

# FROM THE RABBI:

# A QUESTION OF NAMES

As we begin the secular year 2024, we also begin reading *Shemot*, the book of Exodus, in the Torah. The book is called Shemot, which actually means "names" because it is the first significant word in the first verse of the book. The verse goes on to name Joseph and his brothers, and reminds us that together with their households, a total of 70 people, they migrated to Egypt.

Names are significant, both in the Torah, and in our day. There is the name we are given at birth, the name we choose to be called (often a nickname), and the names we pick up as we go through life. Our names are our most personal identifiers.

Recently, the Committee on Jewish Laws and Standards (CJLS) took up a question about names. They were asked how a person who does not want to be identified by gender would be called to the Torah. While I find it an interesting question from both an academic and grammatical perspective, to many people, it's a question of intensely personal and intimate relevance.

If you'd like to read the full answer to the question, you can access it on the Rabbinical Assembly website. The short answer, is that they suggested language to use for all Torah honors which do not require a person to identify by gender. At a recent Ritual Committee meeting we decided to adopt the CJLS's recommendations.

Mostly, unless you pay VERY close attention during the Torah service, you won't even notice the change. Basically, instead of hearing "Ya-amod," "Ta'amod," or "Yamdu" when the gabbai is calling, you'll hear "Na La-amod." Instead of referring to the aliya by the gender of the person reciting the blessing, we'll refer to the number of the aliya itself. We've actually tried this out on a couple of different Shabbat mornings, and not a single person has commented on it.

We're highlighting it now, because for those people to whom this issue is most relevant, it offers them the chance to give their name to the *qabbai* in a non-gender specific way.

A person who identifies as male would still give his name as "Yitzchak ben Avraham v'Sarah." (Isaac, son of Abraham and Sarah). A person who identifies as female would still give her name as "Dina bat Ya'acov v'Leah" (Dina, daughter of Jacob and Leah). A person who prefers not to identify their gender should give their name as "Tal mi-beit Yoni v'Ronit" (Tal, from the house of Yoni and Ronit).

While for some, I imagine that this change seems overly political. I would argue that we are simply offering a respectful way to call people the way they want to be called. Technically, I should be called Rabbi Ferratier. It is the correct formal way to address me. Everyone at CBE, though, knows that I prefer to be called Rabbi Warner. To call me anything else would be inconsiderate at best, and rude at worst. All of our members and guests should be afforded the same courtesy and respect, especially when being called to for an honor during the holiest moments of our services.

My students sometimes ask me whether anything ever changes in Judaism. I usually answer them "as little as possible." However, when a tiny change can make such a large impact, without harming anyone in the process or significantly altering our tradition, there is no reason not to implement it after careful thought. This is one such change.

This will be done in accordance with bylaws 2024, with two tracks: a Slate for the Officers and the Board of Directors, and the Slate for the Chairs of Standing Committees. While the chairpersons of the standing committees are no longer seated on the board, their work is an integral part of our success, and their robust programming is the heart of our congregation. As in the past, each committee will have an Executive Committee liaison to work closely with them to foster open communication between the committees and the Board.

In preparation to enter fiscal year 2024-25, we will file our new Articles of Incorporation, effective July 1, 2024, with the Virginia State Corporation Commission and complete all the necessary legal paperwork to complete the incorporation process.

Lastly, the BethEmeth@45 L'dor v'dor Committee is starting to plan for an exciting weekend celebration of our 45th anniversary, May 17 - 19, 2024. There will be activities for all. Details will follow soon. Volunteers welcome. Please contact Paul Moskowitz at vpdevelopment@bethemeth.org.

At this challenging time, our capacity to create and manage change, no matter how large or small, is critical in sustaining us individually and as a community. As individuals, you can and must continue to opt into living vibrant Jewish lives by supporting the causes meaningful to you, engraining your Jewish identity within your children and grandchildren, and actively participating in your CBE community.



# **CBE SECURITY TASK FORCE VOLUNTEERS NEEDED**

Since October 7th, our anxiety levels have increased. The goal of the Security Task Force is to relieve our anxiety and provide a safe environment to worship, learn, and socialize at CBE. To accomplish this, we have taken the following steps:



- Increasing security presence during services, Religious School and BEECC
- Enhancing our check-in procedures for services while still maintaining a welcoming environment
- Revising our check-in and check-out procedures for Religious School and BEECC
- 4. Labeling exits and Safe Rooms
- Providing information inside the sanctuary regarding security matters
- 6. Reviewing and revising our Emergency Action Plan
- Seeking grants or other funding sources to enhance our physical security infrastructure
- Working with other synagogues and other Jewish organizations to share best practices
- Discussing security information and intelligence with local and federal law enforcement.

In January, we will be conducting our first congregational security training and preparedness drills. Please look for future announcements about this important training. Although we have made progress in addressing our security, we need your assistance. We need volunteers to act as Floor Captains during services, Religious School and BEECC peak periods – to work with security guards to check-in and welcome members, registered guests, and parents to our building. Acting as Floor Captain is quite rewarding as you are a critical component of creating our safe environment. We'll train you and provide you with a very stylish Floor Captain gold name tag badge to wear. If you would like to assist us as a Floor Captain or provide security suggestions or feedback, please contact me at any time. I hope to see you in the building. Stay safe.
