them. We literally get a breath of fresh air as we begin and end our day in the sukkah.

As with all Jewish holidays there are a number of practices associated with Sukkot. While the chief practice is dwelling in the sukkah, others include blessings over the lulav and etrog. These items are rich in symbolism and are fun to wave around as we remember the principles of unity in diversity, the omnipresence of divinity and the gifts of nature. We are also reminded of the mitzvah of hospitality. Not only do we invite many others into our sukkot (or homes if we don't have a sukkah) at this time, we also invite the spirits of our ancestors and historical or biblical figures who have served to inspire us. As always, we remember those who do not have access to the bounties of the harvest and find ways to share our food and resources. Tikkun olam, repair of the world, is part of everything that we do.

Finally, we culminate our celebration on the 7th night with Simhat Torah, a festival honoring the cyclical nature of Torah reading (we conclude Deuteronomy and recommence Genesis) and of life. 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Torah Treks Year 7 Begins ISAIAH, JEREMIAH, & EZEKIEL

Elsie Stern, PhD, Associate Professor of Bible at the RRC returns to kick off our year of study and introduce us to this year's Books - Isaiah, Jeremiah, and Ezekiel. Dr. Stern is a biblical scholar whose teaching often focuses on social justice issues. She has been an assistant professor in the Department of Theology at Fordham University, where she taught Bible and Jewish studies, and she served as the assistant director for public programs at the University of Pennsylvania's Center for Advanced Judaic Studies. In addition to her academic teaching and research, she has taught widely in both formal and informal educational settings in the United States and abroad. She has written curricula on a wide range of topics, including Jewish literature and artistic representations of biblical subjects. Her current research focuses on the transmission and reception of biblical texts in early Jewish settings. Stern received her Bachelor of Arts from Yale University and her Master of Arts and doctorate from the University of Chicago. She is the author of From Rebuke to Consolation: Bible, Exegesis and Ritual in the Literature of the Tisha b'Av Season (Brown Judaic Series, 2004) and a contributor to the Jewish Study Bible and the Women's Torah Commentary (Women of Reform Judaism, 2008).

Torah Treks is an amazing multi-year journey through the entire Hebrew Bible. We begin each year with an overview of whichever Books we are studying and then continue with an in-depth look at each individual Book. Each session is held after Shabbat morning services and is taught by Rabbi Linda or our guest faculty. Each program is independent. Come for all the sessions or attend selectively. There is no charge for lunch or the study sessions and RSVPs are not necessary. Whether you are able to attend services or not, you are welcome to come for lunch and Torah Treks.

TIKKUN OLAM SHABBAT: Expanding Our Understanding October 12

w/ Rabbi Linda & Adnan Zulfigar

"Living Islam: On Being Muslim Today"

Adnan Zulfiqar will discuss the foundations of Islam as a global faith of almost two billion adherents while trying to relate what that means for different people, in different places and at different times. The aim will be to show what unites Muslims in terms of belief, doctrine, etc. while also giving the audience a sense of the diversity of the faith. Through both academic insights and personal reflections, it is hoped the audience will gain a better sense of what strengthens the believing Muslim and their foremost challenges both here in America and globally.

About our Speaker: Adnan Zulfiqar is a doctoral candidate in Near Eastern Languages & Civilizations at the University of Pennsylvania where his work focuses on Islamic legal history and Qur'anic studies. Among his previous roles he has served as the Muslim Chaplain at the University of Pennsylvania, Law & Public Policy Fellow at Annenberg's Center for Global Communication Studies, Adjunct Professor at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College, Presidential Fellow at the Salzburg Global Seminar and Team Leader on the Shari'a and Commentary Section of the Maldives Penal Code Project.

In addition, Adnan served on the Steering Committee of the Jewish/Muslim Emerging Leaders Retreat, the board of Masjid Quba, the Administrative Committee of the Religious Leaders Council of Greater Philadelphia and as an Associate at the Dialogue Institute.

Adnan received his B.A. in Religion & Anthropology from Emory University, his M.L.S. in International Affairs from Georgetown University, his M.A. in Arabic & Islamic Studies from the University of Pennsylvania and his J.D. from the University of Pennsylvania Law School. Born in Virginia, Adnan has spent over a decade living and studying in the Middle East, South Asia and Africa, and speaks five different languages. He currently practices law in Washington, DC and is a Fellow with the Truman National Security Project.

