President's Message

Thank you to the members who came to the special meeting January 20, 2019. We did have a quorum, which is 20% of members in good standing. The discussion was in-depth regarding the sale of approximately 4.25 acres which includes the Tikvah preschool.

Gayle and Reggie Clark, longtime members who are the prospective buyers, were in attendance and Gayle kindly answered questions at length.

The motion passed 58 to 2 in favor of selling the property and school. The proceeds from the sale and a significant gift from the estate of Burt Kaplan will allow the Temple to pay off our outstanding \$1.25 million mortgage which is owed to the 60+ investors through Semble.

This is only the first step in getting the Temple's financial house in order, but a major step. Thanks for your support.

Temple Sinai has entered into a Memorandum of Understanding with Scott Magged, operator of Desert Cities Bridge Club to rent the social hall Tuesday through Saturday from 12:30 to 4:30 PM. Any time there is a conflict with religious observance, the bridge club understands the hall is not available.

Please spread the word. The more successful Scott is, the better for the Temple. This agreement starts February 5, 2019 until June 1, 2019. Either party may terminate the agreement with a 30 day written notice to the other party.

We are continuing Shabbat Services beginning at 5:30 PM. The last Zimra dinner was the best attended in quite some time, and being after services, most people stayed and visited for quite some time.

Rabbi's Message

Mishpatim- Holy Justice



Jewish influence on modern society has been vast, especially in the realm of civil law. This week's biblical portion from Exodus immediately follows the Ten Commandments and contains an array of laws related to personal injury, property law, social responsibility and laws of compassion. These laws truly laid the foundation for a just society. There are two verses, one in Genesis and the other in Exodus, where the Hebrew word for justice (mishpatim) is repeated. The first is the realization of God's promise to Abraham that he was chosen... "so that he will direct his children and his household after him to keep the way of Adonai by doing what is right and just." (Genesis 18:19)

The second, repeated here in Exodus, lays out the laws and their applications. "And these are the judgments that you shall place before them" (Exodus 21:1). What makes this quote interesting is the use of the word "And" in the beginning. It implies that all of these laws are connected to the revelation at Sinai. Furthermore, these laws also precede the construction of the tabernacle, which illustrates the divine nature of these earthly laws.

It is in these details that God exists. Judaism is revolutionary. Rather than seeing justice in the supernatural world, far removed from earth, it occurs in our day-to-day human interactions. The Torah contains numerous cases that are further expounded on, such as the Mishnah and the Talmud, and are essential companions to the actual verses contained in the bible.

A perfect example is one of the most misquoted verses in the Hebrew bible: "But if there be a fatality, then you shall award a life for a life. An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, a hand for a hand, a foot for a foot. A burn for a burn, a wound for a wound, a bruise for a bruise" (Exodus 21:23-25).

At first glance, one would think that the perpetrator would have his or her eye removed as punishment. However, the oral law explains that the Torah is only talking about financial restitution; the value of the eye, not an actual eye. No one eye is equal, as a diseased eye is not worth the same as a healthy eye. The use of harsh language to imply the removal of an actual eye compels one to internalize the severity of hurting another human being.

Judaism puts a high value on justice that adheres to the principles of human dignity and equality. It was for this reason that the Sanhedrin, the Supreme Court, was placed next to the Temple as a reminder that our interpretation and application of the law must be a holy mission. As we look at every situation we encounter, remember to be objective and to not rush into judgment, but to realize that with every decision, we are partners with the Divine.

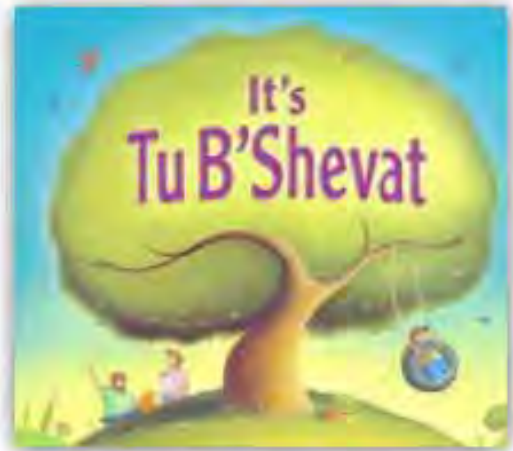

We may, from time to time, push 6 tables together to accommodate larger groups.

