Rabbi's Message

RETELLING OUR LIBERATION STORY

In the midst of the narrative of the ten plagues the Torah takes an interesting pause to describe in detail the preparations and celebration of the Passover holiday. The Torah even imagines at the moment a time when the need to re-tell the story will be inevitable, "And when your children ask you, "What do

you mean by this rite?' you shall say, 'It is the passover sacrifice to YHVH who passed over the houses of the Israelites in Egypt when smiting the Egyptians, but saved our houses.' (Ex. 12:26-27).

I love that the essence of Passover, from its origins, is not only the food and the cleaning (which it is) but also the understanding that the only way to truly keep a historical event meaningful is to continue to creatively retell it generation after generation.

Some commentators, such as Noam Zion from the Shalom Hartman Institute, posit that the Haggadah itself is simply a teacher's outline for how to structure an interesting story telling about the Exodus. And when it came to key verses from the narrative, the traditional Haggadah suggests that we do what Jews do best, engage in close reading and exegesis of the text — playing with the words of Torah. Even the central Mah Nishtanah prayer, Zion argues, is meant to provide a model for how to ask questions about the story and the ritual; any answers that come along are secondary to the questions.

In our contemporary Sedarim, we continue and extend this creative exegesis in new ways. The Reconstructionist Haggadah, A Night of Questions, includes a play to act out. We often turn to first person narrative, inviting participants in the seder to reflect on liberation in their own lives and circumstances. And of course — from Rabbi Arthur Waskow's Freedom Seder in 1969 and beyond, we also have a tradition of using the seder to connect to liberation struggles around the globe through the lens of the seder rituals.

Even the seder plate continues to grow with additional symbols of liberation. There's the orange on the seder plate for Feminism and later LGBTQ equality, (which my children think was put there by Miriam herself,) a tomato to recognize the Immolakee workers in Florida seeking fairer wages and representing the rights of workers more broadly, an acorn to represent and acknowledge the indigenous land on which we are living and the people who have stewarded this land for many generations. I'm sure you can think of others.

The beauty of the seder and the retelling of the Exodus tale is that it is not a static ritual, but continues to evolve and change, allowing us to regularly inject meaningful new narratives and to "reconstruct" this ritual so that it continues to provide meaning and depth for current and future generations.

Whether you are joining our Seder at Beth Israel this year and/or attending other Seders, I invite you to consider bringing your own reflections and creativity to this Jewish moment. Here are some options for consideration of ways to bring the seder more directly into the lives of those sitting around the table:

- Find a way for those who would like to share a story from their family or their own lives that illustrates the power of liberation?
- Invite seder-goers to bring with them an object that represents liberation and find a time during the seder (Perhaps during dinner) in which everyone can tell the story of their object.
- Bring back old or start new traditions at your seder! Include special foods, songs or melodies that connect you to your family and brings in a piece of your personal ancestry that you get to carry with you on your journey.

I want to bless us, as we enter this ritual passage of the seder and connect with friends and family, that we allow ourselves to be open to new and innovative teachings and experiences that will generate new meanings for us in our own journeys of liberation.

All year long we are invited to reflect upon the Jewish redemption narrative through the daily liturgy, but for the week of Pesach it is front and center. The simplest of seders can be created by exhibiting the traditional seder plate items along with matzoh and then exploring their significance. Some years people add one or more additional items to signify a contemporary struggle against oppression.

This year, I am going to add a whole second seder plate to the table, with items representing the many ways we are still working to uplift our world from apathy, exploitation and inequity. Like the traditional seder plate that has items representing both pain and liberation and some exemplifying both, this plate will not only illustrate the pain and perils of this moment in time, but will contain items that signify hope. Join me in creating this second seder plate. What might you place on it this year?

Legacy Gifts for Congregation Beth Israel


As you are probably aware, four of our beloved congregants passed away this past year. They are sorely missed and will be for many years to come.

We show our continuing love for our departed congregants through prayer, memorial gifts, naming committees or events honoring them.

