the new week with this brief service using the traditional symbols of a burning candle, a spice box, and wine. Mourner's Kaddish is recited at the beginning.

Egalitarian Services

Our congregation invites broad participation, within the limits of social distancing. Congregants of all ages and genders read *Torah*, chant the *Haftarah*, and lead our services along with our clergy. Many women choose to wear a *tallit*, and head coverings for women vary between *kippot*, hats, headbands, doilies, and no covering (unless they go on the *bima*).

*** Observing at Home** - Chanukah

Lighting the *Chanukiah* (Chanukah Menorah)

A *Chanukiah* takes nine candles, eight at the same level and one *shamash* (guardian) that stands taller and is used to light all the others. Place the candles in the *Chanukiah* right-to-left (as Hebrew is written and read), but light them left-to-right so that the new candle is lit first.

Each night, you say the first two blessings below, and on the first night you add the third blessing. After you say the blessings, you light the candles.

The 1st night of Chanukah this year is **Sunday, November 28**.



Chanukah Candle Lighting

A Historical Refresher

In 168 BCE, Syria's King Antiochus marched into Jerusalem to end Jewish worship in his kingdom. His soldiers desecrated the Temple and killed thousands of people. Three years later, Judah, a son of Mattathias the Kohen (priest), led a rebellion and re-took Jerusalem. His search for pure, untainted olive oil to light the menorah – thus rededicating and returning Jewish practice to the Temple – netted enough for only one day. Miraculously, it lasted for eight.

beyond it. It's "me" it's "mine" it's "my freedoms," iPad, iPhone, <u>I</u> everything. Selfie photos and self-absorption.

Along comes Torah and says the real scales of life are not Do - Re - Mi [me] but rather, "Go, Say, We." Speak the language of others and their needs. Get comfortable with "us." Government cannot tell you that you have responsibilities as a citizen to others beyond rights. But religious tradition does. No school can force you to feel a debt to the past or the future. We have Matzah, Maror, Yizkor, a yearning for the Messiah, they are part of our DNA. We are the bridge between past and future.

I revere Torah because with it I am never alone. I know that at any given moment thousands of Jews around the world are studying the same passages I am looking at. When I pick up a text I literally am reading the words of those who lived in a dozen different places over 1000 different years, all talking and arguing with each other. And I get to join them.

I revere Torah because its heroes are weak and vulnerable. Abraham, Sarah, Isaac, Rebecca, King David, King Solomon they are all filled to overflowing with faults. And still they become great. If they can rise to the heights of leadership, surely I can scale a small hill. I revere Torah because it tells me that nothing about today is forever. We can be agents of change. Our business is that of Tikkun. Of healing, of fixing the hurt of repair. That's why Jewish communities rush in to support each other when we are under attack, send in rescue teams throughout the world when there is an earthquake or a hurricane or when an apartment complex collapses in Florida. That's what Israel does. It's a Jewish imperative.

I revere Torah because it reminds me that sometimes the greatest challenges in life are not overcoming external obstacles but our own internal demons. Our reptilian brains want us to go and grab whatever we want and have it whatever way we want it. Even if it hurts others. I read BF Skinner and I think it's because of environment, just change that and things will be fine.

I read Paige Harden I think it must be genes. I listen to Officer Krupke from <u>West Side Story</u>, and I think it's both.

Then you open to <u>Genesis</u> and read (in a free translation) Sinning, missing the target is always a close-by temptation? But if you try you can conquer it. And so, beyond genes and environment, there remains human will and accountability.

Designer Roy Austin had a large book collection and had the spine of every book turned inward so that you only saw a sea of white pages. He liked the uniform look this presented.

I can't imagine this encouraged anyone to pick up a book and read it. Torah would have us see the spines

facing us – to pick up the book. More importantly Torah would have us live with our spines turned outward to live a life that is countercultural, that is rich and meaningful challenging and dynamic.

We are .002% of the world's population. But this is our way. This is our vision. This is what has kept us for thousands of years and always will if we learn it and live it.

Just a few reasons why I revere Torah. And I truly, truly hope as we continue along the journey again this year, you will too.

A Forever Love Memoir 🌣 Roberta J. Buland

In the inspiring memoir, *My Wife Said You May Want to Marry Me*, Jason B. Rosenthal discusses life, love, loss, and new beginnings about his life with his wife, Amy Krouse Rosenthal. It is based on a "modern love" story she wrote for the *New York Times, You May Want to Marry My Husband*, that appeared ten days before her death from ovarian cancer. It is a



heartbreaking, wry, honest, and creative play on a personal ad – in which a dying wife encouraged her husband to find happiness after her passing.

Jason describes his commitment to respect Amy's wish, even as he struggled with her loss. Surveying his life before, with, and after Amy, he wrestles with love, the pain of watching Amy suffer, and what it means to heal – how he and their three children manage to go on. His emotional journey offers insights on dying, death, and the excruciating pain of losing a soulmate, illuminating the lessons he has learned.

Jason's detailed reflection on Amy's gift to him of a fresh start also describes how he continues to honor Amy's life and her last wish. He struggles to appreciate every day and live in the moment while trying to help others coping with loss. It is a poignant, unreserved, and inspiring story of a great love and the aftermath of a marriage ended too soon.

The memoir is a must read for anyone who is coping with loss and seeking ways to heal and help others in the process.

the new Director of the AIES) started the new <u>Center for</u> <u>Renewable Energy and</u> <u>Energy Conservation</u>, an integral partner in the Arava region's rapid progress to become Israel's "Silicon Valley" in research, development, and technology of renewable energy.



Leveraging the Arava Valley's specific climatic conditions and the high solar radiation levels, The Center's research focuses on energy policy, solar fuels, photovoltaic technologies, biomass, wind and solar thermal energy, innovative building construction techniques to conserve energy in desert climates. Other projects include self-cleaning solar panels, biogas technology, solar-powered desalination, and more.

<u>The Renewable Energy Workshop</u>, established in 2015, develops off-grid, small-scale technologies for rural and marginalized communities, while the Arava <u>Center for Sustainable Development</u> provides research, training, and services to the developing world. The <u>Arava Alumni Programs Department</u> builds cooperative alumni initiatives, enhancing Jewish-Arab networking in the Middle East, and generously sharing their knowledge with the world.

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
