A.I.

No, ChatGPT didn't write this.

I have been wondering why we are so worried about the newest iteration of artificial intelligence. Can it be any worse than the artificial intelligence that has been driving public policy up until now?

Artificial intelligence is on full display when a federal judge in Texas with no medical training determines he knows more about reproductive medicine than the FDA. It is on full display when elections are deemed rigged, despite overwhelming proof otherwise, solely because one's preferred candidate lost. Artificial intelligence was employed to convince the American populace that the road to eradicating Islamic terrorism was through Iraq, the ramifications from which the world is still suffering today. And we see it in full force, on almost a daily basis, as claims about Jewish international banking power circulate social media circles that are less and less on the fringe. Is it really any worse knowing that a computer will soon be able to make stuff up better and faster than we have been able to do so ourselves?

We humans are a strange species. It seems as though the better we get at finding ways to make life better for ourselves we are, at the same time, finding ways to make it worse. And for some reason, we refuse to listen when we are told truths that we don't want to hear. Take artificial sweeteners for example: Sweet and Low kept its robust market share even after studies revealed a link to a greater susceptibility to cancer with its overuse. Football teams replaced bad artificial turf with even worse artificial turf when they found that artificial turf was detrimental to athletes' bodies and health. Synthetic opioids are decimating the lives of millions of Americans who can't overcome the disease of their addiction to it. And artificial meat? Don't get me started.

I am not a naturalist, by any means. I like a good Cherry Coke Zero every so often; more often than I like to admit, if truth be told. I use plastics and other products deemed bad for my body and the environment. And I have been all too willing to believe something that someone else made up if it fits the narrative I seek to espouse. In doing so, I prove my own point. I am more driven by what feels good and right than what actually might be good and right for me and others. In other words, I am human.

Judaism has tried to navigate artificiality for ages. Successive rabbinic authorities have determined that we can eat artificial products that taste like pork and shellfish as long as they don't look like the actual food. Artificial insemination has been a widely accepted method of reproduction in Jewish circles for some time. And we Jews had our own form of A.I. long ago. The Maharal, Rabbi Judah Loew, is credited with creating a being out of mud that would be able to safeguard his beloved Jewish community of Prague in the 16th century. Known as the Golem, this creature succeeded in protecting our people until it had to be dismantled before turning on them as well.

And that has been the concern about A.I. all along – that people won't work to control it until it is too late, until it takes over our lives and destroys us: Not unlike the plastics and chemicals that are eating away at our planet and our bodies, even as we continue to enjoy them; not unlike the drugs that make us feel better, even as they are killing us; not unlike the rubbish spewed by antisemites who demean us, even as their troubles are the result of anything but us; and not unlike the willingness of those in power to abuse that power to make decisions they "know" are right, even as the truth screams otherwise and millions have to die for it.

ChatGPT didn't write this, but it is only a matter of time before it does. What will be its final conclusion? What will be ours?

We have the capacity to save our species.

Will we?

Lag BaOmer Bonfire and Kumzits

On Monday evening, May 8, beginning at 6:00 p.m., we will gather at Crow Island Woods Park (1140 Willow Road, Winnetka) for Hakafa's annual Lag BaOmer bonfire and Kumzits*! You bring dinner and any musical instruments you'd like, we'll provide the sh'mores!

We are commanded by the Torah to count forty-nine days starting from the second day of Passover. On the fiftieth day, we celebrate the festival of Shavuot, commemorating the giving of the Torah. This 50-day period is called "Counting the Omer." The Omer was a barley offering brought to the Temple on the day we start counting, the second day of Passover. "Lag BaOmer" is the thirty-third day of counting the Omer. The word "Lag" means 33 because it is comprised of the letters "lamud" and "gimmel," corresponding to the numerical values of "30" and "3." In the time of Rabbi Akiva, who witnessed the destruction of the Second Temple and who was the greatest Torah Sage of his generation, 24,000 of his disciples died in an epidemic during the counting of the Omer. Since the epidemic was suspended on the 33rd day, Lag BaOmer has become a joyous day of celebration, complete with bonfires — especially in Israel.

<u>Location and Parking</u>: Crow Island Woods Park lies directly west of Crow Island School on Willow Road in Winnetka. Parking is available in the center of the park via a gravel road off Willow Road. A picnic shelter with restrooms and stone fire pit is located just south of the parking area.

*Kumzits is a compound-word in Hebrew derived from the Yiddish words קום come) and זיץ) sit). The word is used to describe an evening gathering where we come together and sing.

Shavuot Celebration Events

The holiday of Shavuot (pronounced shah-voo-OAT) occurs on the sixth day of the Hebrew month of Sivan (beginning at sundown on Thursday, May 25 this year). It is the second of three pilgrimage festivals (Passover and Sukkot are the other two) and is a day on which yizkor is observed. Shavuot commemorates the day God gave Moses the Ten Commandments on Mount Sinai. It also has an agricultural reference, marking a stage in the harvest. One of the customs of Shavuot is to hold a tikkun, or Torah-based learning session, mostly late into the night.

These four times, known as *yizkor* (remembrance), coincide with major holidays on the Jewish calendar. Shavuot is a day on which *yizkor* is recited. Hakafa Visit to Glencoe Historical Society Museum's New Exhibit

Please join us on Wednesday, May 24 at 11:00 a.m. at the Glencoe Historical Society Museum (375 Park Avenue, Glencoe) to see the new exhibition on Glencoe's Black Heritage. Hakafa member, Barbara Olinger, instrumental in putting the installation together, will be our docent for the tour.

Glencoe has been home to a dedicated Black community since the mid-1880s. This exhibit examines how these residents lived, worked, and worshipped and how their experiences changed over the years. Galleries introduce visitors to Glencoe's earliest Black residents, exploring why they came, and describing the town they encountered when they arrived. They also look candidly at more difficult times and discuss the impact of racism and discrimination following World War I. Featured are stories of the Black residents who helped shape the Village, the City of Chicago, the nation, and the world.