One of our recently departed friends left a legacy donation to Beth Israel, which we also want to acknowledge. This individual had purchased an annuity for retirement and named Beth Israel as the beneficiary of the remaining balance after their death. The balance was substantial, and the Board determined to transfer the donation into the synagogue's Endowment Fund which will help Beth Israel to provide services and education for years to come. 

Awe and Intimacy in Jewish Tradition Learning on ZOOM with Rabbi Richard Hirsh May 16, 23, 30 at 7:30

Jewish tradition embraces a continuum of experience, from the internal and intimate to the external and overpowering. While these have often been presented as oppositional (example: the "cathedral synagogue" vs. the living-room havura), they can also be approached as complementary.

We will explore the dynamics of awe and intimacy in Jewish ritual and liturgical practice; in Jewish spiritual tradition, including conceptions of God; and in the realm of Jewish moral-ethical imperatives, with attention to the collective demands of the prophets and the interior cultivation of the mussar tradition.



From the Pen of Richard Remenick

In 1920, the German-Jewish philosopher Franz Rosenzweig (1886-1929) opened the House of Jewish Learning (sometimes referred to as the Lehrhaus) in Frankfurt, Germany. The Lehrhaus was not a Hebrew school in our modern sense, but a space in which Jewish adults could gather and reestablish their connection to Judaism through learning. Crucially, Rosenzweig realized that many of these adults were deeply educated in secular, non-Jewish subjects, (the "outside" books) and therefore partially alienated from Judaism.

Rosenzweig's approach was not "to adorn life with a few pearls of thought from the Talmud" but to develop a new kind of learning, "... learning in reverse order. A learning that no longer starts from the Torah and leads into life, but the other way round: from life, from a world that knows nothing of the Law, or pretends to know nothing, back to the Torah". In this way Jews could find their way back into "the heart of our life. And of being confident that this heart is a Jewish heart. For we are Jews".

Accordingly, a physician, chemist, politician, or historian could become learners and teachers at the Lehrhaus and not only that, but these secular professionals could use whatever they had learned in the secular world and bring it into their understanding of Judaism. Even though the Lehrhaus only existed for about a decade, Rosenzweig's vision of Jewish adult education remains powerful and extremely moving.

Tutoring the children of the Chester Eastside Inc. Tutoring by BI members, led by Louis Friedler, continues with new and continuing leadership at CEI. We have about 11 BI members (or friends of BI members) currently coaching in CEI's Out of School Time Program this semester.

Ala Hamilton Day is coordinating our annual **Passover Food Drive**, benefiting the Media Food Bank. Some donations were collected after the Purimspiel and delivered to the food bank. Another call for donations will go out in concert with Passover and the BI Seder.

The committee is working with Rabbi Nathan on the **Mitzvah Day** activity on April 23, focused on putting together "must have" packages of personal toiletries for recent immigrants aided by HIASPA. The HS children and the rest of the congregation will be invited to help assemble the bags. Basha Silverman is chairing the event for BI and has put up a Signup Genius for needed items.

The committee hosted a **presentation by Fran Stier, the founder of the Chester Community Coalition,** which is providing trauma-informed counseling to victims and family members affected by violence in Chester. She covered research that showed how such programs have been having noticeable results, both locally and nationwide. A video of her presentation was posted to the Forum.

Judy Kinman, Amy Strauss, John Greenstine, and Amy Binder joined David Cashell at one of his regular shifts at the Jewish Family and Children Services' "In Closet" warehouse in Springfield. The team sorted clothing by gender and type, discarding soiled or damaged garments. Another volunteer date will be announced soon.





Through SAC, BI sponsored Mei'ra to purchase much-needed Hebrew textbooks for **Abayudaya Hebrew School** students in Uganda. The Ugandan Jewish tribal schools are in need of texts and a variety of learning materials. Mei'ra has been teaching online in classrooms there and has worked with Rabbi Nathan and Kulanu.org, a US organization that supports the Jews of that country. A rabbi will hand-carry the books to the classrooms when she

returns home in April from her rabbinical training. Mei'ra's work to identify a personal delivery to Uganda was critical, as we have learned that funds donated and items ordered for delivery there are highly likely to be stolen.

