Passover

Unlike other Jewish holidays whose observance is centered around the synagogue, Passover is a festival celebrated at home. It begins with a spring cleaning of all leavened products and culminates with the seder. This is the time when Jewish families of all denominations and levels of observance gather together to celebrate a timeless tradition.



Education is central to the Passover experience. In fact, there are four references in the Torah requiring parents to teach their children about Judaism through the relating of the Exodus story. Out of these four verses arose the four questions asked by four very different kinds of children; the wise, the wicked, the simple, and the one who does not even know how to ask a question.

The wise child asks; "What are the testimonies, the statues, and the laws which Adonai your God has commanded you? (Deuteronomy 6:20),

The wicked child asks; "What does this service mean to YOU?" (Exodus 12:26),

The simple child asks; "What is this?" (Exodus 13:14)

And for the child who does not know how to ask; "You shall tell your child on that saying: It is because of this that Adonai did for me when I went free from Egypt." (Exodus 13:8)

These four questions were the result of centuries of debate and editing. In fact, there are several early texts of the Haggada only containing the question of the wicked child. During the turbulence of the second century when, under Roman oppression, many Jews moved away from Judaism and allied themselves with Rome. In this context, the "wicked child," became a metaphor for those seeking to remove themselves from the Jewish community, albeit as a result of political oppression.

With all the distractions of our modern world, it is often difficult to remain rooted in our heritage. At some point of our lives, we each exhibit attributes of the four children. We can be intellectually curious and seek to learn about a spiritual life, as with the wise child; or experience feelings of rebellion, getting too caught up in our hectic lives to take pause and connect to our Judaism. Like the simple child, we may simply want to understand the basics, and all too often, strive to have the humility to realize we don't know what we don't know.

Passover is a time to take pause and for all generations to learn from each other about the essence of being a member of the Jewish people. Our children are our future. By relating the story of Exodus, we ensure the continuity of our people by encouraging them to question and further understand the true spiritual freedom of the Israelites' journey to redemption.

Coco Mazet: "Tzedakah, in my opinion, is helping someone, but not on camera or making a big scene out of it. It is our way to give back to the community...by being involved in our mitzvah project after the big hurricanes, we thought if we were more involved in the world, it is because we are the future."

Asher Stone: "Tzedakah is when you do something for someone and don't expect anything back. It is important to help repair the world because we not only live in it but need to right the wrongs of tragedy or misfortune. Being a Jew, it is very important to me to work together on mitzvoth."

Jake Presser wrote that giving Tzedakah or donating items to those in need is a wonderful way to perform Mitzvot. Repairing the world is very important because if we don't take care of the Earth, it might one day not take care of us."

Rachel Sanford: "Giving Tzedakah is helping someone without making a big scene out of it. 



I had the honor of accompanying five Sinai teens to Washington, DC for a conference in early March designed for Jewish high school students. Together with 400 teens from across the country, they gathered to hear each other's stories and to learn that they have a voice in creating change. I was so proud of their engagement and efforts as they worked to understand their position on issues facing current legislation and to create a position paper for lobbying our representative, Dr. Raul Ruiz, and one of our senators, Kamala Harris.

What follows is an article written by Marti Lond, a sophomore at Palm Desert High School, a valued member of our Madrichim program (student helpers) and one of the five

A few weeks ago, some of the teens here at Temple Sinai travelled to Washington, DC to participate in L'Taken. L'Taken is a program run by the Religious Action Center that brings together Jewish teens from all over the country and educates

them about certain social issues and how they are seen through a Reform Jewish perspective. We went in order to learn more about Reform Judaism and to see different perspectives on issues such as criminal justice, reproductive rights, gun legislation, the division of church and state, the two-state solution to the Israeli - Palestinian conflict, and other important issues. As our weekend went along, we realized that we'd never experienced anything like this before, and we knew we were going to go home with much more knowledge than when we arrived.

Personally, my favorite parts of the trip were going to the Holocaust Museum and learning about the process of lobbying. I have always enjoyed learning about the Holocaust and what our ancestors had to endure, so I knew this was an amazing opportunity. While we were in the museum, we were able to explore the four beautiful floors filled with information about the Holocaust.

The images and videos on display were mesmerizing, and I know I could have spent many more hours soaking in the information and stories.

Another activity which I personally enjoyed was learning how to effectively tell a story. As we were exploring the issues, we had to keep in mind that we would be lobbying our beliefs to the representatives of our state; so, we had to learn how to structure our speeches to succinctly state our positions. We were separated into groups where we went through the steps of writing an effective speech: making a strong introduction, viewing the issue through a Reform Jewish eye, making a personal connection, and finally concluding with an "ask statement."

Before this, to be completely honest, I didn't know what an ask statement was. However, because we were advocating for a social issue, we had to include a specific ask, why we were advocating for this issue, and what it meant to us individually. I thought the lobbying program was valuable because I can incorporate those skills into my everyday life, while the Holocaust Museum was really interesting to learn about so we never forget.

After experiencing this program with teens from all over the country, there are many things I'll take away. Not only were the social issues we learned about interesting and opened up new perspectives in my mind, but we also made many new friends and our Jewish connection was the first step in these new friendships. Personally, I learned how to write a persuasive yet emotional argumentative appeal, present myself professionally, and explored more about my religion and the political views it entails.

The experience of L'Taken was an amazing one to say the least. As a Jewish teen living in the Coachella Valley, I'm part of a very small Jewish population, so being surrounded by many other Jewish teens my age was very exciting and enlightening. On behalf of the group of teens who ventured to DC, I would like to thank Temple Sinai, the Jewish Federation, Arava for chaperoning, and lastly our parents for making this trip possible. I know that we all greatly appreciated and learned from the different simulations and points of view which were expressed throughout the weekend. We are all very grateful for what we learned in Washington,
