Not Everything is 50—50

My high school band director changed my life.

I once mentioned to him that there was a 75% chance of rain the night of an upcoming football game at which we would be marching. "Nonsense!" he responded. "There is no such thing! Everything is 50-50: Either it will happen or it won't." I heard his words as gospel, became a convert, and quickly adopted them as my go-to answer for all of life's pressing questions. What are my chances of winning the lottery, regardless of how many tickets I buy? 50-50. How likely is it that a son of mine will be President of the United States someday or that Hostess will bring back Deep-Fried Twinkies? 50-50. Will I ever make it to a Bruce Springsteen concert? It's all 50-50: Either it will happen or it won't.

Until recently, about the only thing of which I was 100% sure was that logical thinkers and math junkies hated talking probability with me. I have to say, I don't blame them.

Certainly, the irrationality of my 50-50 reductionist worldview can be employed only to the extent that no one gets hurt by it. In theory, there might be a 50-50 chance that I successfully pull off performing an appendectomy, but in practice, I don't think I would venture to play those odds. I might be as likely as not to knock an apple off your head using a bow and arrow while blindfolded, but I am not going to try. My 50-50 theory works only because I know it's not true. No harm, no foul. Completely annoying, perhaps, but all in fun.

The levity of my absurdity was challenged last week by the severity of one proffered by Judge James Ho of the Fifth Circuit Court of Appeals. His concurrent opinion to the court's decision to restrict the dissemination of mifepristone, an abortion pill, is a real humdinger. In it, he claims that obstetricians suffer "aesthetic injury" when denied the opportunity to deliver a baby.

According to US law, when hunters eliminate the wildlife that animal enthusiasts expect to see in nature, the enthusiasts can claim "aesthetic injury" and seek redress in the courts. Similarly, if developers wish to build on undeveloped land, environmentalists can claim "aesthetic injury" and seek the same redress that animal enthusiasts can.

In his decision, Judge Ho asserts that mifepristone is to a doctor as a hunter is to an animal enthusiast or a developer is to an environmentalist. Obstetricians should have the right to expect that they will deliver a patient's baby, he suggests. Patients who come to them after chemically inducing an abortion rob them of that right, causing aesthetic trauma, not unlike what animal lovers and environmentalists must feel. Doctors should be able to claim "aesthetic injury," therefore, and seek legal redress against the companies that produce the drug. Better yet, he feels, the drug should be banned all together.

A jurist believes an obstetrician's aesthetic sensibilities trump a patient's bodily autonomy: What does that even mean?

This is not the mere cogitation of an armchair quarterback nor the musing of a crackpot blogger. It is not the product of a legal devotee engaged in a simple intellectual exercise. Judge Ho sits in a position of considerable power. His words pose a threat, not only to anyone with a uterus, but to the integrity of our seemingly ever-more tenuous social order as well.

Months ago, Jon Stewart commented that "we cannot mistake absurdity for lack of danger." We Jews have long understood that. History has not been too kind to us, largely because the absurd ideas others have had about us too readily have been used as pretenses to violence against us. When people make outrageous claims in order to carry out even more outrageous acts, when the ridiculous becomes the sublime and the sublime becomes legal precedent, freedoms are curtailed, populations are oppressed, and lives are lost.


We cannot continue to let that happen. As we head into yet another season of political drivel, one that promises to be even more surreal than the last, we must remember that elections have consequences. Even more, we must remember that we are all important to one another, especially those who are most vulnerable. We are all important, even those with whom we so vociferously disagree. We are all important ... 100% of the time.

We are excited that Hakafa will continue to provide in-person worship for the High Holidays coupled with an enhanced at-home experience again this year.

Please note that In-Person High Holiday tickets are offered to current members of Congregation Hakafa. There is no additional cost for tickets. To request tickets, please mail in the paper form OR submit it online at this link: www.tinyurl.com/HakafaHighHolidays2023.

<u>Tickets will be mailed the week of September 4</u> and once both a 2023-24 Membership Commitment Form and Ticket Request have been received. We cannot guarantee that tickets will be available for late requests, and your prompt response will help tremendously with our planning.

We urge you to send in your Membership Commitment Form <u>and</u> High Holiday Ticket Request <u>as soon as possible</u> (<u>and no later than September 1</u>). Your ticket guarantees you a place with us and enables us to plan more meaningful High Holiday services.

In-Person High Holiday Services:

- Services will be held at the Winnetka Congregational Church (725 Pine Street), located east of Green Bay Road, west of Sheridan Road, and right around the corner from the Winnetka Community House.
- Masks will be optional for all in-person services. We ask that anyone attending in-person be symptom-free of any illness.
- Tickets are required for all in-person services (except Family Services, the Second-Day Rosh Hashanah Service, and the Yom Kippur Afternoon/Yizkor/N'eelah/Havdallah Services)
- For adults who want to attend the morning services in-person without their children, child-sitting is available for children 5th Grade and younger. Pre-registration is required.

Online High Holiday Services:

- We will broadcast via livestream and record every in-person main service (except Family Services) so that our members, their families, friends, and guests who are unable to join us in-person can have a meaningful worship experience.
- The video, sound, and broadcast of all livestreamed services are being handled by an outside, professional firm.
- Livestream service link information will be provided the week before Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Children's/Family Services:

- Our Family Services are open to everyone but are especially suitable for children and their families. Tickets are NOT required. Please feel free to bring friends.
- Family Services will be held at the Winnetka Congregational Church at 1:30 p.m. on both Rosh Hashanah and Yom Kippur.

Parking Instructions for the Winnetka Congregational Church

The Winnetka Congregational Church has a small parking lot (entrance on Prospect Ave on west side of church) that will hold 25 cars. These spaces will be reserved for older congregants and/or those with disabilities who indicate this need on the enclosed form. 

Tashlich

Tashlich (TAHSH-leekh) is a popular custom during Rosh Hashanah. Created more than six hundred years ago, it is the act of going to a place with natural flowing water, such as a creek or river, on the afternoon of the first day of Rosh Hashanah to symbolically cast off our sins by tossing breadcrumbs into the water. *Tashlich* is a wonderful way to teach our children about *t'shuvah* (repentance) and forgiveness, but it is most definitely appropriate for people of all ages!



Please B.Y.O.B. (bring your own bread) and join us outdoors with other Hakafa families for a short and enjoyable service, lasting no more than 15 minutes, on Saturday, September 16 at 5:15 p.m. We will meet at the Skokie Lagoons Boat Launch off of Tower Road in Winnetka, just east of the Edens Expressway (The entrance is 1/10 mile west of the canoe rental on the south side of the street.). This location is completely accessible.

If you are unable to join us in-person, take time on Rosh Hashanah afternoon to find a body of water into which to toss your breadcrumbs. We will provide a reading that you can use if you would like.

In case of rain, we will do Tashlich immediately following Second Day Rosh Hashanah Services.