PLANS FOR NEW HEATING SYSTEM AT BETH ISRAEL ARE UNDERWAY

In October and December of 2011, FewSteps.org assisted Beth Israel with conducting an energy audit of the facility. We found that there is a clear opportunity for substantial efficiency and energy cost savings through equipment upgrades and conversion to gas-fired units. We have arrived at a near-final project configuration which was approved by the board on August 15th. We are finalizing and letting the contracts in the next few weeks for installation in the fall months.

A few factors made this project cost effective today when it was not when last evaluated a few years ago. Even though at that time we could have benefited from the equipment efficiency boost, the difference in the oil and gas costs were not as dramatic as they are today, and now some of the equipment is at or near the end of its useful life.

The project includes:

PECO installing a gas line from S. New Middletown Road to the kitchen wall.

Replacing the existing boiler and furnaces with >90% efficient, gas-fired equipment for at least a 10% efficiency increase, better system control, safeties and room thermostats.

Replacing the now failed electric hot water heater with a new gas unit and installing a timer to minimize heating water when the building is not occupied.

Installing efficient Heat/Cool heat-pump systems with ductless splits for the Rabbi and Arlene's offices to provide comfort [eliminating their need for electric space heaters] and for the second floor. Also installing a small heater in the main floor bathroom.

There are other smaller issues being addressed but the above reflects the substance of the change.

These combined measures will allow us to optimize temperature control and thus minimize energy use and maximize comfort. For those wondering about the Hebrew school level, please note that we found that size of the heating system supplying that area to be oversized and therefore any historic problems appear to be a result of poor room control and that the fins were found in the closed position.

This project will cost up to about \$75,000 plus a 12% contingency in case something unexpected is encountered. There will be a reduction in the congregation's operating expenses, an improvement in system efficiency and delivery effectiveness and a reduction in the congregation's footprint. We expect a payback in 5 to 6 yrs, lowering our heating bill from about \$16,000/yr. to approximately \$4000/yr.

Another very exciting aspect of the conversion is the reduction in BI's atmospheric emissions that can be attributed directly to the fuel conversion:

- CO₂e [Green House Gas]: DECREASE of 14.213 Ton/yr. or 31.88%
- SO2 [Sulfur Dioxide]: DECREASE of 0.28 Ton/yr. or 99.94%
- Less significant: NOX [Nitrogen oxides] and Particulate matter reductions and CO [Carbon Monoxide and VOC] increases. [<30lb/yr./ea.]

This past year has been an opportunity to review and plan for both improvement of the efficiency of our building and also the sustainability of our operations. In the midst of several discussions during the past year the board also explored what our faith teaches us about our roles as stewards of the earth. We believe the gas conversion project allows us to live out these values within the context of our community.


Shemini Atzeret/Simchat Torah Eighth Day of Assembly/Rejoice in the Torah

Hebrew School Convenes

Hebrew school started Sept 9th in the newly renovated class-rooms, brighter and lighter than before, thanks to the Gilbert Fund's generosity and Reisa Mukamal's coordination.

Rabbi Linda Potemken, Principal Helene Cohen and Education Committee Chair Jackie Gelman spoke to the parents and explained the program for the coming year. The older kids (Vav & Zayin, grades 6-7) in particular have more trips than before, including seeing the Dead Sea Scrolls, the DC Holocaust Museum, and the National Museum of American Jewish History.

The curricula varies by age. The Mechina class (pre-school, Eve Atkins, assisted by Elan Nash) is introduced to the Holidays and learns through music and movement. *This class is open to non-BI members*.

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

Is "Eat Drink Man Woman" Really a Jewish Film?

October 20 7:00 Havdalah 7:15 Movie 9:30 Discussion with BI member Louis Friedler

When Ang Lee and James Schamus, the co-authors of the screenplay for *Eat Drink* Man Woman, went to Taipei to prepare for the film, Schamus brought Lee a first draft. Lee thought it wasn't "Chinese" enough, so Schamus re-imagined all the names as Jewish and rewrote the script with these characters in mind. When he brought it back, Lee thought it was much more Chinese. Is this film about Chinese, Jewish, or universal values?

We will begin with a brief introduction to traditional Chinese values, watch the film, and then discuss it, briefly noting that it has been re-made as Tortilla Soup, set in Southern California

BI member Louis Friedler periodically teaches a course on Chinese film at Arcadia University, where he is Chair of the Computer Science and Mathematics Department. He recently led a group of students on a tour of Shanghai and is currently working on a crossnational study comparing calculus performance by university students in the U.S. and China.


