Rabbi's Column



Rabbi Linda Potemken NOVEMBER 14TH MARCH & HOLDING THIS MOMENT

My decision wasn't final until the day before, for practical and for emotional reasons. If I go, might there be formal words spoken that aren't my words, my truth? If I go, with all the hatred and guns in this country, will it

be safe? If I go, how will I manage an already ridiculously busy week?

But how can I not go? The March is for Israel. The people of Israel are living through a hellish war. That includes my beloved family members with whom I am in ongoing contact. The March is to Free the Hostages. I'm praying nightly for the hostages, this is a march in their honor, standing for their safe release. I need to go stand with others for them. The March is against antisemitism. Sadly, tragically, that is also guite relevant.

Just as my decision to go was made at the last minute, so was my decision to join the Peace Bloc which was made of many groups including the Reconstructionist movement, Americans for Peace Now, T'ruah - the rabbinic human rights group, J Street, Partners for a Progressive Israel, Ameinu, Habonim Dror and many others. Messages included: "Defeat Terror; Protect Civilians; Pursue Peace" There were signs with pictures of the kidnapped hostages. There was pain and anger. There was hope. I was grateful to be with them. While I didn't agree with every speech or choice of speaker at the rally there were many who I appreciated, who addressed my heart and concerns.

I thought about what a difference it would make if at every pro-Israel rally and at every pro-Palestinian demonstration people carried signs that called for an end to antisemitism and to islamophobia. I was glad that there were signs on Nov 14th that acknowledged Palestinian pain, that were clear that Hamas does not speak for all Palestinians, that called for both Israelis and Palestinians to be free from Hamas.

It has been so easy to drift into despair since October 7th. The grief that so many of us have been carrying is immense and it is hard to imagine a path forward to peace and safety for all. I believe that most of us might benefit from focusing on healthy soul soothing activities, that could include prayer, friendship, engaging with nature, the arts, Torah study and most especially,

the Jewish practice of engaging in chesed – acts of loving kindness. Savoring acts of chesed that we receive, that we bestow on others or witness is a good balm for the soul in hard times and in all times.

Where do I find hope? The solidarity at the march felt hopeful. On the way back I stopped at a rest stop along Ig5. It was packed with people who had been at the march. It was extraordinary to see such a huge, diverse swath of the Jewish community at a rest stop along g5. There were teenage girls dancing in the parking lot. This display of peoplehood was affirming and uplifting. Days later at BI, I led a service where we celebrated a baby naming. The next day I led our kids in Hebrew School and then met with our teens. The next generation gives me hope. I want to continue to practice and raise up the best of my Jewish Torah values, to give me strength and to pass along to those who will lead us all in the future.

This problem is bigger than all of us. But Chanukah is coming this month and that too gives me hope. Chanukah means dedication. So let's join together to dedicate ourselves to shining our light on one another and outward to the world and to be uplifted as we live in accordance with our values. Let's support one another, to bring goodness and chesed into the world. The world needs your goodness. Somehow that is hopeful.

Reflections on Leadership at BI by Michael Fishkow

"What do you get when you put two Jews together?" -- Three opinions!

Have you ever wondered why anyone would volunteer to join, let alone lead, a group like the Board of Directors of a synagogue? In this series, we delve into the experiences of several current and former board leaders, hoping to inspire you to consider taking on a leadership role at Beth Israel.

BI offers us a wealth of opportunities for personal growth, encompassing diverse spiritual, educational, and social action endeavors. Yet, an often-overlooked opportunity for growth is the development of leadership skills. Like the other practices, BI provides a supportive environment for you to embark on a journey of learning and growth.

For adults, the workplace often serves as the primary setting for acquiring leadership skills. People often confuse management with leadership, but they are distinct concepts. Management involves orchestrating people to achieve a specified objective.

Leadership, on the other hand, is the ability to influence, motivate, and empower others to contribute to an organization's success. As a leader, you need to create a shared vision of the desired outcome and its impact, and then support people as they work to achieve those outcomes.

As you know, BI is a volunteer organization, and a BI leadership role is about more than just saying thank you. Our volunteers are motivated by seeing the impact of their actions and want to see their efforts make a difference. A big part of leadership is getting people to step forward by explaining the potential impact of their actions and then raising up that work once it's completed.

It's important to recognize that it's not the leader's responsibility to have all the solutions. Instead, a BI leader should facilitate discussion to ensure that the board or committee thoroughly understands the problem at hand and can articulate how a successful solution would be assessed.

While you could certainly glean these leadership principles from devouring dozens of leadership books, Beth Israel offers a unique opportunity to practice these skills in an environment where everyone is invested in your success and where experienced mentors (former leaders) are readily available to guide you.

There are a couple of aspects of leadership that are truly unique to Beth Israel. Through the practice of studying our sacred texts, Jews have developed the ability to hold two seemingly conflicting ideas up and find ways to honor both. This is evident when the board is operating at its best. Our Rabbis help us view our work through a Jewish lens, adding Jewish context to some of the more difficult decisions the Board wrestles with. It is hard not to be humbled and connected by this experience. As leaders, you are stewards of a nearly 100-year-old synagogue, and as such, a vital link between the Jewish people's past and future.

Over fifteen years have passed since I served as President of the Board. That leadership experience at BI instilled in me valuable lessons that I have continuously applied in my work and interpersonal relationships. I am grateful for the opportunity to share just a few of my many takeaways regarding leadership at BI.

Being a leader at Beth Israel is like learning to ride a bike, age 5. It's initially terrifying, as there's no instruction manual or YouTube video to convince you that gravity can be defied. Or, that there'll be enough time, energy or conviction in your life to make it work. But suddenly, you realize you've been balancing and defying gravity all along, and the new role puts fresh wind in your hair and a new perspective on yourself and your community.

I started as a leader at BI nearly 30 years ago. I wasn't frightened at the time, because the role I was asked to fill was well within my comfort zone. Sort of like riding with training wheels. As time went on, I took on more challenging tasks, because it was fun and I could see the impact I was making. I began to look for opportunities to "ride down steeper hills" and scare myself a little bit, because I knew others had my back if I needed help. And, I keep looking for new ways to engage. 






Beth Israel's Survivor Scroll





BETH ISRAEL'S GREEN TORAH GROUP




As we face climate change, overshoot, inequity, and many other global challenges, participate in Beth Israel's new Green Torah group to:

Earlier in the day, a hardworking crew (Jackie, Dave, and Candy) worked on the lovely garden that surrounds the new sign.


