EXODUS- Holy Social Action

As we begin the book of Exodus, we are reminded that the Children of Israel have entered into a new phase. Four hundred years have passed. During that time, they have gone from guests in the land of Goshen, protected by the powerful Viceroy to the Pharaoh, Joseph, to a sizable ethnic minority, generating great concern from this “....new king who knew not of Joseph.” **Exodus 1:8**

In fact, they had grown so numerous that the Pharaoh summoned his advisors and ministers to council him on the wisest plan for dealing with this growing population of Hebrew immigrants. In the end, they decided to enslave them and appoint taskmasters to embitter their lives. This process happened over many years, during which time the great cities of Pithom and Raamses were built by the now enslaved Hebrews.

Yet, despite all of these hardships, the Jewish people grew and became even stronger. So, the Pharaoh enacts an even harsher punishment. Summoning the Hebrew midwives, he orders them to kill all the Jewish newborn male children.

What is the significance of the book of Exodus opening with this very disturbing order to commit slow genocide?

The refusal to carry out the Pharaoh's orders by two Hebrew midwives sheds light on this question: “The midwives feared God and did not do what the Egyptian king had commanded. They allowed the infant boys to live. The king of Egypt summoned the midwives and said to them, “Why did you do this? You let the boys live.” The midwives replied, “The Hebrew women are not like the Egyptians. They know how to deliver. They can give birth even before a midwife gets to them.” God was good to the midwives, and the people increased and became very numerous. Because the midwives feared God, He made them houses [of their own].” Exodus 1:17–21

Who were these midwives? The language in the Torah is quite ambiguous on their origins, using the Hebrew phrase “meyaldot ivriot”, translated to either “Hebrew midwives” or the “midwives of the Hebrews.” All that is known are their names: Shifra and Puah.

By defying the Pharaoh, Shifra and Puah performed what in our modern times would be considered an act of civil disobedience. They showed great moral courage. This is the reason that their nationality is not obvious. This kind of heroism is not just a Jewish trait, but a human trait repeated throughout history. During the holocaust, there were countless incidences of righteous gentiles standing up for justice and putting their own lives on the line to save Jews.

This year's confirmation class are learning about the *middot*. These are values or attributes the rabbis identified students as important not only to think about but to work on individually. The idea is that as human beings we strive to find balance... and focusing on the *middot* will help us understand our own shortcomings and strengths and ultimately know ourselves better. Recently we focused on *emet*, truth. Some of the questions we addressed included: Is omitting facts/details lying? Is lying to achieve a higher purpose for a community ok? How do you know what the truth is, is it your best educated guess? What happens when different cultures claim different truths? Does there have to be one truth? The question that the teens wrote about was: **How do you balance telling the truth with keeping the peace? Here are two responses.**

"In many ways it is difficult for me to find common ground or a happy medium in order to make everyone happy. There is no way to please everybody. Sometimes the best outcome will be to go with the majority. However, sometimes the minority has a point. That's why listening to each other is important. For me, the action that triggers speaking up is when someone is not being respected. I believe equality should be our goal. When I choose to speak up I am always thinking about the people that don't have a voice. I get angry and annoyed when others don't get that we are all the same. Tolerating inequality is wrong. It's a choice. Understanding we are the same is a path to peace." *Marti Long*

"In my house if I don't agree with something I will usually speak up. I'm not sure why but it seems there are more disagreements in the world outside my home. I think what motivates me to speak up is the amount of minds that are open to change and hear a new point of view. It's easier for me to speak my truth if I care about and know the people in the room. I would rely on others to support me and help me make my point. It's true that at times it's hard to be the one to speak up and tell the truth. However, when you stand up for yourself, you stand up for many and you can create positive change." *Seth Curtin.*

A film about 20,000 German and Austrian Jews mainly, who found refuge at the only place on earth at that time in History, that would allow them to be admitted, in Shanghai China. They lived among the poor Chinese people that were brutally mistreated by Japanese occupation themselves. These Jewish people escaped from being brutally murdered by Nazi Germany having been able to find sanctuary in Shanghai. Part of this film contains the story of Jerry Moses a 7 year old boy who at the last moment before being transported to Auschwitz, arrived with his mother, brother and sister in 1941 to Shanghai, after traveling six weeks crossing all Siberia in the Soviet union. Also this film illustrates in part the relationship and mutual admiration and respect between the Jewish people and the Chinese people that dates back around 1400 years ago during the Tung Dynasty era that has endured to this day.

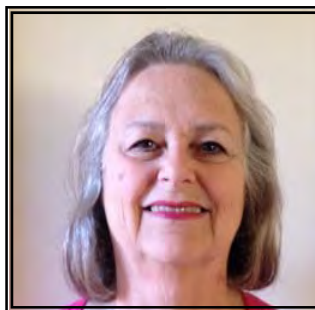

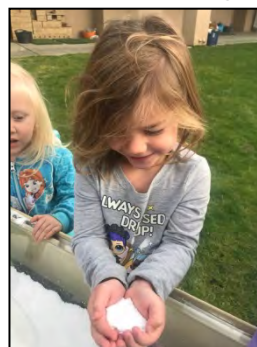
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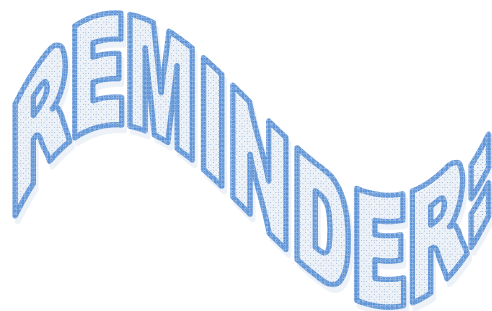