EARTH MONTH UPDATE: SOLAR PROJECT AT BETH ISRAEL IS NOW COMPLETE!

Beth Israel's solar team is pleased to report that with the installation and activation of bidirectional metering and the permit to operate, our 26kW, 61-panel solar array is now fully installed. We expect that the 31.2 MWh that the array is expected to generate annually should meet the vast majority of the synagogue's electricity needs by providing clean, renewable energy.

How did we get here?

The installation of the solar array reflects over a decade of Greening and Sustainability work undertaken by many BI volunteers. Some particular efforts, among the many who have helped include:

Elaine Feldman for her general leadership on our BI efficiency projects,

Rabbi Linda's leadership in supporting sustainability work at Beth Israel

Chris Pragman in lending his expertise and assuring the building thermostats were optimally chosen and also programmed

The tech team - Josh Waterston, John Greenstine and Steve Platt in assuring the electronic communications of this equipment is ever-more robust

Jennifer Lenway's and Steve Goldfield's leadership on our oil to gas furnace conversion

Denny Waldman, Josh Waterston, and Reisa Mukamal's work in the early relamping of the sanctuary and other synagogue lighting

Others in our facilities committee resiliently maintain equipment to reduce our energy consumption and work on other efficiency projects.

Since 2007 we have managed to halve our energy use and carbon emission!

Some of the highlights of this previous work included:

- 🕏 Careful benchmarking and tracking of our energy consumption over time to identify and repair inefficient equipment.
- *Thorough auditing of our building systems and good communication with congregants and committees to make sure we are using our building efficiently.
- * Reducing our electricity use by upgrading our internal and external lighting and control systems, and switching out inefficient lighting systems to higher efficiency CFL and LED technology
- Reducing our heating and cooling costs by converting an inefficient oil furnace and boiler system to high efficiency gas units, correcting heating zones and appropriate air circulation equipment, and adding programmable thermostats. We also installed high efficiency heat pump systems in the well-used offices that have saved on heating costs as well!
- * Replacing an oil furnace with a high efficiency gas furnace in the "Green House" and other measures to reduce green-house heating costs

These major HVAC upgrades, recycling and early relamping efforts were shortly followed in 2013, by our involvement with Greenfaith, a grassroots, multi-faith movement for the climate, which allowed Beth Israel to earn a Green synagogue certification. This was due to the additional initiative of Jennifer Lenway and the combined efforts of Elaine Feldman, Marion Hamermesh, Shoshanna Gottlieb, Debbie Wile, Don Huddler, Anita Weber, and Rabbi Linda Potemken

Why install solar now?

Beth Israel has previously explored the possibility of installing a solar array, but the conditions were ripe for making this project a reality. Solar array costs have dropped and solar panel efficiency has significantly improved over the years, and we learned from our successful oil to gas furnace conversion project (a \$70,000 effort) that congregants are willing to lend money to help our building become more sustainable.

After some initial exploration of this possibility with a local faith-based solar consultant, the Congregation, with the support of Rabbi Nathan, formed an ad-hoc solar committee that pulled together some needed expertise to move a solar project forward. The committee included people who could help with developing and issuing a request for proposals, developing

and reviewing contracting, creating financing models, gathering investors, generating publicity, reviewing designs, and more. Most of the heavy lifting for this project was done by Elaine Feldman, Harry Chen, and Steve Goldfield. And, after selecting a solid partner with Solar States the project was able to move forward.

In particular, Beth Israel created an innovative way of financing the \$72,000 project, and we are grateful to Timothy Mann and Jessie Reagan Mann who formed a Limited Liability Company (18 Rays) which invested its own principle and was lent money by six BI investors and the BI capital fund to raise the monies needed to purchase the panels. With the 30% Federal Tax Credit on solar installations, along with an investment depreciation incentive, Solar Renewable Energy Credit payments, and a special \$5,000 donation by a BI congregant to the project, 18 Rays and all the lenders to the project should all receive their loans back within six to seven years.

