#### Go to Michigan!

My father was a die-hard Ohio State football fan. The university, he claimed, was the only place that allowed him to be him. A holocaust survivor who experienced the horrors of Auschwitz and Dachau at a very young age, he came to the United States in 1947, settling in Youngstown, Ohio with those members of his extended family who had fled Hungary in the decades prior to the Nazi onslaught. He lived with an aunt and uncle, his father's new wife not wanting him around, perhaps because he was too much of a reminder of the families they all had lost in the camps, memories that were too painful to bear.

My father did not adjust to Youngstown too well at first. He was an awkward farm boy from the outskirts of an isolated, little village in northeast Hungary. His only real trip away from that region prior to his coming to America was in a cattle car to Poland. To go from that to proms and cliques and teen-age fashions could not have been easy; his cultural backwardness, amplified by his thick Hungarian accent and deep trauma, rendered him too strange for the vast majority of his flighty American peers at Rayen High School who could not have imagined what he had lived through and probably didn't care that much as well.

Ohio State was different, though. Throngs of awkward, burgeoning adults came from all over the state to start over, to redefine and hone themselves, and to learn to become the productive members of society they hoped they would someday be. My father thrived at Ohio State. He was probably the smartest person I have ever known. He aced his classes, mastered English, made life-long friends, met my mother, and was finally free of most of society's prejudices that had oppressed and brutalized him for most of his life. True, he got deferred from Ohio States' medical school because of a quota system that limited the number of Jews in each class. Veterinary sciences suited him just fine, though, as he could build upon the drudgery of the farm life that was his upbringing.

I don't know when my father became an Ohio State football fan. To be honest, he really didn't care much for football other than that. My guess is that he got caught up in the fever that is the Buckeye nation. He bought season tickets and travelled to many out-of-state games as well. He brought buckeyes with him to every game, throwing them at the fans of opposing teams, much to the dismay of all of us. He joined the President's Circle, a group of Buckeye donors that were given access to a player meet-and-greet every summer and delicious meals at the Ohio State union before every game. He dressed mostly in scarlet and gray and drove mostly red or gray cars. His only listening pleasure, other than the droll of the Musak with which he would torture us on drives to Columbus, was a record of the Ohio State marching band that graced the turntable of the 1960's-era hi-fi system in our family room. And when as a young child I did something wrong, he didn't send me to my room. Instead, he would boom: "Go to Michigan!" which was my brother's room, but which I knew meant that I was in real trouble.

I grew up, then, with a passionate love of Ohio State and a visceral hatred of all things Voldemort – what we call Michigan in our house. I was conditioned to believe that Ohio State players were the good guys, that scarlet and gray stood for what was right and good in the world while maize and blue, the colors of the University of Voldemort, represented all that was bad and wrong. My young brain learned to associate Ohio State football victories, especially ones over Voldemort, with moments of reprieve for my father's struggles and pain – he would be so overjoyed when they won. The losses, to me, were unfair jabs at a man who had already lost and suffered so much. And, I just wanted my father to be happy.


I still do. Though my father died nearly thirty years ago, I still carry that weight with me. As silly as I know it is, I unconsciously get anxious the week before the annual Ohio State-Voldemort contest. As silly as I know it is, I get overly elated when Ohio State wins and overly saddened when they lose. As silly as I know it is, I find that I can still honor my father by holding onto his passion, especially because he can no longer do so himself. At the very least, don't we owe that little nod to our past?

I am writing this the day after Ohio State lost to Voldemort by a score of 30-24. It was a good game, though I turned it off before the end, realizing what the outcome would be. As someone recently said to me, after all these years of not being here, my father is probably okay with the outcome of the game and has gotten over his Buckeye obsession. Not me, though.

I can't, and I won't.
I love you, Dad.

The Hanukkah Menorah (or *Chanukiah* in Hebrew) is a candlestick that holds nine candles, specifically for Hanukkah. Eight of the candles each represent one of the eight days of Hanukkah. The ninth candle is raised above the others and is called the *Shamash*, meaning helper-candle. It is used to light all the other candles.

This year, Hanukkah begins <u>Thursday evening</u>, <u>December 7</u>. If possible, candles should be lit immediately <u>after</u> sunset and should be allowed to burn completely. One family member may light the candles on behalf of the whole family, but it is fun to have each family member light their own *Chanukiah*.

The first candle is lit (using the shamash) on the first night. On the next night, two candles are lit, and one more added each night up through the eighth night. The candles are placed in the Chanukiah from right to left (facing you); but, when lighting them, first kindle the "new" candle added that evening (using the shamash) and then proceed from left to right.

On the first night, all three of the blessings below are recited. On all other nights, only the first two blessings are recited.

Please join us for "Finding New Meaning in Ecclesiastes" with Dr. Sandy Goldberg. Kohelet (Ecclesiastes) is most famous for its pithy expressions ("Vanity of Vanities, all is vanity"; "There is nothing new under the sun") and its world-weary wisdom ("To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven..."). Depending on one's perspective, the text might be described, alternatively, as dark and nihilistic, as wallowing in the absurdities and meaninglessness of life, as embodying a realistic sense of the pains and joys of the everyday, or as urging us on to a life of spiritual devotion to God. One thing is certain: it was written by someone who, having reached old age, was content to reflect on the vicissitudes of human life. In this talk, Sandy will contrast four standard interpretations of the book, and he will argue in favor of a fifth. He will then use his favored interpretation to say why this is among his favorite things in Jewish liturgy.

**Dr. Sandy Goldberg** is the Chester D. Tripp Professor in the Humanities and Professor of Philosophy at Northwestern University. His research focuses on the nature and social dimensions of mind, language, and knowledge. He has served as Chair of the Board of Northwestern Hillel (2016-18) and as President of Beth Hillel B'nai Emunah synagogue in Wilmette (2018-20). He and his wife, Judy Levey, live in Evanston, and they have three adult children.


