Moses recounts the Israelites' 40 years in the wilderness. Moses encourages the Israelites in their upcoming conquest of the land of Canaan.

#### **Pinchas – Our Holy Legacy**

Time is the great equalizer. Regardless of wealth, career, education or social standing, we must come to terms with the fact that our time is limited. How we are remembered and the legacy we leave behind is reflected in the way we educate our children, act as mentors, and volunteer our time or support to worthy causes.

This issue becomes more pronounced when it refers to leadership succession. History provides numerous successful and unsuccessful examples of great leaders struggling to find their replacement. Even Moses was not immune. In fact, at the end of his life, he seeks God's counsel as he wrestles with who should lead the Israelites. The language used reveals some important insights into the nature of ideal leadership:

"And Moses spoke to the Eternal saying: May the Eternal God of the souls of all humankind, choose a leader over the congregation who will go out from before them and come in before them, who will lead them out and bring them in, so that the Congregation of God be not like a sheep without its shepherd." (Numbers 27:15-17)





This language imparts some important lessons regarding ideal leadership. Moses, by appealing to the "...Eternal God of the souls of all humankind", recognizes that how someone appears outwardly is often not indicative of their true nature. All too often, we choose our leaders based on superficial, external factors without really understanding who they really are.

The remedy for this is within the above verses as well. Moses described the ideal leader as somebody who will "...go out from before them and come in before them." This means that a great leader not only leads from the front, but also steps back to allow others to shine. It was this humility that defined Moses. It is perhaps the greatest of all leadership qualities and the reason God chose Joshua as successor.

Having spent forty years being mentored by Moses, he was transformed into his spiritual heir. Joshua represented a new generation of leadership that would ensure the teachings of Moses flourished in the Promised Land.

Each one of us is also uniquely poised to have a profound effect on those around us – be it our children, grandchildren, friends, neighbors or associates. We are all potential leaders and our holy legacy will live on long after we are gone, through our actions and the purity of our intentions.





Sitting at my desk 2 weeks ago, I realized that I have been at Temple Sinai for a full year. The time has really flown. Many changes have taken place, but one thing has remained constant. The dedication of our staff and congregants. I had the profound pleasure of meeting one of our long-time members the other day. Kathy Kapler, who will be 98 in a few short months asked me to stop by her home. What a treat she is. She epitomizes what temple membership is. She said Temple Manager Toni Robinson that even though she only comes to temple on rare occasions, it is imperative to her that she not only maintains her membership but

that she remains a Patron. She believes that it is her responsibility to help provide a place to educate the new generation of Jews. She is right! Participating in Temple religious school teaches our young people to envision themselves as an integral part of the larger Jewish community. Being part of a community is something that develops a lifetime of shared values and a sense of belonging. Being a Jew goes way beyond attending services. There is a distinct cultural piece that is every bit as important as worship. Our practices speak to an ancient time when the foundation of good citizenship began. Our ancestors were the stewards of the earth and our fellow humans. That has not changed. Our beliefs still command us to take care of one another and to take care of the earth. It is imperative that we pass all of this on to the next generation if we want Judaism to continue. Kathy Kapler is an extraordinary role model for this concept, as are all of you that continue your membership in order to perpetuate Judaism. Thank you all.

This coming year, I will be helping Arava Talve with the administrative part of operating the Rabbi Avi Levine Religious School. All returning temple members should receive their High Holy Day packet by August 16<sup>th.</sup> It will contain the member tickets allowed for your member category, the High Holy Day service schedule, a New Year's greeting form (which will need to be returned no later than August 26<sup>th</sup> in order to be included in the September Shofar), a form for inclusion in the Yizkor (Memorial) Book (which will have to be returned by September 6<sup>th</sup> in order to guarantee inclusion in the book), and an opportunity to donate to the Bimah flower fund.

## My Journey Through Israel:

#### Promoting Wheelchair Basketball and Connecting with the Land of Israel

When I was chosen as a member of Maccabi USA's wheelchair basketball team for their inaugural Access Program, I was beyond ecstatic. I was honored to get the opportunity to represent my country and play

amongst my fellow Jews. After the initial excitement wore off I was nervous. As the only female and one of the youngest members of the team, I worried I would not be able to connect or fit in with my teammates. These fears were quickly set aside the moment I met my fellow teammates at the airport in New York City. This group of people are some of the most welcoming, friendly, and joyful people I have ever met and we quickly formed a lifelong bond. Never in my life have I connected with a group of people as deeply or as rapidly as I did with these men. The thing I didn't take in to account when calculating my fears was our bond as a Jewish people. Our identity as Jewish athletes gave us an instant connection and deeper understanding of each other right off the bat, which allowed us to connect all the more quickly. Previously, I had spent a month in Israel; but on this trip, the people I was able to meet, and the places we had access to, made this, by far, my most significant trip. If it were not for the generous donations of Temple Sinai and the members, none of this would have been possible, so I would like to thank each and every one of you for this life changing experience.