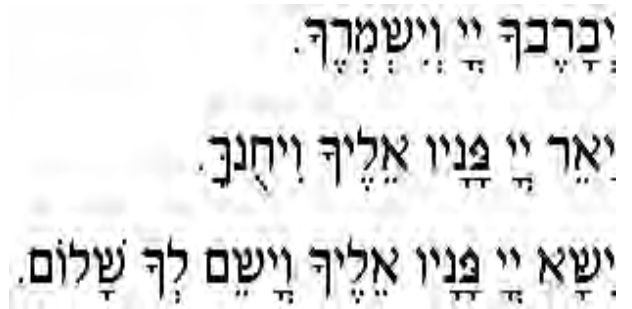
From the Melamedet, Aravah Talve

Rabbi Bentley begins our monthly family Erev Shabbat service with a very special blessing. The Priestly Tri-fold Benediction, or *Birkat Kohanim*, is the oldest blessing we still use today. It comes right from the Torah at the end of parashat Naso (Numbers 6:23-27). According to the Torah, after offering sacrifices Aaron blessed the people with the following:

"May God bless you and keep you.

May God's love and light continue to be with you.

May God give you the greatest gift of all, the gift of Shalom."



Today, we use these words to bless each other knowing when we give this blessing we also receive it. We raise our hands and, in front of the ark, sing these ancient words blessing our children, those celebrating birthdays, and at B'nai Mitzvah and other life cycle and special events. It's a beautiful, timeless blessing of comfort and love. During a recent Beit Sefer class some of our teens reflected on the meaning of the blessing.

"Opening your heart to let God bless you with the hands of happiness will keep you well, safe, healthy and happy. Being blessed with these words helps us stay focused on what is important because everyone makes mistakes. The blessing reminds us that even when we mess up, we are still blessed. Receiving this blessing helps us stay calm and to be positive and happy."

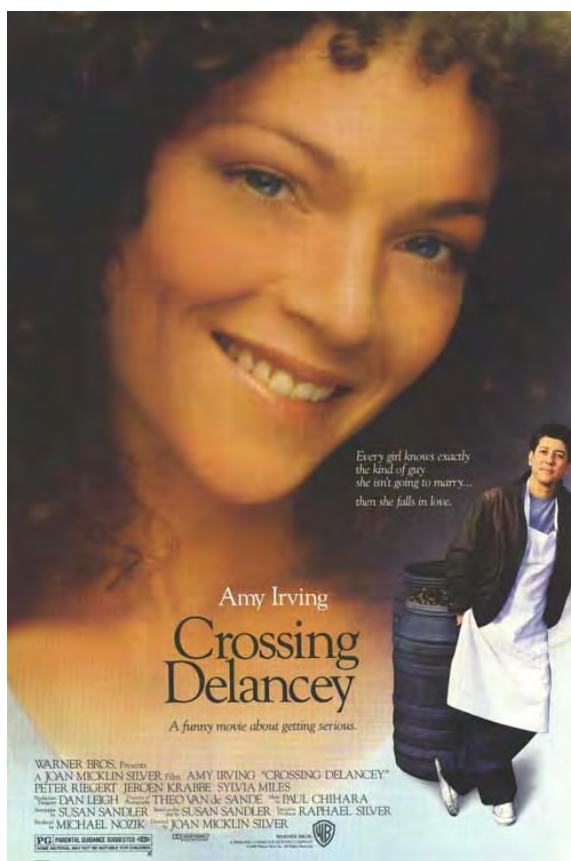