And in the meantime, Beth Israel will be both lowering its long-term electricity costs while also doing its part to lessen its impact on global warming caused by the use of fossil fuels by reducing its fossil fuel emissions by 10 tons/year through the solar array.

What's Next?

The solar committee is extremely pleased with the successful installation of our solar array. It is a daily reminder that when we can put our heads together and dedicate time, energy, and resources, we can make a difference in creating a more sustainable Beth Israel.

And we realize that there is more work yet to come. Given the urgency of the rapidly changing climate we know that we will need to continue to explore additional opportunities for further greening and sustainability. As Rabbi Tarfon teaches in our mishnah, "it is not incumbent on us to finish the work but we must not desist in doing it."

As we begin earth month and celebrate our solar array, we hope that BI members can take pride in our work and also continue to explore with us ways that they can support further sustainability improvements both at the synagogue as well as in their own homes. Rabbi Nathan is happy to explore possibilities for people who would like to volunteer their time and energy as well.

BI's FACILITIES

In the Israelite at the end of 2021, we reported about projects underway and upcoming. Since then, besides the normal operations, we've addressed a number of issues that impact the resiliency, security, visual impact, efficiency and effectiveness of the facilities.


1. *The new doors and security systems*:

- The installation of the new exterior doors by Matus Windows and Doors, in May/June 2021 had a couple of needed adjustments. These have been addressed; the doors are working well.
- Many security upgrades and items have been given attention beyond the upgraded **DELCO Alarm** fob entry system:
 - Exterior lighting with motion detected capability are now on four sides of the building.
 - DELCO Alarms added/moved security cameras.
 - Steve Platt has made upgrades in the office to support these systems, including the installation of NVR screen, a new computer for office/security use, system upgrades/trouble shooting and cabling upgrades.
- Boulder Benches- We still await their installation in the next months by **Think Green.**Much credit to Alan Ross for all his advocating, monitoring, and liaising with the greater Jewish community and DELCO alarms for identifying and seeking relevant security grants to allow most of this work to take place. Also, to Steve Platt for his significant focus on tech that supports these efforts. Also, it is important to remember the original tech support and impetus from Josh Waterston. Each has facilitated this progress and continuously makes sure that these systems are both robust and do not interfere with the welcoming culture of our community.
- 2. <u>The Green House sewer system</u>: Last March 2022, **Gartland Plumbing** installed the estimated 225' sewer line, to connect the Green House to Beth Israel's sewer main. This now allows for proper use of the building.
- 3. <u>Electrical Outlets in the office</u>: Josh Waterston and Steve Platt replaced and upgraded the electrical outlets in the office with 3 and 6-Outlet Extender/ Grounded Wall Taps.
- 4. <u>Trees and gardens</u>: We continue to be mindful to keep Trees and other vegetation around the property trimmed and cared for to remove those that are dead, keep them healthy, and away from overhead wires and other issues. In particular:
 - Steve Linvill removed three additional dead (cherry) trees and pruned the others along the south end of the parking lot in January 2022.
 - Dave Cashell donated and planted a Metasequoia Genus (dawn redwood) and a white oak on May 2nd, either side of the top of the grove to the west of the parking lot, which are thriving.
 - Gardens: Dave also continues to cultivate and maintain the garden on the far end of the parking lot. He also worked tirelessly with a team on the project Rabbi Nathan initiated to have raised bed gardens just north of the west end of the parking lot, which provides great light, space and produced much vegetables for the Media food bank and other. Kathy Anderson continues to nurture the gardens near the synagogue entry.
 - Mark Rosenberg removed the failing dogwood tree, between the house and the GaGa courts this past fall.
 - On January 27th PECO had (4) Asplundh trucks in our driveway. They trimmed the trees around the wires along our north property line, from the street to the power pole.

5. <u>Computers and Core Network</u>:

- The core networking area in the main office was reorganized and cleaned up. All equipment was placed in a 19" rack, and all cables were bundled and labeled.
- Computers continue to be replaced and upgraded.
- We have started to evaluate a candidate to replace the library's (computer) catalog software.

