On occasion, we run reflections that our founding rabbi, Rabbi Marx (z''l), wrote over his many years at Hakafa. We want his memory and legacy to be living parts of our community, and we want to be able to contemplate his words every so often. This reflection comes from the March 2000 Circle:

Time on My Hands

"I'm busy." That seems to be the cliché of choice in these hectic times.

You meet an acquaintance on the street. "How are you?" "I'm busy." In this era of consumerism and commercialism, the answer "I'm busy" may be perfectly appropriate. But there is a staleness to it that invites examination.

Of course, the question, How are you? invites the most economical of answers - does anyone really want to know? Even the contraction of "I" and "am" serves to conserve words as well as time. And so the contracted response "I'm busy" is, in itself, a type of contractual answer to a question which views time not as eternity but as commodity.

The antithesis of "I'm busy" reveals something of our times. Seldom does one say, "I'm free." And if these blasphemous words are used, they are inevitably accompanied by an excuse. "I'm free because I just had a meeting canceled." "I'm free to play chess because the children have been invited to a pajama party" - that used to be my favorite excuse. Strange it is that we need offer no apology for our busy-ness, but our freedom inevitably requires an explanation, an antidote to our indolence.

Still, it is fascinating that to be busy announces to the world that we are engaged in our society's most useful activity. Does one respond to the question "how are you?" by saying: "I'm riant" (people hate you when you use words like that) or "I'm righteous" (what a prig you are) or "I'm incontinent" (keep that to yourself)? So what makes "busy" more felicitous a word than any of these others? Yet saying "I'm busy" seems to have become the nauseatingly appropriate phrase of choice.

I have a friend (well, one in particular) who doesn't like to be told to "have a good day." Every once in a while she responds: "Sorry, I have other plans." This sort of imagination challenges me to create a different response than "I'm busy." The need to do this, however, is more than a need to avoid the cliche.

The need to replace the cliché comes from the simple recognition that there are conditions in this world more enviable than being busy. And we ought to begin to contemplate them. There is the sense of caring for others. There is the sense of finding time to help someone who is in pain, someone who is in a nursing home or a hospital. There is the sense of being committed to a book or to creating a work of art. We may indeed find ourselves busily doing such things, but surely the busy-ness is secondary to the holiness of creating.

There is also that glorious recognition that we can find time to refresh our souls, to nourish our spiritual life, to worship our God. In Judaism we are taught over and over again to say "thank you." Thank you God for the wonderful blessings that are part of my life. *Baruch attah Adonai* - thank you God - that's the simple meaning of those words - thank you God for the food I eat, for the children I love, for the time I can give to reading a good book or just relaxing with a friend. I pray never to be too busy to cherish any of these things. And never too busy to listen.

"How are you?" you ask. Next time you ask, give me time to really tell you. I hope neither of us will be too busy.

Join us as **Dr. Sandy Goldberg** returns to discuss "**What do we mean when we say Amen?**" Saying "Amen" is one of the most familiar things we do, whether in religious settings (Shabbat services, etc.) or in secular life. But what are we doing when we say "Amen"? In this session, Dr. Sandy Goldberg will present four main theories from Jewish tradition and argue that none of these can make sense of the full range of uses (including secular uses). He employs tools from philosophy of language -- in particular, from the theory of speech acts -- to provide his answer. If he is right, this simple act of speech turns out to be one of the most important acts by which we forge and sustain our communities.

Sandy Goldberg is the Chester D. Tripp Professor in the Humanities and Professor of Philosophy at Northwestern University. His research focuses on the nature and social dimensions of mind, language, and knowledge. He has served as Chair of the Board of Northwestern Hillel (2016-18) and as President of Beth Hillel B'nai Emunah synagogue in Wilmette (2018-20). He and his wife, Judy Levey, live in Evanston, and they have three adult children.

How might our foremothers' experiences with pregnancy impact the way we consider this holy phase of many people's lives? Car Seats Needed for Refugee Children