One of the most unique experiences of my trip was getting to visit an air force base and watch the paratrooper training school exercises. We first got to hear about the paratrooper unit from one of the training school instructors, before going out and watching the different drills the soldiers are put through in order to prepare them for their first jump. One thing that is unique about the Israel Defense Forces (IDF) is that they give people with physical and or mental disabilities the opportunity to serve, unlike the United States. Israel's Prime Minister, Benjamin Netanyahu, highlighted the IDF's spirit of inclusion best. Netanyahu said, "A strong nation is one that does not leave its most vulnerable members behind. Israel is the only nation in the world that has a strong army with the ability to include people with disabilities." Israel sets the

example that everyone belongs and has their own unique talents and they have the right to contribute to their country's military and help keep its citizens safe. There are many jobs

within the military that don't require the use of brawn or brute, but only require a sharp mind. I come from a military family going back at least three generations and wanted to follow in my Father's and Grandfather's steps by joining the US Air Force. Unfortunately, when I acquired a physical disability, I had to accept my dream of being able to serve my country would never come to fruition. If I had lived in Israel, I would have still been able to realize my dream. It is my hope that countries start to follow Israel's lead of inclusion and empowerment by allowing people of all abilities to serve!

Another cherished part of this trip was the wheelchair basketball matches we played against the Israeli teams and the opportunity to view different adaptive sports facilities all over Israel. We played a total of five matches on our trip, and although we didn't win any of the matches, we grew as a team, gained new basketball skills, and connected with our Israeli counterparts, often sharing meals and great conversation after the game. Even though we come from different backgrounds and speak different languages than the Israelis we played against, our connection as Jews and disabled athletes united us as one. It gave me a special insight into life as a disabled Israeli and a deeper connection to the state of Israel. We were also lucky enough to meet and converse with various Israeli Olympians and Paralympians in a number of different sports. Hearing about the trials and tribulations they had to go through to become world class athletes renewed my perseverance in my own quest to become a Paralympic athlete.



Altogether, this was a trip filled with extraordinary friends, amazing sights, and many life changing moments. I not only gained a greater understanding of Israel and my Jewish roots, but also a deeper understanding of myself. I believe going to Israel is an important part of gaining a deeper connection to Judaism, and traveling off the beaten path while there is key to experiencing the heart and soul of the country. This was my first experience with Maccabi USA, and the overall feeling I got from the staff and participants was that of family. Going into this Maccabi Access mission, I was contemplating competing in the Maccabiah 2021 games in wheelchair tennis, but now I am positive that 2021 is not something I am willing to miss. If it wasn't for the generous donations of Temple Sinai and the members, none of this would have been possible so I would like to thank each and every one of you for this unforgettable and momentous experience. Temple Sinai has built a strong, supportive, and inclusive environment, and I am so grateful to be a part of this amazing temple family.

#### From the Melamedet/Principal

As the summer winds down our thoughts turn to the new school year. I am very excited to report that the classrooms have received a "makeover!" It's amazing what a fresh coat of paint and a deep cleaning can do! The Avi Levine Beit Sefer (House of Book) will begin on Tuesday, September 10<sup>th</sup> for our 4<sup>th</sup> through 7<sup>th</sup> grades and Sunday, Sept 15<sup>th</sup> for K through Confirmation. While I will be overseeing the curriculum content, I will be supported by Leslie Pepper, Nesa Bland and Toni Robinson. Leslie will be the "go to" person during school hours on Sunday and Nesa on Tuesdays. Toni will help with many of the administrative responsibilities.



We are very excited about both our library and music programs that will be a part of our curriculum on Sundays. Twice a month (October through March) the students will participate in a Library and/or Music program during school hours. The rabbi will visit every classroom for 20 minutes once a month to teach Jewish music to the students. The library program, with the help of Gail Jacobs, will give each child the opportunity to visit the library, hear a story, and check out a book.

We will continue to use the Chai and Mitkadem programs for Judaica and Hebrew studies. These programs were created by the Union of Reform Judaism and are designed for both self- paced and class community learning. Each class will also have a family Mishpacha program, where parents will join their students for a fun morning of learning in their classroom.


Every Sunday we will publish the "Beit Sefer news." This will include upcoming events and highlight a different classroom each week. When you sign your child in, you will be handed a copy.