- 6. <u>Green house and outdoor furniture</u>: May/June 2022- In May and June numbers of projects were undertaken with the help of Doug Rosenberg, to more resiliently enclosed the Gas line into the side of the Green house, replace missing or loose aluminum capping on windows and doors, tighten some siding and upgrade and helped restore the 5 outside benches.
- 7. <u>Additional work on the Green House</u>: At the end of the summer 2022, **The Tradesmen**, fixed a soffit that was falling apart in which family of birds were nesting, and installed more siding and flashing on the west side of the house above the old kitchen. This significantly reduced the potential for degradation.
- 8. <u>Carpet in main sanctuary</u>- Which still needs to be replaced, but the sanctuary, the Gan and the stairway landing carpets were shampooed in August 2022 by **First Choice Carpet Cleaning**, which made a significant improvement.
- 9. The South End of the Building: In August/Early 2022 The Tradesmen restored the south [sanctuary end] outside and inside walls, columns and windows of the building. This included re-glazing, restoring wood, stripping and painting. This staved off worse degradation and the likelihood that that beautiful sanctuary windows would need to be replaced. This was done as Part B of the Portico Capital project.
- 10. New Solar Array: Following years of exploring, recent focused efforts to define, fund, and contract this array, work began in September after the July inspection and "tightening" of the synagogue roof. The installation of a 26KW solar array by Solar States, came live on October 12 and has been on a monitoring system live since October 17. The out meter was tied in to PECO's system on February 14 and shortly thereafter the Permit to Operate [PTO] was received from PECO. In a month or two, we will begin seeing the electrical reduction reflected in our electric bill. We monthly track and bench mark our utilities and will add this to our tracking.
- 11. The Portico: In September 2022, work got underway to restore and upgrade the portico. This was on the needed Capital Project list for many years. The Tradesmen performed and completed this work meticulously. If you look at the photos in the stairway walls, you can see that the portico had been installed when the Baptist Church was built, in 1967. The steel and roof remained structurally robust but the remainder had rotting wood, birds living in the ceiling, gutter and roof issues, and old soffit and can lamps. The wooden wall columns were rotting as much as 3' above grade. To avoid the ongoing degradation of the portico, this project was undertaken. The last of the work was completed in early March 2023. Due to supply chain issues, some of the work was delayed into the winter, at which time the weather/temperature became limiting factors. The I-Beams were packed out and enclosed with resilient Azek, as were the steel columns. Stone covered columns were installed, which added resilience and aesthetics. The soffits and all the lights were replaced, and the wall columns were replaced with trimmed out Azek. This work was done in collaboration with the design team Reisa Mukamal, Kathy Anderson and Candy Berlin, and Alan Ross.
- 12. Other Plumbing: Gartland Plumbing:
 - Replaced the garbage disposal in the Kitchen.
 - Replaced the valves on sinks and toilets, and repaired the urinals.
 - In addition, the wall mounted sinks [including the one that fell off the wall] in the Men's room were replaced by one with a subcabinet
- 13. <u>The main Beth Israel sign, which is seriously deteriorated</u>: The design committee and others worked together with Aerial signs, to select a sign to replace this sign. It required a variance from Middletown Township. The variance was granted with a minor modification by written notice on 2/23. We contracted with **The Tradesmen** on 3/17 to perform the upgrade to the brick base and to install new lights, and to coordinate with **Aerial signs**, who designed and is making and will install the sign. Dependent on supply chain for the stone and lights, we anticipate this work being completed this spring. In addition, Jackie Gelman will be working with **John Kelly from Hollywood Landscape**, who volunteered to install a perennial garden on the ground immediately around the sign, pro bono.
- 14. <u>The Stucco</u>: The stucco is quite dirty and stained in significant patches. Most of the integrity of the stucco appears to be in good shape, except for a few locations. But there are some hairline cracks that could lead to greater degradation. The work to wash, repair and paint the stucco will be let at the beginning of the new fiscal year in July. It is anticipated that this work will be completed by the fall.
